Findlay Municipal Court Activities Report - April 2022.

City Engineer Kalb - Federal Highway Administration Grant Application Old Mill Stream Byway Multiuse Path (32823500)

The City of Findlay has been invited by the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) to submit a grant application to the Federal Highway Administration for funding of a multi-use path from the National Scenic Byways Program. The grant funding is available for projects that incorporate the designated Old Mill Stream Byway. As part of the grant opportunity, the project will consist of installing a multi-use path from the existing trail head at Osborn Avenue extending west to a future trail head at Howard Street and Broad Avenue. This proposed path will connect the various multi-use paths and/or bike paths that have been constructed in the past couple of years. Legislation authorizing City representatives to execute the necessary grant application(s) and/or agreement(s) to receive grant funding is requested. Ordinance No. 2022-040 was created.

City Engineer Kalb - MLK Parkway Improvements, Project No. 32803100

City Engineer Kalb - HAN-Bright Road Phase III FY2023, PID108776 (32821800)

The City of Findlay is eligible for Federal Highway Administration Funds administered through the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT). This project is eligible for this type of funding. For the past few years, these funds have been used for resurfacing. In this case, this funding will be used for resurfacing on Bright Road (Fostoria Avenue to Production Drive) in 2023. Project cost is estimated to be eight hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$820,000.00) with eighty percent (80%) being funded by the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) and twenty percent (20%) from the City. The City's matching share is included in the 10-year Capital Improvement Plan for 2023. Legislation authorizing the Mayor, Service-Safety Director, and/or City Engineer to enter into a project agreement with ODOT is requested. Ordinance No. 2022-043 was created.

City Engineer Kalb - 22 WTP Roof Replacement, Project No. 35722500/22 WTP Masonry Repairs and Sealing, Project No. 35722600

The first phase building repairs at the Water Treatment Plant (WTP) are planned for this year as part of the 2022 Capital Improvements Plan. To perform the necessary repairs the City is utilizing, the U.S. Communities cooperative purchasing program to enter into a contract with The Garland Company, Inc. to perform the roof replacement and masonry repairs. The Garland Company has notified the City of Findlay that effective June 1, 2022, there will be a price increase on the roof material, as well as the masonry sealant. The price of materials has been changing daily over the past couple of months. In order to keep the project on schedule and within budget, it would be to the City's advantage to have Garland under contract by June 1, 2022 to lock in the pricing that was originally quoted as there is a very good chance that additional funds would be needed to complete the projects. Garland has notified the WTP that they have an opening in June that would allow the work to be completed in a timely manner. Legislation authorizing the Mayor, Service-Safety Director, and/or City Engineer to enter into contracts for construction, as well as appropriate and transfer funds is requested. Hancock Regional Planning Commission Grant Administrator Lizzy Essinger – FY2022 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding applications

The Office of Community Developed is accepting applications for their Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) programs for Program Year 2022. Hancock Regional Planning Commission intends to apply for two (2) CDBG funding programs on behalf of the City of Findlay. The first CDBG funding opportunity is the allocation program. The City of Findlay Engineering Department is working on a project that will consist of relocating the Rawson ballfield to the east side of Broad Avenue and redeveloping the east side of Broad Avenue with new ballfields, a new parking lot, and park amenities. The west side of Broad Avenue will be redeveloped into a green infrastructure area that will serve as a storm sewer overflow to help with some of the long-term control plan goals. The Critical Infrastructure Program is the second CDBG funding opportunity that the City of Findlay Engineering Department has identified replacing waterlines on Allen Avenue, Midland Avenue, Garfield Avenue and George Street from Main Street to the railroad tracks as the best use of these funds. There currently is a 4-inch waterline in that area. This project will update all the waterlines in that area with 6-inch waterlines that will be looped within the system to ensure proper water flow for the area which is necessary for proper fire suppression. New fire hydrants will be placed with the appropriate distance between hydrants as part of this project. The Critical Infrastructure Program is a highly competitive grant program that the City of Findlay is eligible to request up to five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000.00). If awarded, it will require a local match. The Ohio Office of Community Development and the Office of Housing and Urban Development has been encouraging communities to spend down their Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) balances, therefore, a RLF contribution of up to three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00) would make the application extremely competitive. Legislation authorizing the Mayor to file applications for both the Allocation and Critical Infrastructure Programs for PY2022 funding of up to three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00) in City Revolving Fund dollars be passed on an emergency basis is requested. Deadline for application submission is June 15, 2022 at 5:00pm. Ordinance No. 2022-045 and 2022-046 were created.

