Water Pollution Control Center Superintendent David Beach - effluent flow meter

Water Pollution Control Center is requesting funds be transferred for the purchase of a dedicated effluent flow meter at final outfall 001. Currently, the effluent flow rate is a calculated number derived from two sources: the plant influent flowmeter and the Bright Road pump station. It is important that the effluent flow data be as accurate as possible, as it is used to determine NPDES effluent loading limits compliance. Funds to purchase this equipment will be covered through the Equipment Replacement Fund for WPCC. A request to transfer \$22,000 from the Sewer Fund WPC Equipment Replacement Account to WPC #25061000-551300 Outlay-Equipment. Ordinance No. 2016-058 was created.

Service-Safety Director Paul Schmelzer - Marion Township Revenue Sharing Agreement

The project to construct a new industrial park south of CR 212 has been very successful. Much has been made of the state-of-the-art distribution facility that McLane is constructing. The collaboration between the City, Township, and economic development groups required to bring this project to fruition has proved to be very strong.

The Service-Safety Director has spoken many times about being positioned for projects. In many cases, this includes annexation. Along with annexation comes the City's commitment of utilities and infrastructure maintenance. Many corporations do not want to wait for the potential annexation of their properties. They want land that is ready for site development.

McLane was one of those properties. The Marion Township Trustees worked along with the City on expedited annexation for the McLane project. In addition, the City annexed more acreage than required for the McLane project so that the entire industrial park would be in the City. As part of the expedited annexation process, the Service-Safety Director is committed to Marion Township and to working on developing an agreement to extend the terms of the revenue sharing agreement. This would apply to the McLane project and any other project in the future where the City is desirous of annexing large tracts of land to prepare it for development. The revision extends the revenue share from twelve to fifteen (12-15) years. The share will start after any CRA abatement has expired. NOTE: this is not for all annexed parcels, only those where the City requests annexation before development.

The County Auditor will track the abatement and the revenue share. The Service-Safety Director is pleased with the our ability at the municipal and county government levels to work together to proactively position ourselves for smart growth. It is one example why Findlay is the #1 Micropolitan City.

Service-Safety Director Paul Schmelzer - final Health Department merger items

The Hancock County Health District has hired a new Executive Director. Karim Baroudi was hired by the Board to fill the position in May. He will play an important role, along with Deputy Health Commissioner Barb Wilhelm in moving toward accreditation.

There are two (2) outstanding issues remaining to complete the merger. First, to partially satisfy the merger agreement, the City paid \$484,258 toward matching the County carry-forward balance. It was agreed to, at that point, that a final payment would be made after all costs associated the merger were finalized and assets from each entity were accounted for. That process has now been complete.

To finalize the requirements in the agreement, the City must remit \$211,770.98. Based on initial estimates, the merger project was funded. There is \$176,991.58 remaining in the project. The difference is \$34,779.40. Legislation to transfer funds to complete the funding of the merger is requested. Ordinance No. 2016-059 was created.

The second item is an MOU regarding the only member of the City Health Department that was hired under the old pay scale. This MOU will ensure that upon her retirement from the County, she will be treated as though she were a City employee for the purposes of sick leave payout. In the event she has no sick leave remaining, there will be no payout and the County will have absorbed the sick leave payments over the course of her employment with the district. Legislation authorizing the execute the Memorandum of Understanding is requested. Ordinance No. 2016-060 was created.

Service-Safety Director Paul Schmelzer – 2016 Sanitary Sewer Lining Project 35660500

By authorization of Ordinance No. 2016-010, a bid opening was held for this project on May 19, 2016. Bids were received from two (2) potential contractors with base bid amounts of \$208,370.00 and \$240,120.00. Bids were also received for four (4) alternates totaling \$166,451.25 and \$184,195.00. The lowest and best bid was received from LiquiForce of Romulus, Michigan.

Currently in the 2016 Capital Improvements Plan (Sewer Fund), there is a budget amount of \$300,000 for the 2016 Sewer Lining Project and \$148,000 for the 2016 Sewer Cleaning Project with \$10,000 previously appropriated to each of the projects. In order to complete the four (4) lining alternates, reducing the cleaning budget amount and transfer the funds to the lining project is needed. Legislation to appropriate funds is requested. Ordinance No. 2016-061 was created.

Hancock Regional Planning Commission Director Matt Cordonnier - City of Findlay Revolving Loan Fund Request for Appropriation (Diversified Machine and Welding LLC)

On May 12, 2016, the City of Findlay Revolving Loan Fund Committee awarded a loan to Diversified Machine & Welding, LLC in the amount of \$75,000. The loan is contingent upon the threshold for applicant equity being reduced from 10% of the project to 5%. The loan will provide funds for property acquisition. The RLF loan will be used as part of a business expansion project. Legislation to appropriate funds and pass on an emergency basis in order to accommodate the timeline of the business and the bank that are involved in the financing of the project is requested. The appropriation of City RLF funds have historically been passed on an emergency basis in order to accommodate the time sensitive needs of business transactions. Ordinance No. 2016-066 was created.

As we continue to move forward with the Downtown Revitalization project, we have become aware of additional consulting tasks that need to be included in the project design; most importantly, irrigation systems for the landscaped areas and wayfinding signage.

