Mayor Muryn – Blanchard Valley Port Authority appointment

Mayor Muryn is reappointing Paul Sears to the Blanchard Valley Port Authority. Mr. Sears has served as a joint City of Findlay/Hancock County appointment to the Port Authority since its inception in 2007. His appointment will be effective through June 30, 2028. <u>This appointment requires Council confirmation</u>.

City Engineer Kalb – CUBE building generator, project no. 31923000

The City of Findlay Administration is in the process of finalizing the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds that were allocated to the City of Findlay to ensure the funds will be used by the end of the year. The CUB building generator project previously had ARPA funds appropriated to the project in 2023. To complete the installation of the new generator and the automatic transfer switch, additional funds are needed to cover labor cost. A transfer of ARPA funds from the Sidewalk Improvement Program to the CUBE building generator to help offset some of the cost. This transfer of funds will leave five thousand dollars (\$5,000) of ARPA funds in the Sidewalk Improvement Program for usage on identified areas.

Legislation authorizing the Mayor, Service-Safety Director and/or City Engineer to enter into contracts and to appropriate and transfer funds is requested. <u>Ordinance No. 2024-084 was created</u>.

City Engineer Kalb – Emory Adams Fort Findlay Playground, project no. 31931200

The Fort Findlay Playground project has come to a point where playground equipment can be ordered. The new playground has a lead time for delivery of five to seven (5-7) months. The Fort Findlay project will be utilizing the remaining American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds that need allocated to a project and transferring leftover ARPA funds from the Parker Training/Restroom Remodel to help offset some of the cost. In order to receive this equipment in early winter for a spring 2024 build, the playground equipment will need to be ordered once the funds are appropriated to the project. This project will be utilizing a cooperative agreement through Sourcewell to complete the purchase from the equipment vendor. Legislation authorizing the Mayor, Service-Safety Director and/or City Engineer to enter into contracts, as well as appropriate and transfer funds is requested. <u>Ordinance No. 2024-085 was created</u>.

City Engineer Kalb – AIP-33 North Apron Rehab construction, project no. 35224000

Due to Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations, all construction projects withhold a ten percent (10%) payment until all closeout documents are submitted and accepted by the FAA. Depending on the workload of the FAA and the amount of closeout documents in the queue, this process could take up to a year for the City of Findlay to receive the final ten percent (10%) of the grant. The North Apron Rehab project was completed and accepted by the City in 2023 and are currently waiting on the FAA to approve the closeout documents. To ensure that the contractor is not being withheld money due to the long lead time by the FAA, the City desires to appropriate funds to the project to cover the final ten percent (10%) of the contract amount. Once the FAA accepts the closeout documents, the City will receive the grant funds and will be fully reimbursed for the amount that is being paid to the contractor at this time. Legislation appropriating and transferring fund is requested. Ordinance No. 2024-088 was created.

City Engineer Kalb – 5th Street alley sanitary sewer replacement, project no. 35644000

During the sewer lining project, a sanitary sewer in a grass alley off of 5th Street was found to be severely damaged and unable to be lined. After several attempts to clean and repair the pipe, it was determined that the whole line will need to be replaced. Due to the condition of the pipe, the City of Findlay reached out to three (3) local contractors to provide proposals so that the work could be completed in a timely manner. The City received two (2) proposals ranging from one hundred two thousand eight hundred eighty-two dollars and thirty-seven cents to one hundred sixty-five thousand two hundred twenty dollars and no cents (\$102,882.37-\$165,220.00). The lowest and best bid was received from Hohenbrink Excavating, LLC of Findlay, Ohio. Due to the condition of the pipe, the City would like to treat this sanitary sewer project as an emergency project and replace the sewer as soon as possible. Since the cost is over the seventy-five thousand dollar (\$75,000.00) threshold, it is requested to waive the formal advertising and bidding requirements for the project. Hohenbrink Excavating, LLC is currently working in the City of Findlay on the Small Waterline Project and will be able to start this sewer replacement project as soon as materials are obtained.