Mayor Muryn - Taylor Street property acquisition

The City of Findlay has the opportunity to purchase three (3) adjoining properties on Taylor Street adjacent to the Phase II Benching Project scheduled to start this year. There are three (3) contiguous parcels that the current property owners have agreed to sell to the City. The City has received signed Real Estate Purchase Agreements from the property owners and with Council's approval, the City would like to proceed with the purchase of these three (3) parcels for a total purchase price not to exceed one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000.00). Legislation authorizing City Representatives to execute the purchase of parcels: 610000342000, 610000342210, 610000342800, as well as allocate one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000.00) from the general fund to complete the transaction is requested. Ordinance No. 2022-047 was created.

Assistant City Engineer Lee Rausch - Municipal Court CASC Facility

The City of Findlay previously sent out Reference for Qualifications (RFQ) to consultants to design the Municipal Court CASC Facility. RQAW Architecture has been selected to design the Municipal Court CASC Facility. Legislation authorizing the Mayor, Service-Safety Director and/or City Engineer to enter into contracts for the design is requested. A request for an appropriation of funds will be requested at a later time for the various stages of the design. Ordinance No. 2022-049 was created.

Service-Safety Director Martin - gas aggregation

The City of Findlay's 3-year natural gas supply agreement with Volunteer Energy was schedule to end in November 2022, but on March 25, 2022, The City's gas aggregate Company Volunteer Energy declared bankruptcy and then began sending customers back to their utility's default service Company – Columbia Gas of Ohio with residents having the choice to pay the monthly Standard Choice Offer (SCO) rate until they chose a supplier on their own or Findlay's program restarted. Independent Energy Consultants (IEC) invited all eligible natural gas suppliers to submit proposals to restart Findlay's program and received various price offers for various terms. After reviewing options, the recommendation is to sign a 4-year supply agreement with IGS Energy as they submitted the lowest overall responsive proposal. With the current market situation, selecting a 4-year "NYMEX plus" formula is the best solution because it can be used as a variable rate or converted to a fixed rate for any length of time, at any time. IEC will watch for favorable market conditions and advise Findlay when to lock in a rate for the desired period. This program should provide price protection and budget stability. Legislation authorizing the Service-Safety Director to enter into an agreement with IGC Energy as the City's natural gas aggregation is requested. Ordinance No. 2022-050 was created.

TO: Applicants for Street or alley Vacation

FROM: Council Clerk

City law requires persons requesting the vacation of a street or alley to file a petition with City Council. Council then refers the request to the City Planning Commission and the Planning & Zoning Committee for their findings. These Committees file their report with Council, who in turn makes the final ruling on the request.

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

Petition forms are available in the Council Clerk's Office. It requires the signature of a majority of the property owners that abut the requested vacation. A plat of the area shall accompany the application indicating the street or alley to be vacated. This plat can be obtained from the City Engineer's Office.

In addition to the petition for an alley vacation being signed by the abutting property owners, which is notice, if said proposed alley vacation is less than the full alley running from street to street, either north and south or east and west as the case may be, then the Clerk will also send notices to the abutting property owners on that portion of the alley extended but not in the request for vacation. For example, if an alley runs from north to south from street A to street B, intersected by a east-west alley, and the request is to vacate the alley running from street A to the intersecting east-west alley, then the abutting property owners on the remaining portion of that north-south alley between street A and street B shall also receive notice of the petition to vacate from the Council Clerk. (Rules of Procedure, as amended, of Findlay City Council).

Ideally, the petition must be signed by all abutting property owners. If not, a Public Notice of Consideration to Vacate has to be advertised in the Courier for six consecutive weeks. The cost of the advertising shall be paid by the petitioner. Anyone wishing to address Council concerning the petition may do so as a result of the publication. This can occur at any of the three readings which Council must give an Ordinance that vacates right-of-way.

<u>FEE</u>

At the time of submitting the request to the Council Clerk, a \$75.00 non-refundable fee shall accompany the petition. This is to off-set some of the City's expenses. Upon adoption of legislation, applicable advertising and filing fees will be invoiced to the petitioner.