To date, Marathon has contributed \$340,000 towards the design phase and they are also committed to reimbursing the City for these additional items. Legislation to appropriate funds is requested. Ordinance No. 2016-067 was created.

In 2008, the City of Findlay issued \$8,200,000 in various purpose bonds with a final maturity of 2033. Recent market conditions afford an opportunity to do an advance refunding of this debt prior to the call date savings the City interest cost. In order to take advantage of this opportunity, Council passed Ordinance No. 2016-022 on March 1, 2016.

Bond Counsel has done a thorough review of this debt along with our financial advisor and the Auditor's Office. In order to structure the debt in a way which is most advantageous to the City a modification is required to Ordinance No. 20106-022. Market conditions continue to be volatile and can change quickly so legislation is before you which includes the emergency clause that has been prepared by bond counsel and reviewed by our financial advisor and Law Director Rasmussen. The City Auditor requests Council consider suspending the Statutory Rules and give this Ordinance all three (3) readings. Passing it during the June 21, 2016 City Council meeting would enable the City Auditor to move forward and complete the refunding process to take advantage of the current market conditions. Ordinance No. 2016-069 was created.

Board of Zoning Appeals May 12, 2016

Members present: Chairman Phil Rooney; David Russell, Secretary; George McAfee; and Doug Warren. Present on behalf of the City is Todd Richard, Zoning Administrator, from the Zoning Department and Deidre Ramthun, Recording Secretary.

The meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Mr. Rooney. Mr. Rooney introduced the members to the audience and the general rules were reviewed.

Case #54621-BA-16 (429 Walnut Street and 420/422 Prospect Street) was introduced. Mr. Richard read his comments as follows: Filed by Enforce Enterprises, the applicant is seeking a variance from the City of Findlay Zoning Ordinance, sections 1124.05A4 (required 30-foot rear yard setback); 1124.05A2 (required 3-foot side yard setback); and 1124.06A (4,500 square foot minimum lot size). The applicant is splitting a lot that contains two duplexes. The lot split will cause one duplex to have a 6-foot rear yard setback and another duplex and detached garage to have a 2.5-foot side yard setback. Additionally, one lot will have an area of 4,225 square feet.

This property came to light when an appraiser asked about the legality of the use of the property. Upon doing a history search and review, it was discovered that the duplex at 420/422 Prospect was built in 1975 without a zoning permit and without any action taken by the City to enforce any permit requirements.

The dwelling at 429 Walnut Street was built in 1900 and a permit to convert it into a triplex was issued in 1973; however, it does not appear this ever happened. It seems to have been converted into a duplex in approximately 1980 without a permit.

The result is two duplexes on one lot in a C-2 General Commercial zoning district. This needs to be cleaned up to satisfy banking requirements. The solution is to have the property rezoned to the R-4 Duplex/Triplex District which is basically designed for the old neighborhoods that have small lots. The request to change the zoning district was presented to the City Planning Commission today and they approved it with some minor conditions. The lot split, to further clean this up, has created some setback issues that can be remedied with the variance. One is the rear yard setback on the southern duplex will now have about a 6-foot rear yard setback instead of the required 30 feet, and the other issue was the side yard setback which has nothing to do with the lot split but it was decided to include it because we were looking at the compliance of the entire site. The existing duplex and garage are only 2.5 feet from the side yard and it is required to be at least 3 feet. Everything that is here has been here whether it be because of the City's lack of enforcement or other events, getting the variance granted and the lot split in the rezone is going to probably make the financial instruction more comfortable with the situation.

Mr. Warren stated that it appears that you are supporting a 95/105 split versus a 100/100 split. Why wouldn't you split it in half? Mr. Richard replied that what they were trying to do and what we advised was to put the lot line in a location which would require the fewest number of variances. The split reduced the need for a setback for the rear yard on the duplex on Walnut Street. They are maintaining a 30 foot rear yard. Mr. Warren commented that it looks like the solution to 50/50 would be to move the

proposed lot line 5 feet south which would increase the side yard setback for the detached garage to 11 feet and it would still maintain 14.5 feet which is not a variance requirement on the newer duplex. Mr. Richard said that there is an asphalt drive and a stone drive and they were trying to keep the lot line so that they weren't interfering with existing parking areas. If you move that 5 feet, you will probably cut off part of the asphalt. Mr. Warren clarified, not cutting it off but including it in the other property. Mr. Richard commented, yes, and if these ever get sold separately, it could be an issue.

To clarify, Mr. McAfee asked, the rezoning to R-4 is what was approved by the Planning Commission today. Mr. Richard replied, yes; that allows a duplex on each lot.

Chairman Rooney swore in Chuck Wilson, 2927 Ennisbrook Drive, Findlay, Ohio, on behalf of Enforce Enterprises, Inc. Mr. Wilson stated that this all came about when they tried to refinance the bank loan for this property purchased, as is, in 2000. When it was purchased, 429 was an upstairs/downstairs duplex and Prospect was a side by side duplex. They have maintained it as such and haven't made any changes to it. It all came about with the application for the refinance.