City Auditor Staschiak – Revenue Estimates for fiscal year 2025

Ohio clearly defines a budgetary process that includes the requirement that municipalities prepare an annual tax budget by July 20. The County Budget Commission has not required the filing of a complete tax budget for many years, but requires the City of Findlay to provide the attached estimated revenues for submission to the Budget Commission for the next fiscal year. In order to meet the statutory requirements for the distribution of local government money, this document should now be formally accepted by Council so that it can then be filed with the County Auditor no later than July 20, 2024. A motion for acceptance of the revenue estimates will be needed. As required by statute, a public hearing before tonight's 7/16/24 Regular Session City Council meeting was scheduled, notice of which was published ten (10) days before the hearing. The document has been available for public inspection in the City Auditor's Office since July 3, 2024. <u>City Auditor Staschiak requests that this letter be read into the record of the 7/16/24 Regular Session City Council meeting</u>.

CPC STAFF

General Information

This request is located in the Findlay Village Mall Subdivision on Tiffin Avenue next to the intersection with Cory Drive. It is zoned C-2 General Commercial. It is in a C-2 General Commercial area. It is not located within the 100-year flood plain. The City of Findlay Land Use Plan designates the area as Regional Commercial.

Parcel History

The site is currently parking for RP Home & Harvest of Findlay. GetGo had a similar gas station and convenience store site plan for the site that went through CPC in May 2023 (SP-10-2023).

Staff Analysis

Sheetz is proposing a 6,132 sf convenience store and gas station on this site. This would include 38 parking spots for the convenience store, which meets the standards. On the south side of the site is the 12-pump gas station. On the west side of the site, there is a dumpster enclosure area. This enclosure would use vinyl and brick, which matches the elevations of the building.

The site has two proposed new curb cuts. One is a full entrance onto Croy Drive, while the other is a right-in/right-out onto Tiffin Avenue. Staff would like to see the right-in/right-out changed into a fully dedicated dive-in lane to discourage people from being able to turn left out of the site.

In terms of landscaping, staff discussed with the applicant that the foundation plantings were not necessarily required along the building, but could be clustered around the perimeter. They have included landscaping along the east, north, and west sides of the lot. Staff appreciated the applicant's willingness to meet the number of required plantings for the site.

They have submitted to the BZA for two variances. One is a reduction of the front yard setback to be 7 feet from the front property line. This is in keeping with the setback of the Raising Cane's site to the west, so our staff is supportive of the request. The second is a reduction on the rear-yard setback to ten feet. Staff was supportive of the request as well.

Staff Recommendation

CPC Staff recommends approval of APPLICATION FOR SITE PLAN REVIEW #SP-11-2024 filed by Sheetz to construct a new gas station at the northwest intersection of Tiffin Avenue and Croy Drive with the following condition:

• Receive the variances for the 10-feet rear yard setback and the parking lot will be 7-feet from the front property line

ENGINEERING

Access -

Access to the site will be from two separate curb cuts. The first curb cut will be a full access drive off of Croy Drive, and the second drive will be a right in/ right out on the north side of Tiffin Avenue. During the construction of the drives (and the taps) the site contractor will need to provide an MOT plan to the Engineering Office for approval. Looking at the grading plan there are a couple of locations where the cross slope of the proposed sidewalk is over 2.0%, the sidewalk will need to be adjusted in the field prior to placement.

Water Service -

Site is proposing a 2-inch domestic tap to come off of the 12-inch mainline on the north side of Tiffin Avenue. The site is also proposing an irrigation system to be installed for the landscaping, the irrigation line will need to be a separate tap from the domestic line.

Sanitary Service -

The site is proposing a mainline tap on the sanitary line that is on the west site of Croy Drive. The grease interceptor will be inspected by the Health Department.

Stormwater Management --

Due to the site reducing the amount of impervious area, storm detention is not required. The site is proposing a water quality structure to be installed within the site.