ASSESSMENTS

By law, if there were assessments to the abutting properties for improvements to the street or utilities, the petitioners are to pay the assessment fee for the property being vacated. These assessments, if any, are recorded in the City Engineer's Office. They are requested to be researched for the property upon legislation request. The petitioners will be invoiced for the total expense, and it must be paid before Council will vacate the street or alley.

PLANNING COMMISSION ACTION

Planning Commission action on vacation petitions will be in the form of a recommendation to City Council. Council may then either concur with the Commission's recommendation or override it. Concurring action may be accomplished with a simple majority vote, while overriding action requires a two-thirds (2/3) vote of Council. Notice of the Planning Commission Meeting will be sent from the Engineer's Office to the filer of the petition advising him/her when the request shall be heard.

COMMITTEE ACTION

This Committee's action will be in the form of a recommendation to City Council. Council may then either concur with the Committee's recommendation or override it. Action is a simple majority vote to concur or override the Committee report. Notice of the Planning & Zoning Committee Meeting will be sent by the Council Clerk to the petitioners advising them when the request shall be heard.

CITY COUNCIL ACTION

Once the petition is placed on Council's agenda, it will be referred to the City Planning Commission and the Committee with all documentation submitted. Both the City Planning

Commission and the Planning & Zoning Committee shall review the request. Upon their findings, Council will request legislation and give it three (3) separate readings if the vacation is to proceed.

In order to vacate a public right-of-way, City Council must adopt an ordinance doing so. Normally, legislation is prepared when the Planning & Zoning Committee recommends that an action be taken. However, appropriate legislation can be drawn at the request of any Council member, whether or not the vacation is supported by the Committee. Ordinances require three readings prior to adoption, and this normally occurs over the course of three consecutive meetings of Council.

A majority affirmative vote of at least five (5) members is necessary to enact a vacation ordinance. If Council disagrees with the Planning Commission's recommendation, it will take six (6) affirmative votes of members of Council to enact a vacation ordinance. The ordinance is not effective until at least 30 days after signing by the Mayor.



General Information

This request is located at the south end of the intersection of McLane Drive and Campbell Drive.

Staff Analysis

The applicant would like to vacate a portion of the street at the intersection. At the intersection there is a cul-de-sac area that has been barricaded from public uses. The intent of the vacation is to square off the road Right-of-Way and the land will be attached to the adjoining land to the east and south. Access will remain to the current Campbell's facility and will not create any negative traffic impacts. There is only one abutting property owner for this request.

CPC STAFF

General Information

This request to the east of Technology Drive, south of County Road 99. It is zoned C-2 General Commercial. To the west, it is zoned M-2 Multi-Family High Density. To the south is a mix of Office and Condo. It is not located within the 100-year flood plain. The City of Findlay Land Use Plan designates the area as Regional Commercial.

Parcel History

The site is currently vacant land.

Staff Analysis

The proposed plat would subdivide this area into two parcels. At the north end of the site, there is an extension of the existing stub street, Midwest Court. Abutting the street would be a 45.106 acre parcel that would stretch from Technology Drive, along Midwest Court, and towards the southeast corner of the site. Parcel 2 would be 16.937 acres and is located on the southwest corner of the site. The plans show a thirty-foot (30') easement from Midwest Court as access to Parcel 2.

Staff Recommendation

DISCUSSION

Dan Stone was present on behalf of the applicant. Mayor Muryn said that this project was part of a multi-month discussion regarding this area. She was supportive of the preliminary plat aspect and was encouraged that it would lead to an increase in housing for Findlay.

Dan DeArment asked why there was only two parcels created for the development. Dan Stone said that the site plan would call for three pods of housing development. The one lot will have

single-family townhomes development. They wanted the ability to subdivide the single-family in the future if needed.

Dan DeArment noted that there were a number of wetlands on the site. Dan Stone said that it was something the developer would have to work around them. They are not allowed to use the detention on the site as a substitute for the wetlands. They plan to keep as much of the existing trees and wetlands as they can. They also plan to include some walking paths to help beautify the site. There will be two ponds on the site to handle drainage for the whole development.

Dan Clinger asked Matt Cordonnier if the zoning map said there was a strip in Allen Township. Dan Stone addressed it. The strip was a leftover because the developer originally was only intending to develop up to that line, with about one hundred feet left in Allen Township. The one hundred foot strip is in the process of being annexed into the City as part of the development. There is a parcel in between the site and the Hillcrest Golf Course, which Hillcrest owns. There have not been any discussion to purchase and include this. They anticipate this will provide a buffer between the two sites.