They did not have these issues at the time of the purchase and during two other property refinancing. To reiterate what Todd was talking about on the proposed lot line, one of the considerations was the asphalt driveway. It is not the intention to sell the properties as two separate properties; but should that happen in the future, you're not cutting off the asphalt driveway and having disputes about parking. It was conditionally approved this morning by the Planning Commission and this afternoon by the Zoning Commission contingent that we have separate water for the Prospect property. Right now it's a shared service. They intend to comply and get separate water meter service for Prospect. They are doing the lot split and the deeds are in the process of being prepared and approved.

Mr. Richard stated that there are no other communications.

A motion was made by Mr. Warren that the Board of Zoning Appeals approve the variances as requested. He stated that he's not sure if there is any permit to pick up. Mr. Richard stated that since the City neglected permitting in the past, to at least have a record of it and get a permit issued to establish these once the split has been received. Mr. Warren asked if it would be one permit or two. Mr. Richard stated that one permit will be required for each property. Mr. Warren included in his motion that the permits be obtained within 60 days. The motion was seconded by Mr. McAfee. The motion was approved unanimously, 4-0.

Case #54625-BA-16 (1763 South Romick Parkway) was introduced. Mr. Richard read his comments as follows: Filed by Ron Pehrson, regarding a side yard setback variance to section 1141.04B1 of the City of Findlay Zoning Ordinance. The applicant is proposing to construct a mini-storage building 25 feet from the side lot line. The minimum setback is 30 feet.

Two of the storage buildings were erected in 2009 and 2010. At that time, the side yard setback was related to the height of the buildings, or 25 feet. Those buildings were constructed to meet those setbacks.

Since the completion of the last storage building, the setback requirement has increased to 30 feet. Since the other two storage buildings are a continuation of what was previously approved and the request is minor, we have no issue with the request.

This was reviewed by City Planning Commission and was approved today as presented.

Chairman Rooney swore in Ron Pehrson, 2957 Spyglass Drive. As Todd said, this is the last phase of two phases done on the buildings. They were originally in compliance when they laid everything out and planned ahead. They contacted the F.O.P. who is the property owner on the side they're dealing with; they had no objections. The spacing between the buildings is important in that he has a number of customers with automobiles and trailers that need the maneuvering space. They also have placed security camera poles in the center of those driveways which need to be spaced for each building. Mr. Pehrson asked that he be allowed to complete what was started.

Mr. Warren asked if this layout was approved by the City Planning Commission. Mr. Pehrson replied that yes, all four buildings were approved. Mr. Warren commented that this is a unique condition that seems justified since it was previously approved.

Communication:

Mr. Richard read the following communication from the F.O.P. dated May 10, 2016 to Whom It May Concern: In reference to Case #54625-BA-16, the Fort Findlay Fraternal Order of Police Lodge #20 has no objection to the proposed twenty-five (25) foot side yard setback for the mini-storage buildings instead of the required thirty (30) foot side yard setback at 1763 S. Romick Parkway. Ron Pehrson's business filed for the variance request to the City of Findlay Zoning Ordinance section 1141.04B1. We are the property owners at 1769 S. Romick Parkway and we thank you for the notification for the Public Hearing through the Board of Appeals. Respectfully, Gregory Smith, Vice President – Ft. Findlay FOP Lodge #20.

Mr. Richard stated that this letter should assist in the deciding factor.

A motion was made by Mr. Warren that the Board of Zoning Appeals approve the unique circumstance that the layout was previously approved before the setback change so he feels that it's consistent that the variance be granted as requested as long as they pick up permits within 60 days for construction. The motion was seconded by Mr. Russell and was unanimously passed 4-0.

A motion was made by Mr. Rooney to approve the April minutes as written. The motion was seconded by Mr. Russell. The motion to approve the minutes passed 4-0.

The meeting was adjourned.

Dear Council Members:

As you are aware, the project to construct a new industrial park south of CR 212 has been very successful. Much has been made of the state-of-the-art distribution facility that McLane is constructing. The collaboration between the City, Township, and Economic Development groups required to bring this project to fruition has proved to be very strong.

I have spoken many times about being positioned for projects. In many cases, this includes annexation. Along with annexation comes the City's commitment of utilities and infrastructure maintenance. Many corporations do not want to wait for the potential annexation of their properties. They want land that is ready for site development.

McLane was one of those properties. The Marion Township Trustees worked along with the City on expedited annexation for the McLane project. In addition, the City annexed more acreage than required for the McLane project so that the entire industrial park would be in the City. As part of the expedited annexation process, I committed to Marion Township that I would work on developing an agreement that we could use to extend the terms of the revenue sharing agreement.

This would apply to the McLane project and any other project in the future where the City is desirous of annexing large tracts of land to prepare it for development. The revision extends the revenue share from 12 years to 15 years. The share will start after any CRA abatement has expired. Note this is not for all annexed parcels, only those where the City requests annexation before development.

The County Auditor will track the abatement and the revenue share. I am pleased with our ability at the municipal and county government levels to work together to proactively position ourselves for smart growth. This is one example why Findlay is the #1 Micropolitan.

Dear Council Members:

The Hancock County Health District has hired a new Executive Director. Karim Baroudi was hired by the Board to fill the position in May. He will play an important role, along with Deputy Health Commissioner, Barb Wilhelm in moving toward accreditation.