MS4 Requirements -

The site is located within the City Limits and the site will disturb more than one (1) acre so the applicant will need to comply with the City of Findlay's Erosion & Sediment Control Ordinance.

Recommendations:

Approval of the Site Plan:

The following permits may be required prior to construction:

- Storm Sewer Tap x 1
- Curb Cut Permit x 2
- Sidewalk Permit x1
- Curb Cut/ Drive x2
- Water Taps x2
- Sanitary Sewer Tap x1

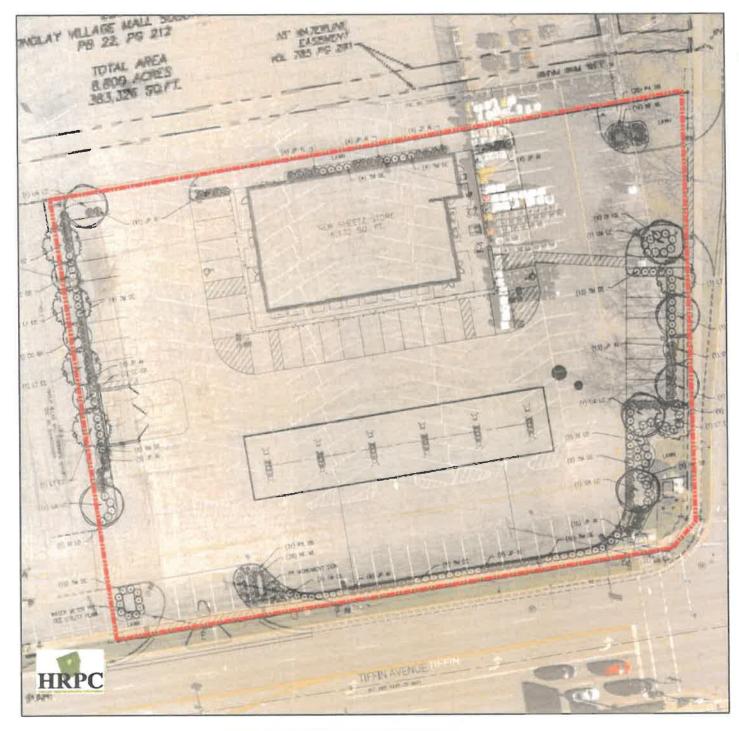

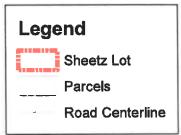

CPC STAFF

General Information

This request is located on the south side of Lima Avenue at the corner of Summit Street. This parcel is zoned C-1 Local Commercial. To the south, the neighborhood is zoned R-1 Large Lot residential. To the north, it is zoned R-3 Small Lot Residential. This location is not located within the 100-year floodplain. The City of Findlay Land Use Plan designates the area as Single-Family Small Lot.

Parcel History

The site was previously a dog grooming business.

Staff Analysis

The applicant has indicated they would like to operate a convenience store and have the residential unit available for an employee. The footprint of the building would not change, but they would be re-establishing the residential unit in the space.

Staff has concern about the intensity of the use. Going from a dog grooming business that only has a customer or two at a time, to a convenience store which could have multiple visitors at a time, can lead to disruption of the neighbor. The hours of operation would also increase the intensity of the use. There is a lack of screening on the site for the structure with the neighbors. Staff would note that two of the existing parking spaces would need to be used for the residential component, which could lead to congestion issues within the parking area.

Staff Recommendation

CPC Staff recommends denial of APPLICATION FOR CONDITIONAL USE #CU-10-2024 filed by HHNV LLC for a multi-use convenience store/apartment located at 1101 Summit Street.