3. APPLICATION FOR SITE PLAN REVIEW #SP-06-2022 filed by Findlay Warehousing Inc. for a commercial building at 8556 County Road 140.

General Information

This request is located on the northwest corner of State Route 12 and County Road 140 in Liberty Township. Liberty Township has this parcel zoned I-1 Light Industrial. The City of Findlay Land Use Plan designates the area as Industrial.

Parcel History

The site has been the site of Findlay Warehousing Inc. The original warehouse on the site was built in 2006.

Staff Analysis

This project is located in Liberty Township, so it will fall under the Liberty Township zoning requirements and permitting process for construction. The City will only issue permits for utilities.

Currently the site is used as storage space for the topsoil for sale. This will be removed as part of the project, including the shed at the south end of the site and the cinder-block walled structure at

the north end of the site.

The site plan shows a new warehouse on the property measuring over 105,000 square feet in size. Elevations show that the height of the building would be the same as the existing building, which is thirty-six feet. The maximum height for a building in Liberty Township I-1 Industrial District is forty feet (40°). The proposed building would have the twelve (12) trucking bays on the west side of the building. They have included an additional parking lot at the northwest corner of the site, which has thirty-three (33) parking spots, with two (2) handicap spots.

A photometric plan was not submitted, but has been requested by staff. There is no landscaping included in the site plan. Staff would like to prescribe mounding and level 2 screening option 1: four canopy trees and four evergreen trees per one hundred lineal feet (100') of contiguous boundary with conflicting zoning district or use. While the site across the street is currently vacant, there is a mix of residential and business in the area.

Staff Recommendation

Staff recommends approval of APPLICATION FOR SITE PLAN REVIEW #SP-06-2022 filed by Findlay Warehousing Inc. for a commercial building at 8556 County Road 140 subject to the following condition:

• Mounding and Level 2 screening option 1 along County Road 140

ENGINEERING

Access -

Will be from the existing drive off of CR140

Water Service -

A 2-inch service line is to proposed come off of the 20-inch waterline that is located on the east side of the site. The plans also show a 8-inch fire line to come off of the private 12-inch waterline that is located on the north side of the building.

Sanitary Service -

The proposed sanitary will be coming off of a private sanitary sewer that is located on the west side of the building.

Stormwater Management -

Since the property is outside City Limits and is not adjacent to City Limits, detention calculations were not reviewed.

MS4 Requirements -

Since the site is outside City Limits Sediment and Erosion control is not required by the City of Findlay.

Recommendations:

Approval of the Site Plan

The following permits may be required prior to construction:

• Water Tap Permit x l

FIRE PREVENTION

- Increase fire lanes to 25' wide
- Fire lanes must be maintained at all times

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval of APPLICATION FOR SITE PLAN REVIEW #SP-06-2022 filed by Findlay Warehousing Inc. for a commercial building at 8556 County Road 140 to the following condition:

Level 2 screening option 1 along County Road 140

DISCUSSION

Eric Trout was present on behalf of the applicant. Jeremy Kalb asked if Findlay Warehousing owned the 12-inch water lines running west. Eric Trout said he believed the City owned them. Jeremy Kalb said when they come to get their tap permits; they can work out getting it inspected. Dan DeArment asked if there were concerns about capacity in the area. Eric Trout said that there would only be two small bathrooms in the new building, so it would not be a big strain on the system.

Dan Clinger asked if there was any concern with the surface drainage. Eric Trout said that the site was designed to handle this type of expansion.

Dan DeArment what they stored in the warehouse. Mayor Muryn said that there is not anything hazardous.

Mayor Muryn asked if there would be any concerns with the landscaping or mounding. The VP of Business Development of Findlay Warehousing, Chase Hatfield, asked what the requirements would be with the mounding/landscaping. He worried that due to their food storage, they would not want animals to be attracted to the site. Matt Cordonnier said that they typically request that they try to soften the view from the road. Mr. Hatfield was concerned that they did not have much room to work with due to the fire land going around the building. Matt Cordonnier said some deciduous or evergreen trees would be appropriate. These would be new trees, readily available at a nursery. The standard is 1½-inch caliper tree. This is something that HRPC could administratively review when they come in the get their permits. Jeremy Kalb noted that there is a utility easement in the area, and that is something they will be mindful of during the final review.

Mr. Hatfield asked Kevin Shenise if they would use the Fire Lane. Kevin Shenise said they would definitely use the fire lane in that case. They will not spray from CR 140; they will utilize what is there.