There are two outstanding issues remaining to complete the merger. First, to partially satisfy the merger agreement, the City paid \$484,258 toward matching the County carry-forward balance. It was agreed to at that point that we would make a final payment after all the costs associated with the merger were finalized and assets from each entity were accounted for. That process has now been completed.

To finalize the requirements in the agreement, the City must remit \$211,770.98. Based on initial estimates the merger project was funded. There is \$176,991.58 remaining in the project. The difference is \$34,779.40. Legislation has been requested for a transfer to complete the funding of the merger.

In 2008 the City of Findlay issued \$8,200,000 in Various Purpose Bonds with a final maturity of 2033. Recent market conditions afford an opportunity to do an advance refunding of this debt prior to the call date saving the City interest cost. In order to take advantage of this opportunity Council passed Ordinance 2016-022 on 3/1/16.

Bond Counsel has done a thorough review of this debt along with our financial advisor and my office. In order to structure the debt in a way which is most advantageous to the City a modification is required to Ordinance 2016-022. Market conditions continue to be volatile and can change quickly so legislation is before you which includes the emergency clause that has been prepared by bond counsel and reviewed by our financial advisor and Law Director Rasmussen. I respectfully request that this council strongly consider suspending the Statutory Rules and give it all three readings. Passing Ordinance 2016-069 on 6/21/16 would enable me to move forward and complete the refunding process to take advantage of the current market conditions.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

This Agreement is made and entered into by and between the City of Findlay, Hancock County, Ohio (hereinafter "CITY"), Barbara Wilhelm (hereinafter "WILHELM") and the Combined General Health District (hereinafter "CGHD").

Whereas, on March 2, 2015, the DAC passed Resolution No. 1- 15 authorizing the DAC to create a Combined General Health District encompassing all of Hancock County, Ohio, uniting the Hancock County General Health District and the City of Findlay Board of Health, a copy of which is attached hereto and incorporated herein as "Exhibit A," as if same were fully rewritten herein; and,

Whereas, by Ordinance No. 2015-005, dated February 3, 2015, the CITY had previously authorized the Combined General Health District pursuant to Ohio Revised Code, Chapter 3709. Said Ordinance is attached hereto and is incorporated herein as "Exhibit B", as if same were fully rewritten herein; and,

Whereas, CITY and DAC approved the Contract for the Combination of the Hancock County General Health District and the City of Findlay Health Department on March 2, 2015, setting forth the terms and conditions of said merger, a copy of which is attached hereto and is incorporated herein as "Exhibit C", as if same were fully rewritten herein; and,

Whereas, Section V, paragraph 2 provides that an employee transferred to the CGHD may carry forward their accumulated but unused sick leave; and,

Whereas, Section V, paragraph 4 of the Contract for the Combination of the Hancock County General Health District and the City of Findlay Health Department provides that accumulated but unused sick leave, not otherwise carried over pursuant to paragraph 2 of Section 5, shall be paid to such employees who are eligible for such payments by their current employer prior to their employment by the Combined General Health District" and.

Whereas, Section V, paragraph 4 of the Contract for the Combination of the Hancock County General Health District and the City of Findlay Health Department creates an undue hardship for WILHELM, a longtime employee of the City of Findlay Health District who does not want to retire. Due to WILHELM's length of service with CITY, she has accumulated a large number of sick leave hours that she would be eligible to receive payment for from the CITY but would be ineligible to receive as a new employee of the CGHD.

Now, therefore, based upon the agreement of the parties, with regard to WILHELM'S accumulated but unused sick time, WILHELM shall be compensated as follows:

- 1. Pursuant to the Contract for the Combination of the Hancock County General Health District, WILHELM shall be allowed to carry over all of her accumulated but unused sick leave to the CGHD pursuant to Section V, paragraph 2.
- 2. During WILHELM's tenure with the CGHD, the CGHD shall continue to track her accumulated but unused sick leave to include that sick time that is transferred from the City to CGHD.
- 3. Upon WILHELM's retirement from the CGHD, or upon her death, the CGHD shall pay to WILHELM her accrued but unused sick leave in accordance with Ohio Revised Code §124.39, as limited or modified by County Policy, in effect at that time. Excepting, however, that WILHELM shall not be subject to the ten (10) year service requirement as set forth therein.
- 4. Upon WILHELM's retirement from CGHD, or upon her death, CITY shall pay to the CGHD, in favor of WILHELM, a sum of money equal to the amount she would have received from CITY had she retired with accumulated but unused sick leave from the CITY pursuant to Section 16 of Ordinance 2015-100 as follows:

