PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT



Introduction

The Public Works Department is comprised of Streets, Parks, Cemetery, Pool, Recreation and Traffic Depts and is located at 330 N Cory St. We are responsible for a wide variety of operations throughout our beautiful City and take pride in all that we do.

Streets

The Streets department is responsible for the maintenance and repair of streets and alleys. This is done through street sweeping, patching, resurfacing and repairing road cuts, gutter pans, curbs, sidewalks and manholes. We also plow and salt our city streets, by doing the major arteries, fire stations, hospital, ambulance services, and city school areas first. Then we start on the secondary roads, followed by residential areas. This year we used 2,100 ton of road salt to keep our streets safe.

The Street Dept. oversees the Sign Shop, Street Sweeping, Tree Removal, Tree Committee, leaf pickup, Green Waste Site and maintain the Street Scape downtown. We also have our own mechanic and weld shops to help maintain our vehicles and equipment.

Sign Shop

Traffic control devices (TCD) are critical for the safe and efficient flow of traffic. The Federal Highway Administration has published the *Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices* (MUTCD), which provides uniformity and reduces cost of TCDs through standardization. Our Traffic Commission and Sign Shop follow their guidelines for determining when traffic signage is necessary, for sign placement and pavement marking. We keep premade signs in stock to replace damaged or faded signs and we purchase blank sign faces to design some of our own





miscellaneous signs. For example: our street signs are done in house, by cutting the vinyl and affixing to a green street sign blank.

During the past year, seven signs were installed per the request and approval of the Traffic Commission. We also have a Maintenance Program, where we fix or replace signs that have been vandalized, are missing or have become faded due to weather. Between this program and reports from the general public, we replaced/repaired an additional 469 signs.

The street painting program involves center lines, lane lines, edge lines, parking stalls, handicap stalls, stop bars, crosswalks, curbs, turn arrows, and directional wording such as "Only" and "School". We add glass beads to the surfaces of the paint while it is still wet, to make the traffic lane lines more reflective at night. This is done as a one-unit operation.

Funding for traffic paint, glass beads, barricades, cones, signs and post, come out of both the Street and the SCM&R Highways budgets, which is funded by a percentage of money derived from motor vehicle registrations and the gasoline excise tax.

This year we purchased two new items for the Sign Shop. We replaced our 40 yr old striping machine and our vinyl cutter, which was 15 years old.

Green Waste Site

The Green Waste Site provides a place for city residents to dispose of green waste, such as yard clippings, leaves and fallen tree limbs. We recycle these items into mulch and compost, which is available for purchase by the general public. This year we sold \$5,233 in mulch and \$3,419 in compost.

The site is open the first two weeks of January, for Christmas tree disposal and drop off of any leaves that may have fallen after we closed for the season. The first Tuesday in April, the site opens for the summer and runs Tuesdays through Saturday (Excluding major Holidays) and usually closes the first Saturday in December.

Leaf pick-up

Residents were asked to collect their leaves in biodegradable paper bags and place them curbside to be picked up starting the week of November 17th and ending Friday, December 3rd

Street Sweeping

Regular street sweeping doesn't only keep our City looking nice, but is a cost-effective way of keeping debris, sediments, trash and vegetation from accumulating in our storm sewers and on our streets, which ultimately ends up in our storm drains. Our street sweepers collected 468 cubic yards of dirt.

Events

Our department helped with 36 special events that required setup preparation. Before and after these events, we run our Street Sweeper through the area, deliver, erect and then remove barricades that are used in maintaining traffic, by blocking off roadways and parking lots.





Every year, a list is provided to the Mayor of potential Christmas Trees. This year we have John and Joanne (Smith) Davis to thank for the beautiful tree and to Miller Rigging for assistance in getting the tree to Dorney Plaza. This may have been the biggest tree yet! Once the tree is in place, our crew then decorates it with lights, ornaments and ribben. This year, the Mayor asked the high school's construction, welding and engineering students to create a topper for the tree. They came up with two designs and prototypes. The Mayor made the hard decision on which to use and our crews were able to get it all set up. This year we also put lights in Latham Court Yard.

Parks Department

The Parks Maintenance Department is responsible for the maintenance, repair and improvements to City owned park grounds, buildings (shelter houses) and equipment including the Riverside Pool, the 24 ball fields, including those at the Cube, the 23 soccer fields, Pickle Ball courts and the Skate Park. Our Crews are also responsible for getting Shelter houses' ready for rental and cleaning after each use, trash removal of all the trash generated in the Parks and mowing all parks, overpasses, unimproved City owned properties, annexed cul-desacs and flood properties and snow removal from sidewalks on overpasses, bridges, Cityowned properties and Downtown sidewalks on Main St. from the Blanchard River to Lincoln St.

When time permits, our Parks crew assist other City Department with maintenance problems dealing with Construction, plumbing and electrical.

The Traffic Signal Department employs a supervisor, a Traffic Signal Electrician II, and a Traffic Signal Electrician Assistant II. We have 1 2016 Maintenance van, 1 2016 36' bucket truck, and a 2020 45' bucket truck.

2021 annual Maintenance

Annual maintenance consists of testing all intersection monitors for compliance of NEMA TS1 or TS2 standards monitors using a PCMT 8000 Conflict Monitor Tester. These testers are calibrated and certified once a year by the manufacturer. We inspect all intersection signals, cables, cabinets, poles, conduits, and equipment. We clean all lenses, equipment, and control cabinets. Check all intersections for the proper operation of pedestrian buttons, vehicle detection, controller timings, and power. We also inspect all flashers, beacons, and street light poles.

- 101 monitors in service were tested with no failures
- 32 spare or ready for use monitors were tested and all passed
- 95 intersections had overhead inspections done
- 95 intersections had cabinets cleaned and ground inspections done
- 18 flashers, beacons, crosswalks, and emergency vehicle signals were cleaned and inspected

Repaired minor problems found. Major repairs or equipment upgrades will be addressed in 2022.

Cemeterv

Maintenance responsibilities include:

- Perform cemetery work to include grave layouts, monument placements and burial operations.
- Perform office work to include grave sales, deed transfers, checking inquiries regarding grave availability and assisting funeral directors and memorial companies, as well as the general public with lot location and information.





- Keep accounting of private trust funds and prepare information needed to perform specific care and maintenance of private trust funds.
- Perform development work to include grading, seeding, building landscape beds and road construction.
- Perform grounds maintenance duties to include trash removal, shrub trimming and removal, planting trees and removal of dead trees, snow removal, grading, seeding and lawn chemical application.
- Equipment, vehicle, tractor and trailer repairs and service.

Forestry

Our crews maintain all trees in the city right of ways, Parks, Cemeteries and on other city owned properties. This year 124 trees were removed, our department removes what we safely can (120), then contract out the rest (4). We planted a total of 60 trees of varying varieties, 16






through the Neighbor-woods Program and 8 through Adopt a tree, the others were planted in the Cemetery and Parks.

We have three employees certified by the ACRT for line clearance. These employees are certified to trim at certain distances to the lower voltage lines. Our crews prune trees, to remove broken and/or hanging limbs or for clearance issues.