MOTION

Mayor Muryn motioned to approval of APPLICATION FOR SITE PLAN REVIEW #SP-06-2022 filed by Findlay Warehousing Inc. for a commercial building at 8556 County Road 140 to the following condition:

- Work with HRPC on a landscaping plan

4. APPLICATION FOR SITE PLAN REVIEW (Request for Site Plan Revision) #SP-13-2019 filed by OPM of Findlay, 1901 Tiffin Avenue, Findlay for an approximately 1580 square foot addition to The Beverage Barn, 1901 Tiffin Avenue.

CPC STAFF

General Information

This site is located on the south side of Tiffin Avenue across from Findlay Village Mall. It is zoned C-2 General Commercial. All surrounding lots are also zoned C-2. It is not located within the 100-year flood plain. The City of Findlay Land Use Map designates the area as Regional Commercial.

Parcel History

This is currently the site of the Beverage Barn State Liquor Store.

Staff Analysis

The applicant had originally submitted a site plan for an expansion in June 2019. They had proposed to construct a 1,589 square foot addition on the south side of the building. The access drive is a shared entry used by multiple tenants in this shopping area.

Staff originally commented that we do not see any need for the second access to the east. Since the drive thru carry out went out of business, staff viewed the second access as unnecessary. Staff and the Engineer's Office agreed to this change. We continue to try to eliminate unnecessary access points on Tiffin Avenue for safety reasons.

At the June 2019 CPC meeting, the motion to approve were subject to the following conditions:

- Remove easternmost drive approach and replace with high curb
- Fix existing sidewalk at the drive that is removed
- Landscaping in front greenspace
- Apply for all necessary permits with Wood County Building Inspection.

In 2022, Erik Atkins from the Zoning Department contacted that the owner, Eric Hager, saying they needed to follow through with the conditions for approval. HRPC also sent the owner a letter, which outlined that if the conditions were not met, that they would be subject to losing their

certificate of occupancy. Mr. Hager requested that CPC reconsider the closing of the second access. In his request, he has argued that the parking in the front only has access from the second access. There is an easement on record between this property and the owner of the driveway to the west of the site though.

ENGINEERING

No Additional Comment

FIRE PREVENTION

No Comment

DISCUSSION

Eric Hager, the owner of OPM, was present. The employees of Beverage Barn use that front area for parking. They enter on the east side and pull forward to the west side of the building. The next shift then pulls up behind the first shift employees. The public does not use the front area because the cars are blocking access from one side to the other.

Mayor Muryn asked what the plans were for the landscaping. Mr. Hager said that he wanted a landscape strip between his site and the neighbor to the east, so that access would be blocked off. The front grass area would be removed and replaced with a stone bed to match the landscaping at the Panda Express.

Dan DeArment said he visited the site yesterday morning and only one car was in the front. This allowed one car to pull across the front from next door. Then the mail truck did the same thing. Mr. Hager said the employees are typically parked there, so it usually is not an issue. If they moved their cars to the south end, it would block delivery trucks.

Dan Clinger asked why he had not striped. Mr. Hager noted it was due to Covid slowing down operations. He noted that Wednesday mornings, the parking lot is completely full. Dan DeArment asked why there were so many cars earlier in the morning. Mr. Hager said that every Wednesday the Ohio Liquor Department does their weekly release and people show up to be first in line for the limited releases.

Matt Cordonnier said that while he hears the concerns, he did note that Mr. Hager agreed to the conditions originally when it was submitted. Rob Martin said that he was concerned that it would set a bad precedent to revisit conditions on site plans. He was concerned that the aesthetics have not been kept up in accordance with the conditions three years prior as well. The standard set is to remove curb cuts to limit the number of conflicts onto Tiffin Avenue. Mayor Muryn added that she understands the applicants concerns, but that she is disappointed that they had yet to follow through on the conditions required for approval.

Mayor Muryn asked how quickly he could get the parking lot striped. Mr. Hager said it depended on the outcome of the meeting. He wanted to paint the whole building and wanted to include the

striping. Dan Clinger said that he preferred the perpendicular parking spots to allow for as much parking onto the site. Mr. Hager thought that would be best too because people enter the site from both Tiffin and the driveway easement from the south. Mr. Hager thought that July 1st would be an appropriate deadline for the updates.