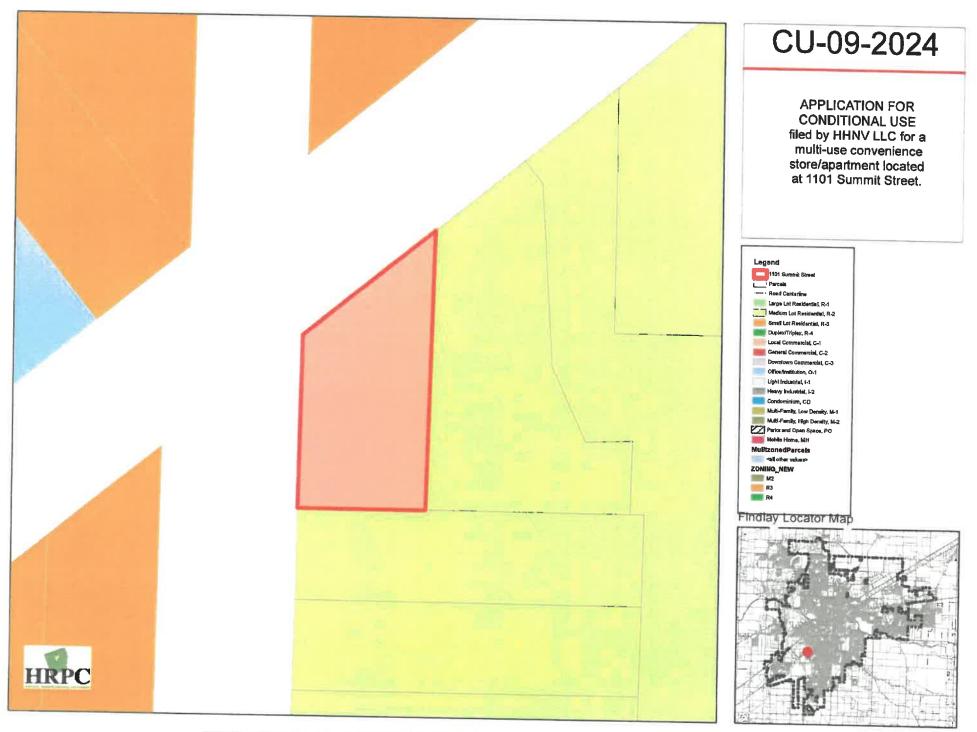

1. APPLICATION FOR SITE PLAN REVIEW #SP-06-2024 filed by Ron Siferd/Siferd Farms for a 94-unit condo development at the east end of Silver Creek Drive in Allen Township.

CPC STAFF

General Information

This site is located within Allen Township, but abuts the Findlay corporate boundary to the east. The parcel is not located within the 100-year floodplain. The City of Findlay Land Use Plan designates the area as Single-Family Large Lot.

Parcel History

The site is currently vacant land. This site originally returned to City Planning Commission for the March 14, 2024 meeting. It also went through a similar site plan review back in July 2021 (SP-16-2021). Since this project was reviewed in 2021, it has been determined that the CPC may not put any conditions on properties outside city limits that don't relate to water and sanitary sewer connections. The CPC may not apply their standards to any other portion of the project. This includes zoning and drainage standards. If the CPC wishes to apply their standards to properties using their water and sewer, the properties must be annexed into the City of Findlay.

Staff Analysis

The applicant has submitted a site plan that would have a 47 building, 94-unit condo development. When they originally went through site plan approval in 2021, they received approval with the following conditions:

A second point of access into the site is created from CR 99 (HRPC)
 Receive approval from the County Engineer for the access off Silver Creek

Drive (HRPC)

Begin the annexation process with the City of Findlay (HRPC)

Construction Plans approved by City Engineer's Office (Engineering)

Allow the northern boundary have a 10-foot setback to allow for the creation

of a riparian easement along the south and west boundary, the size of which can be addressed administratively with CPC staff

Phasing the development from east to west, with access from CR 99 first

Since the original submission in 2021, they have shifted the plans north to avoid the tree line on the south side of the site. They also established a clearing setback on the west and south side. The plans were tabled at the March 2024 meeting to give the applicant time to investigate whether the County would permit a curb cut permit on CR 99. They have submitted an exhibit of their driveway plan which shows they have been granted approval. The applicant is working on filing for annexation which has not yet begun with the County.