- A. If upon WILHELM's retirement from the CGHD, or upon her death, she has accrued less than nineteen hundred twenty (1920) hours of accumulated but unused sick leave, CITY shall compensate CGHD an amount of money equal to one-half of all accrued but unused sick leave, less 960 hours, at her rate of pay at the time of retirement. Excepting, however, that WILHELM shall not be subject to the ten (10) year service requirement as set forth therein. (Example: WILHELM retires with less than 1920 total accrued but unused hours of sick leave. CGHD will compensate WILHELM for ¼ of her 960 hours of accrued but unused sick leave at her then current rate of pay. City would pay to CGHD, in favor of WILHELM, ½ of all hours of accrued but unused sick leave, over and above the 960 hours paid by CGHD, at her then current rate of pay)
- B. If upon WILHELM's retirement from the CGHD, or upon her death, she has accrued more than nineteen hundred twenty (1920) hours of accrued but unused sick leave, CITY shall compensate CGHD, in favor of WILHELM, an amount of money equal to one-quarter of nine hundred sixty (960) hours, at her rate of pay at the time of retirement. In addition, CITY shall compensate CGHD, in favor of WILHELM, an amount of money equal to one-half of her accumulated but unused sick leave, less 960 hours, at her rate of pay at the time of retirement in accordance with 2015-100. Excepting, however, that WILHELM shall not be subject to the ten (10) year service requirement as set forth therein. (Example: WILHELM retires with more than 1920 total accrued but unused hours. CGHD will compensate WILHELM for ¼ of her 960 hours of accrued but unused sick leave at her then current rate of pay. CITY shall likewise compensate CGHD, in favor of WILHELM, for ¼ of her 960 hours of accrued but unused sick leave at her then current rate of pay. In addition, CITY shall pay to CGHD, in favor of WILHELM, for ½ of any and all hours of sick leave accrued but unused over and above 960 hours)

AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 2016-022 TO AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS IN THE AMOUNT OF NOT TO EXCEED \$6,900,000 FOR THE PURPOSE OF DEFEASING AND ADVANCE REFUNDING (AS APPLICABLE) ALL OF THE CITY'S BONDS ISSUED IN JULY 2008 FOR THE PURPOSE OF (I) IMPROVING C.R. 236 BY WIDENING, CONSTRUCTING, RECONSTRUCTING. GRADING. PAVING. REPAVING AND CONSTRUCTING DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENTS AND RELATED INFRASTRUCTURE WITH LANDSCAPING, TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES, LIGHTING. AND OTHER APPURTENANCES THERETO; (II) CONSTRUCTING AND IMPROVING ATHLETIC FIELDS AND A PERIMETER WALKWAY FOR THE HANCOCK RECREATION CENTER FIVE PLEX SPORTS COMPLEX, INCLUDING GRADING, LANDSCAPING, IRRIGATION, PAVING, FENCING, LIGHTING, SIGNAGE, AND ALL OTHER IMPROVEMENTS AND APPURTENANCES THERETO; (III) RENOVATING, CONSTRUCTING, RECONSTRUCTING, AND EXPANDING THE HANCOCK RECREATION CENTER, INCLUDING ACQUISITION OF APPROXIMATELY 5.5 ACRES OF LAND AND INTERESTS IN LAND ADJACENT TO THE HANCOCK RECREATION CENTER, FURNISHING AND EQUIPPING SAME, AND ALL APPURTENANCES RELATING THERETO; AND (IV) ACQUIRING RIGHT-OF-WAY ALONG C.R. 236 BETWEEN U.S. RT. 224 AND S.R. 12 TO BE USED FOR THE C.R. 236 WIDENING PROJECT: AND AUTHORIZING AND APPROVING RELATED MATTERS; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, the City of Findlay, Ohio (the "City") issued its \$8,200,000 Various Purpose Bonds, Series 2008, dated July 23, 2008 (the "Outstanding Bonds"), for the purpose set forth in the title of this Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, this Council of the City (the "Council") passed Ordinance No. 2016-022 on March 1, 2016 ("Ordinance 2016-022") that authorized and approved the issuance of the City's Various Purpose Refunding Bonds, Series 2016 in the maximum principal sum of \$6,335,000 (the "Bonds," as further described in Ordinance 2016-022) for the purpose of advance refunding a portion of the Outstanding Bonds; and

WHEREAS, in view of favorable interest rates, this Council has determined that it is advisable and in the best interest of the City to amend Ordinance 2016-022 as described herein in order to allow the City to defease all of the Outstanding Bonds, including, but not limited to, the advance refunding of all maturities of the Outstanding Bonds that are subject to optional redemption prior to their stated maturity; and

WHEREAS, the Auditor of the City (the "Fiscal Officer") has certified to this Council that the maximum maturity and principal amount of the Bonds cannot exceed the maximum maturity of the Refunded Bonds (as defined hereinbelow);

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Findlay, State of Ohio, that:

SECTION 1. This Council clarifies that the term "Refunded Bonds" as used in Ordinance 2016-022 shall be interpreted to mean all unpaid and outstanding maturities of the Outstanding Bonds at the time when the Bonds are issued, whether such maturities are subject to optional redemption or not, and the term "Refunded Bonds" shall have the same meaning when used in this Ordinance. No provision of Ordinance 2016-022 shall be interpreted as limiting the City's ability to defease and refund (as applicable) all of the Outstanding Bonds. Any references in Ordinance 2016-022 to the Refunded Bonds or the refunding of the Outstanding Bonds shall be interpreted to also include the defeasing of such maturities of the Outstanding Bonds that are not subject to optional redemption.