Mayor Muryn wanted to extend the deadline to allow the changes to happen. She also thought it would be a good idea to set up a mobile camera to monitor the situation once the changes are in place.

Jeremy Kalb offered that the City could remove part of the driveway to shrink the width. This would discourage people from entering the site for customers. The additional landscaping would help improve the aesthetic of the site.

MOTION

Mayor Muryn motioned to approve of APPLICATION FOR SITE PLAN REVIEW (Request for Site Plan Revision) #SP-13-2019 filed by OPM of Findlay, 1901 Tiffin Avenue, Findlay for an approximately 1580 square foot addition to The Beverage Barn, 1901 Tiffin Avenue with the following conditions to be completed by August 1st, 2022:

- Planters or landscaping be placed between the property and the property to the east
- Stripe the parking lot for perpendicular parking
- Full landscaping from previous conditions remain
- Reduce the easternmost entrance to 14'

Mayor further clarified that the document gives the background, the reference points. Rasmussen will meet with the Judges and have the Judges provide an opinion on the interpretation. Rasmussen stated that the document explains the Judges narrative.

Auditor Staschiak asked how many cases have been filed under Ordinance 194 and what the dollar amounts are. Price stated she can pull the number of cases filed. She can pull the dollar amounts from the initial judgement posted. There are frequent adjustments after the initial judgement is posted. For those figures, Price will have to contact our attorney to get those exact numbers.

Auditor Staschiak stated that he doesn't think the Income Tax Board discussed how penalties are charged. As part of the solution should the Board be part of the review for recommendation. Is that part of the responsibilities of the Income Tax Board? When a judgement is issued, is it disclosed to the taxpayer that there are additional penalties that are owing? Mayor Muryn stated that this would be addressed based off the opinion of the Judges and the interpretation. The two methodologies of how we are doing vs. how they think we should be doing it, how we need to clarify it to the public. What we first need is the court to say this is the legal interpretation of how this can be applied. If it can be applied two ways, then we need to discuss the process. If it can legally be applied only one way, then that's the process the ordinance specifies and this Board would have no involvement in it unless we want to review and change the ordinance. We can review it, but we need the court's interpretation first. Auditor Staschiak stated that the Board needs to review the process and understand it. Price stated that we have not filed any new cases and won't file any new cases until it is resolved how penalties are charged. Mayor Muryn is a big proponent of visuals, showing the public here is what the court process looks like if there is a judgement against you. Price stated that ideally once the judgement is entered. the taxpayer comes to the Income Tax office and pays the judgement amount. Only when the case goes to collections is when additional fees/penalties are added.

NEW BUSINESS

<u>Year-To-Date Collections</u>: Price stated the collections are up 12.578% year-to-date February 7, 2022, Price is looking at this next month or two to monitor the effect if any of non resident remote workers in the withholding collections. Will monitor the next couple months very closely because in February withholding for January will start coming in and that is when the withholding law changed. Mayor Muryn asked that with business collections being up significantly are you aware of anything that attributed to that? Due date was December 15 and sometimes they come in the month after. We are seeing some delay with mail delivery, but sometimes corporations just don't pay it by the 15th. Wobser asked if there is a way we can promote the online payment option. Mayor Muryn asked Price to send her information to put together to advertise the different ways to pay vs. mailing it in.

<u>Collections, Estimates, Delinquencies</u>: Price stated that looking year over year, we are comparable with past-due collections for January 2022. 2021 collections were up potentially because of the 2020 filing extension. The collections were not technically past-due, they were delayed due to the filing extension.

<u>Legal Actions in Process and Contemplated</u>: Price stated that she knew the court cases were going to be down a bit because there were cases from the end of last year that were continued to the first couple weeks of January. Large factor for the continued cases was COVID illness of defendants whose cases were then continued to January. Because of that there was a large backlog of cases in January so not as many new cases were filed as typically would be in a month.

<u>Strategic Planning-translate forms and documents</u>: Councilman Wobser stated that when doing research of strategic planning in other cities, one of the projects they took on was translating all their forms and documents to Spanish. Have we ever contemplated that. Something to consider. Mayor Muryn stated that it would be good to translate into Japanese as well.

OTHER BUSINESS

Next Meeting: Meeting schedule for 2022: May 4, August 3, and November 2. All meetings will be held at 2:30pm in the third floor conference room of the Municipal Building.