Regarding site plan details, the City Planning Commission has two options:

1. CPC can review the site plan and only comment on the water/sewer connections and give a determination based on that alone.

2. CPC can table the request until annexation is completed. Upon annexation, the applicant can resubmit and the CPC can review the site based on the City of Findlay Condominium District Standards.

Staff Recommendation

Staff recommends tabling APPLICATION FOR SITE PLAN REVIEW #SP-06-2024 filed by Ron Siferd/Siferd Farms for a 94-unit condo development at the east end of Silver Creek Drive in Allen Township until annexation is complete.

ENGINEERING

Access -

The development will be accessed from a new roadway that will be extended to the east from the existing stub on Silver Creek Drive. Silver Creek Drive will be extended to the east side of the power lines and will then split into Loop Drive. For safety personnel, Engineering would like to see a second drive access to the site.

Water Service -

The proposed plans show an 8" waterline being extended with Silver Creek Drive and Loop Drive. The waterline will be placed on the north side of Silver Creek and on the outside of Loop Drive. With the configuration of the buildings there will be a two water meters installed at each building (one for each condo). The installation will be a TBR through the City of Findlay Engineering Office. There are a couple of comments on the construction plans that Engineering will work out with the Developer/ Engineer before construction starts.

Sanitary Service -

The proposed plans show two separate runs for the sanitary sewer. On Silver Creek Drive there will be an 8-inch sanitary sewer installed on the south side of the roadway, and a separate 8-inch sanitary sewer will run on the inside of Loop Drive. Each of the sanitary sewer mainlines will tap into existing manholes that are within the sanitary easement. Due to the drop distance that are shown in the profile, each of the tie-ins at the existing manholes will require an outside drop. The installation of the sanitary sewer will be a TBR through the City of Findlay Engineering office.

Stormwater Management -

The site is not located within the City of Findlay so any approval for stormwater and detention would need to come from Hancock County Engineers.

MS4 Requirements -

The site is outside of City Limits so the applicant will not need to comply with the City of Findlay's Erosion & Sediment Control Ordinance. Applicant should contact the Hancock County Engineer's office for their requirements.

Recommendations:

Conditional Approval of the Site Plan:

Construction plans are approved by the Engineering Office.

The following permits may be required prior to construction:

- Water Tap Permit x 1
- Water Service Connections x 94
- Sanitary Mainline Tap Permit x 2

DISCUSSION

Jeremy Kalb claimed he worked with the developers to rework some of the water lines and add a north driveway. Erosion and sediment control would be discussed at a later time, preferably after annexation into the city.

Mayor Muryn expressed a desire to discuss the application with the developers before motioning to table. She invited Todd Jenkins and Ron Seifert to speak.

Mr. Jenkins claimed that his team had complied with the city every step of the way, and expressed that his client, Ron Seifert, was worried that unexpected issues would delay construction even after annexation is approved. Mr. Jenkins suggests a conditional approval before annexation so that he and his client shall have some assurance that construction could begin as soon as the plat is annexed.

Rob Martin thanked the development team for adding a secondary access point off of Route 99, recognizing that it was not an "easy feat."

Deborah Rollins, a homeowner adjacent to the new development, was worried the water line below her property would be used to serve the new neighborhood. Jeremy Kalb assured her that other lines would be used. Ms. Rollins also inquired about a possible roadway extension across Route 99, to which Mr. Kalb responded that there are no current plans to do so.

CPC STAFF

General Information

This request is located at the southeast intersection of State Route 12 and County Road 9 in Liberty Township. It is not located within the 100-year floodplain. The City of Findlay Land Use Plan designates the area as Single-Family Large Lot.

Parcel History

The site is currently vacant land.

Staff Analysis

The proposed plat would subdivide this area into forty-six parcels. There would be an extension of Monto Lane and Eisenbrant Avenue to connect to Wagner Way. This would be completed in three phases. Since the plat is consistent with the Findlay Land Use Plan and is in keeping with the development in the area, staff had no concerns with the request.