<u>SECTION 2.</u> Ordinance 2016-022 is hereby amended to increase the aggregate maximum principal amount of the Bonds to an amount not to exceed \$6,900,000. Section 1 of Ordinance 2016-022 is hereby amended in its entirety to read as follows:

It is hereby declared necessary to issue bonds (the "Bonds") of the City in the principal sum of not to exceed \$6,900,000, or such lesser amount as shall be determined by the Fiscal Officer and certified to this Council, for the purpose described in the title of this Ordinance. The Bonds may be issued in one or more series and shall be designated "City of Findlay, Ohio Various Purpose Refunding Bonds, Series 2016," or as otherwise designated by the Fiscal Officer as may be necessary to distinguish any taxable series of Bonds from any Bonds the interest on which is excluded from gross income for federal tax purposes.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> This Council hereby determines that it is in the best interest of the City to provide for the defeasance and refunding of all of the Outstanding Bonds and, therefore, Ordinance 2016-022 is hereby amended to delete the second paragraph of Section 3 of Ordinance 2016-022 in its entirety.

SECTION 4. Section 14 of Ordinance 2016-022 is hereby amended in its entirety to read as follows:

There is hereby created and established, as an account within the bond retirement fund of the City, a trust fund to be designated "City of Findlay, Ohio - 2016 Various Purpose Refunding Bonds Escrow Fund" (the "Escrow Fund"), or as otherwise designated by the Fiscal Officer. which account may be in the custody of a bank or trust company as an escrow trustee, if desired. The proceeds from the sale of the Bonds, except the accrued interest and premium thereon (if any), shall be deposited in the Escrow Fund along with such funds, if any, as the Fiscal Officer may transfer from the bond retirement fund. Such moneys deposited in the Escrow Fund may be (i) held as cash or (ii) used to purchase direct obligations of or obligations guaranteed as to payment by the United States of America of such maturities and interest payment dates and bearing interest at such rates as will, as certified by such independent public accounting firm as shall be acceptable to the Fiscal Officer and the Original Purchaser without further investment or reinvestment of either the principal amount thereof or the interest earnings therefrom, be sufficient to pay the interest on, and the redemption price (including any redemption premium) of, the Refunded Bonds on the earliest of, as applicable, either (a) the optional redemption date for the Refunded Bonds that are subject to optional redemption, or (b) the scheduled maturity date for such portion of the Refunded Bonds that are not subject to optional redemption. The Fiscal Officer is also authorized, if necessary or desirable to facilitate the refunding of the Refunded Bonds, to engage a consultant to verify the sufficiency of the cash or other obligations held in the Escrow Fund to refund the Refunded Bonds on such redemption date or dates.

Any accrued interest received from the sale of the Bonds shall be transferred to the bond retirement fund to be applied to the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds or as otherwise provided by law. Any premium received from the sale of the Bonds may be used to pay the financing costs of the Bonds within the meaning of Ohio Revised Code Section 133.01(K) or be deposited into the bond retirement fund, including the Escrow Fund contained therein, in the manner provided by law.

The Fiscal Officer is hereby authorized to execute on behalf of the City an Escrow Agreement (the "Escrow Agreement") with a bank or trust company to be selected by the Fiscal Officer (the "Escrow Trustee"), setting forth the terms by which the Escrow Fund shall be held and disbursed, if the Fiscal Officer determines that an Escrow Agreement is necessary or beneficial to facilitate the refunding of the Refunded Bonds. Such an Escrow Agreement shall be in such form, not inconsistent with this Ordinance, as the Fiscal Officer shall determine.

SECTION 5. This Council hereby authorizes the Fiscal Officer to issue all or a portion of the Bonds on a taxable basis, and Section 15 of Ordinance 2016-022 is hereby amended in its entirety to read as follows:

The City hereby covenants that it will comply with the requirements of all existing and future laws which must be satisfied in order that interest on the Bonds is and will continue to be excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes, including without limitation restrictions on the use of the property financed with the proceeds of the Bonds so that the Bonds will not constitute "private activity bonds" within the meaning of Section 141 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"). The City further covenants that it will restrict the use of the proceeds of the Bonds in such manner and to such extent, if any, as may be necessary, after taking into account reasonable expectations at the time the Bonds are issued, so that they will not constitute arbitrage bonds under Section 148 of the Code and the regulations prescribed thereunder (the "Regulations").

The Fiscal Officer is hereby authorized and directed (a) to make or effect any election, selection, designation, choice, consent, approval or waiver on behalf of the City with respect to the Bonds as permitted or required to be made or given under the federal income tax laws, for the purpose of assuring, enhancing or protecting favorable tax treatment or the status of the Bonds or interest thereon or assisting compliance with requirements for that purpose, reducing the burden or expense of such compliance, reducing any rebate amount or any payment of penalties, or making any payments of special amounts in lieu of making computations to determine, or paying, any excess earnings as rebate, or obviating those amounts or payments. as determined by the Fiscal Officer, which action shall be in writing and signed by the Fiscal Officer on behalf of the City; (b) to take any and all actions, make or obtain calculations, and make or give reports, covenants and certifications of and on behalf of the City, as may be appropriate to assure the exclusion of interest from gross income and the intended tax status of the Bonds; and (c) to give an appropriate certificate on behalf of the City, for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings, setting forth the facts, estimates and circumstances, and reasonable expectations of the City pertaining to Section 148 and the Regulations, and the representations, warranties and covenants of the City regarding compliance by the City with Sections 141 through 150 of the Code and the Regulations.