As part of the 2022 Capital Improvements Plan, the Water Treatment Plant has the first phase of building repairs planned for this year. To perform the necessary repairs the City is utilizing the US Communities cooperative purchasing program to enter into contract with The Garland Company, Inc. to perform the roof replacement and masonry repairs. As we have seen over the past couple of months the price of material is changing daily, and we were recently notified by Garland that on June 1st there will be a price increase on the roof material as well as the masonry sealant.

Honorable Members of Council:

The Office of Community Developed is accepting applications for their Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) programs for Program Year (PY) 2022. Hancock Regional Planning Commission intends to apply for two CDBG funding programs on behalf of the City of Findlay.

The first CDBG funding opportunity is the Allocation Program. Engineering is working on a project that will consist of relocating the Rawson Ballfield to the east side of Broad Avenue and redeveloping the east side of Broad Avenue with new ballfields, new parking lot and park amenities. On the west side of Broad Avenue, the area will be redeveloped into a Green Infrastructure area, which will serve as a storm sewer overflow to help with some of the Long-Term Control Plan goals.

The second CDBG funding opportunity is the Critical Infrastructure Program. The City Engineer has identified replacing waterlines on Allen Avenue, Midland Avenue, Garfield Avenue and George Street from Main Street to the Railroad Tracks as the best use of these funds. Currently the area is only served by 4-inch waterlines and this project will be updating all of the waterlines within the area with 6-inch Waterlines. This is necessary for proper fire suppression; waterlines should be a minimum of 6-inches in size. Additionally, as part of the project new fire hydrants will be placed with the appropriate distance between hydrants. The new waterlines will be looped within the system to ensure proper water flow for the area.

The Critical Infrastructure Program is a highly competitive grant program in which the City is eligible to request up to \$500,000.00, and requires a local match. The Ohio Office of Community Development and the Office of Housing and Urban Development has been encouraging communities to spend down their Revolving Loan Fund balances. With this in mind, a Revolving Loan Fund contribution of up to \$300,000.00 would make this application extremely competitive.

Before City Council is a request authorizing the Mayor of the City of Findlay to file applications for both the Allocation and Critical Infrastructure Programs for PY 2022 funding. Additionally, this authorization will approve the use of up to \$300,000.00 in City Revolving Loan Fund dollars. These applications have a submission deadline of June 15, 2022 at 5:00PM. For this reason, I respectfully request that this legislation be passed through emergency procedures, and the three readings requirement be waived.

Dear Council Members,

The City of Findlay's 3-year natural gas supply agreement with Volunteer Energy was set to end in November 2022. On March 25th, 2022 Volunteer Energy declared bankruptcy and then began sending customers back to their utility's default service which is Columbia Gas of Ohio, and residents had the choice to pay the monthly Standard Choice Offer (SCO) rate until they chose a supplier on their own or Findlay's program restarted. Independent Energy Consultants (IEC) invited ALL eligible natural gas suppliers to submit proposals to restart Findlay's program and received various price offers for various terms. After reviewing options, the recommendation is to sign a 4-year supply agreement with IGS Energy. IGS Energy submitted the lowest overall responsive proposal. With the current market situation, selecting a 4-year "NYMEX plus" formula is the best solution as it can be used as a variable rate or converted to a fixed rate for any length of time, at any time. IEC will watch for favorable market conditions and advise Findlay when to lock in a rate for the desired period. This program should provide price protection and budget stability.

WHEREAS, the Ohio Legislature has enacted natural gas deregulation legislation ("H.B. No. 9") which authorizes the legislative authorities of cities to aggregate the retail natural gas loads located in the respective jurisdictions and to enter into service agreements to facilitate for those loads the purchase and sale of natural gas, and;

WHEREAS, governmental aggregation provides an opportunity for residential and small business customers collectively to participate in the potential benefits of natural gas deregulation through lower natural gas rates which they would not otherwise be able to have individually, and;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Findlay, State of Ohio, two-thirds (2/3) of all members elected thereto concurring:

SECTION 1: The Mayor of the City of Findlay is hereby authorized to enter into a Master Service Agreement for Natural Gas Supply Services with Independent Energy Consultants (IEC). to facilitate the sale and purchase of Natural Gas to consumers in the City's opt-out program.

SECTION 2: That it is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

SECTION 3: This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety of the inhabitants of the City of Findlay, Ohio, and for the further reason it is immediately necessary to execute said agreement so that the aforementioned governmental natural gas aggregation program may continue,