DISCUSSION

Matt Cordonnier addressed that this application was unique in that the site being developed is outside of city limits, and therefore the only items that will be discussed revolve around the use of city utilities. He also reminded the audience when and where further meetings for this application would take place.

Gwen Osbourne, a Dold resident since 2007, expressed concerns about the removal of open fields adjacent to her neighborhood, citing a 2008 flood that damaged many of her and her neighbors' homes. Dan Stone detailed many of the new overflow systems, which he described as meeting a higher standard than the systems present during the aforementioned 2008 flood.

CPC STAFF

General Information

This request is located on the west side of Timberstone Drive, just west of County Road 236. To the south, it is zoned C-2 General Commercial. There is an apartment complex down the private

street called Milestone Drive. To the north it is zoned R-2 Medium Lot Residential. This location is not located within the 100-year floodplain. The City of Findlay Land Use Plan designates the area as Regional Commercial.

Parcel History

The site is currently vacant along with a parking lot for Ashley Furniture.

Staff Analysis

This request is to subdivide the existing 13.745-acre parcel, Lot 73 of the subdivision, into seven lots. This would allow the developer to more easily begin to develop the remainder of the site. As part of the replat, they would dedicate their section of Milestone Drive, which was previously only a private street.

While the street dedication makes it easier for the interior lots to get the required road frontage in the C-2 District, Lot 79 was landlocked as part of the plat. To help combat issues, they have indicated that there will be an access agreement from Lot 79 to Milestone Drive. They also show 40' access easements at the existing curb cuts on lots 82 and 83. These access agreements will need to be recorded along with the final plat. Some lots are relatively small and adding the additional frontage may make redeveloping some lots, such as Lot 83 at the southeast corner, more difficult to develop in the future.

Staff Recommendation

CPC Staff recommends approval of **APPLICATION FOR FINAL PLAT filed by Pneuman Properties LLC c/o with Joe Built Homes, for the replat of Covington Green subdivision** with the following condition:

• Record the access easements with the Final Plat

ENGINEERING

• Would like to see the roadway be dedicated all the way to Milestone Drive. Right now there is a gap between the two Public Right of Ways.

DISCUSSION

Jeremy Kalb expressed concern over a current right-of-way that acts as an access to the proposed development, which features a sharp curve that would be difficult to maintain in poor weather

conditions. Dan Stone was open to absorbing the public land as a private access. However, a section of the right-of-way fell under the property lines of a third party, who would need to be contacted to finalize any maintenance agreement.

Rob Martin was curious about whether any pedestrian access was being considered. Dan Stone replied that this was not planned on, but that the board would have future opportunities to expand the sidewalk system off of Route 236.

Monica Kello, a nearby resident, questioned the accuracy of the map being presented to the audience. Discussion with the staff and CPC members eventually helped to reorient her as there was no discernable issue with the map itself, being a satellite image.

This request is located at the north end of Tappan Street. The end of this right-of-way ends at the I-75 right-of-way. This location is partially located within the 100-year floodplain.

Staff Analysis

This request is an unimproved right-of-way north of Lagrange Street. The applicant is the only property owner on either side of the request, along with the City of Findlay. There are no utilities in this right-of-way and the City of Findlay would still have access to their pond from Lagrange Street. Staff had no concerns with the request.

Staff Recommendation

CPC Staff recommends approval of APPLICATION FOR ALLEY VACATION #AV-03-2024 filed by Ron King to vacate a fifty-two and ½ foot (52.5') wide unimproved right-of-way of Tappan Street from the north right-of-way of LaGrange Street.

DISCUSSION

Kim Meter, a nearby resident, criticized the lots surrounding the right-of-way, describing them as an "eyesore," and hoped that the city would require a certain amount of maintenance by the property owner and applicant, Ron King. Mayor Muryn, along with staff, claimed that the three parcels in question would not require maintenance by the property owner, as they were all zoned light industrial.