The Fiscal Officer shall keep and maintain adequate records pertaining to investment of all proceeds of the Bonds sufficient to permit, to the maximum extent possible and presently foreseeable, the City to comply with any federal law or regulation now or hereafter having applicability to the Bonds that relates to the use of such proceeds, which limits the amount of bond proceeds which may be invested on an unrestricted yield or requires the City to rebate arbitrage profits to the United States Department of the Treasury. The Fiscal Officer is hereby authorized and directed to file such reports with, and rebate arbitrage profits to, the United States Department of the Treasury, to the extent that any federal law or regulation having applicability to the Bonds requires any such reports or rebates.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Ordinance, if the Fiscal Officer determines to issue all or a portion of the Bonds as obligations that the interest thereon is included in the bondholders' gross income for federal income tax purposes, then the foregoing provisions of this Section 15 shall not apply to such Bonds.

No provision of this Ordinance or of Ordinance 2016-022 shall be interpreted to limit the City's ability to issue the Bonds in more than one series or to issue all or a portion of the Bonds on a taxable basis as described above. Likewise, the City shall also retain the authority to issue all or a portion of the Bonds on a tax-exempt basis as originally contemplated by Section 15 of Ordinance 2016-022.

SECTION 6. This Council previously authorized the repeal of Section 127.01 of the Codified Ordinances of the City pursuant to Ordinance No. 2016-038 passed on April 5, 2016 ("Ordinance 2016-038"). Ordinance 2016-038 amended Ordinance 2016-022 to repeal Section 20 of Ordinance 2016-022, and no provision of this Ordinance shall be interpreted as modifying such amendment and repeal as set forth in Ordinance 2016-038. Except as amended hereby and by Ordinance 2016-038, Ordinance 2016-022 shall remain in force and effect as originally passed. This Ordinance on its passage shall become a part of Ordinance 2016-022, and all references to the Ordinance shall include reference to this Ordinance as well as Ordinance 2016-022 and Ordinance 2016-038.

<u>SECTION 7.</u> It is hereby found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this Ordinance were taken in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public in compliance with all legal requirements, including Ohio Revised Code Section 121.22.

<u>SECTION 8.</u> The Clerk of Council is hereby directed to forward a certified copy of this Ordinance to the County Auditor of Hancock County, Ohio.

<u>SECTION 9.</u> This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety of the inhabitants of the City, and for the further reason it is immediately necessary to make immediate provision for the defeasing and refunding (as applicable) of the Refunded Bonds in order to take advantage of favorable interest rates.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE SERVICE-SAFETY DIRECTOR OF THE CITY OF FINDLAY, OHIO, TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT WITH THE BOARD OF TOWNSHIP TRUSTEES FOR MARION TOWNSHIP, HANCOCK COUNTY, OHIO, FOR REVENUE SHARING PURSUANT TO RESOLUTION NO. 19-1995.

WHEREAS, the Ranzau/McLane annexation has previously been annexed to the City of Findlay, Ohio, and;

WHEREAS, Council previously has agreed to share a certain amount of tax revenue with the Board of Township Trustees for Marion Township pursuant to Resolution No. 24-2001 and entered into pursuant to Ohio Revised Code §709.191, and;

WHEREAS, it is now the desire of this Council to amend the Master Agreement For Revenue Sharing, dated August 10, 2001, to provide that whenever the City of Findlay requests that large tracts of undeveloped land in Marion Township be annexed into the City of Findlay for the purpose of securing land for future economic development within the City of Findlay, i.e. for future industrial parks, and such annexation is authorized by the board of county commissioners, the City of Findlay agrees to pay Marion Township 1.6 mils of tax from the assessed valuation of any parcel(s) annexed into the City of Findlay from Marion Township (excluding residential property which will continue to be paid as set forth in Section 4 of the Master Agreement dated the 10th day of August, 2001) for a period of fifteen (15) years.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Findlay, State of Ohio:

SECTION 1: That the Service-Safety Director of the City of Findlay, Ohio, be and he hereby is authorized to enter into an amendment of the Master Agreement for Revenue Sharing, dated August 10, 2001, with the Board of Township Trustees for Marion Township, Hancock County, Ohio. A complete and accurate copy of said Amendment is attached hereto and incorporated herein as if same were fully rewritten herein as "Exhibit A."

SECTION 2: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect after the earliest period provided by law.

EXHIBIT A

In accordance with the Revenue Sharing Agreement authorized by Resolution No. 024-2001, the City had agreed to pay to Marion Township 1.6 mils from the assessed valuation of any parcel(s) agreed to pay The City of Findlay has agreed to pay Marion Township 1.6 mils of tax from the assessed valuation of any such parcel(s) annexed into the City of Findlay from Marion Township (excluding residential property which will continue to be paid as set forth in Section 4 of the Master Agreement dated the 10th day of August, 2001) for a period of twelve (12) years.

The City of Findlay has agreed that effective October 1, 2014, whenever the City of Findlay requests that large tracts of undeveloped land in Marion Township be annexed into the City of Findlay for the purpose of securing land for future economic development within the City of Findlay, i.e. for future industrial parks, and such annexation is authorized by the board of county commissioners, the City of Findlay agrees to pay Marion Township 1.6 mils of tax from the assessed valuation of any parcel(s) annexed into the City of Findlay from Marion Township (excluding residential property which will continue to be paid as set forth in Section 4 of the Master Agreement dated the 10th day of August, 2001) for a period of fifteen (15) years.

Said payments shall commence in the tax year following the year said parcel(s) was annexed to the City of Findlay. However, If said parcel(s) are entitled to tax increment financing or some other type of tax deferral, including but not limited to benefits under a community reinvestment area (CRA) agreement, then in such event the fifteen (15) year period shall not commence until said tax deferral has been completed and the annexed parcel(s) is being fully taxed at its assessed value as initially improved and/or developed beyond the development of infrastructure improvements. Subsequent improvement and/or development to the same real estate parcel, as identified by the Hancock County Auditor, even if it occurs prior to the end of said fifteen (15) year period of deferral, shall not be subject to this agreement. Subsequent improvement and/or development beyond the initial development of infrastructure improvements to a different real estate parcel, as identified by the Hancock County Auditor, shall be subject to this agreement.

For purposes of these examples, the fifteen (15) year period of payment shall be referred to as the "Payment Period."

Example #1

ABC Company acquires vacant parcel and builds its manufacturing plant. The Payment Period shall commence in accordance with the agreement as set forth above. **Explanation:** Said payments shall commence in the tax year following the year said parcel(s) was annexed to the City of Findlay. However, if said parcel(s) is entitled to tax increment financing or some other type of tax deferral, including but not limited to benefits under a community reinvestment area (CRA) agreement, then in such event, the fifteen (15) year period shall not commence until said tax deferral has been completed and the annexed parcel(s) is being fully taxed at its assessed value as *initially improved and/or developed beyond the development of infrastructure improvements*.

Example #2

If ABC Company expands its physical presence on said previously owned parcel, even if said expansion occurs prior to commencement of the initial Payment Period, no payments shall be due to Marion Township based upon or as a result of said expansion. **Explanation:** Subsequent improvement and/or development to the same real estate parcel, as identified by the Hancock County Auditor, even if it occurs prior to the end of said fifteen (15) year period of deferral, **shall not** be subject to this agreement.

Example #3

ABC Company decides to expand its physical presence. ABC Company acquires an additional parcel to build upon. Whether or not it is adjacent to or abutting said original parcel, the Payment Period for the additional parcel shall commence as set forth above. **Explanation:** Subsequent improvement and/or development beyond the initial development of infrastructure improvements to a different real estate parcel, as identified by the Hancock County Auditor, <u>shall</u> be subject to this agreement.

Example #4

ABC Company decides to expand its physical presence. ABC Company decides to split its original parcel into two (2) parcels and build on the newly created parcel. The Payment Period for the newly created parcel shall commence as set forth above. **Explanation:** Subsequent improvement and/or development beyond the initial development of infrastructure improvements to a different real estate parcel, as identified by the Hancock County Auditor, **shall be** subject to this agreement.

AMENDMENT TO THE MASTER AGREEMENT FOR REVENUE SHARING DATED AUGUST 10, 2001

This agreement is entered into this _____ day of ________2016, by and between the City of Findlay, Ohio and Marion Township, Hancock County, Ohio who voluntarily enter into this agreement to amend the Master Agreement for Revenue Sharing, dated August 10, 2001, which was previously authorized by Resolution No. 24-2001 and entered into pursuant to Ohio Revised Code §709.191. Said Master Agreement for Revenue Sharing shall hereby be amended as follows:

That effective October 1, 2014, whenever the City of Findlay requests that large tracts of undeveloped land in Marion Township be annexed into the City of Findlay for the purpose of securing land for future economic development within the City of Findlay, i.e. for future industrial parks, and such annexation is authorized by the board of county commissioners, the City of Findlay agrees to pay Marion Township 1.6 mils of tax from the assessed valuation of any parcel(s) annexed into the City of Findlay from Marion Township (excluding residential property which will continue to be paid as set forth in Section 4 of the Master Agreement dated the 10th day of August, 2001) for a period of fifteen (15) years. Said payments shall commence in the tax year following the year said parcel(s) was annexed to the City of Findlay.

However, if said parcel(s) are entitled to tax increment financing or some other type of tax deferral, including but not limited to benefits under a community reinvestment area (CRA) agreement, then in such event the fifteen (15) year period shall not commence until said tax deferral has been completed and the annexed parcel(s) is being fully taxed at its assessed value as initially improved and/or developed beyond the development of infrastructure improvements. Subsequent improvement and/or development to the same real estate parcel, as identified by the Hancock County Auditor, even if it occurs prior to the end of said fifteen (15) year period of deferral, shall not be subject to this agreement. Subsequent improvement and/or development beyond the initial development of infrastructure improvements to a different real estate parcel, as identified by the Hancock County Auditor, shall be subject to this agreement.

Further, the fifteen (15) year period shall be stayed and shall not apply to any parcel annexed until the tax year following the year said property shows an increase in valuation due to the property being initially improved and/or developed beyond the development of infrastructure improvements.

All other provisions set forth in the Revenue Sharing agreement between the City of Findlay, Ohio and the Board of Trustees of Marion Township authorized by Resolution No. 24-2001, not otherwise in conflict herewith, shall remain in full force and effect and the revenue