Jackie McGee, another resident, shared the same concerns about appearance, calling the property "overgrown" and "disgusting," while also challenging the utility of an alley vacation, explaining that the current right-of-way "doesn't really go anywhere." When Mayor Muryn again clarified that the city would not be able to mandate sufficient maintenance, McGee claimed that the city would treat a homeowner differently than Ron King and his company.

Kerry Trombley questioned where access points are and would be located for all three parcels owned by Ron King. It was discovered that there was access to the eastern-most parcel from nearby Morrical Boulevard, and the issue was dropped.

CPC STAFF

General Information

This request is located on the east side of Leiser Avenue, between 2nd and 3rd Streets. It is located within the 100-year floodplain.

Staff Analysis

This unimproved right-of-way is one of the only remaining platted alleys in this neighborhood. There was a north-south right-of-way that would have connected to the east end of this request, but it was vacated in 1995. The right-of-way that ran parallel to the north of this alley was partially vacated during that request.

While this is an unimproved right-of-way, and there are no utilities in this stretch, staff would recommend that they either deny the request for partial vacation or request that the full right-of-way be vacated.

Staff Recommendation

CPC Staff recommends denial of **APPLICATION FOR ALLEY VACATION** #AV-04-2024 filed by Melinda Speck to vacate the west one hundred sixty-one and ¾ feet (161.75') of the east-west alley on the east side of Leiser Avenue between 2nd Street and 3rd Street

DISCUSSION

Erik Adkins was curious why the applicant, Melinda Speck, could not build her dog a fence without vacating a portion of the right-of-way. Speck replied that she wanted to butt her new fence up against her northern neighbor's fence to save money. The northern neighbor, Jeremy McCauley, agreed to connect his fence to Speck's.

CPC Staff recommended denial as the applicant applied for a partial vacation. Rob Martin wondered why the commission could not go ahead and vacate the entirety of the right-of-way. Matt Cordonnier replied that it is against practice to vacate land when an adjacent property owner is against the vacation.

The dissenting property owner in question, Mark Short, uses the right-of-way to access a nearby neighbor's cabin, whom he had a handshake agreement with to use, along a pond, which he claimed his grandmother once owned.

General Information

This request is located on the south side of W. Main Cross Street, just to the east of the interchange with I-75. This parcel is zoned C-2 General Commercial. It is in a neighborhood of C-2 General Commercial and O-1 Office/Institution. Across the street is the cemetery which is zoned PO Parks and Open Space.

Parcel History

This site is currently the Bell's Car Wash that is a part of the Marathon Gas Station services at 1215 W. Main Cross Street.

Staff Analysis

The applicant has indicated they intend to install 12 charging stations along the west side of the car wash building. These spaces currently exist, and they will be adding the charging components to the site. The plan shows them adding a pad mounted utility transformer for the system on the west side of the drive aisle in an existing landscape island. They would install bollards to help protect this component. Staff did not have any concerns on the location.

Prior to receiving permits, the applicant will need to work with the Floodplain Administrator Erik Adkins to make sure they have a documentation that the site is no longer in the 100-year floodplain.

Given that the plans for these spots are not interrupting the current parking plans for the site, and given the proximity to the interchange, the request for conditional use is appropriate for the site.

Staff Recommendation

CPC Staff recommends approval of APPLICATION FOR CONDITIONAL USE #CU-07-2024 filed by Tesla Inc., to install an electric charging station at the 1215 W. Main Cross Street with

the following condition:

<u>CPC STAFF</u> General Information

This request is located on the east side of N. Main Street between Lester Avenue and Rector Avenue. It is surrounded by a neighborhood of R-3 Small Lot Residential. This location is not located within the 100-year floodplain. The City of Findlay Land Use Plan designates the parcel as Single-Family Small Lot.

Parcel History

The site is currently vacant after the City Mission acquired the site from the Family Resource Center in early 2024.

Staff Analysis

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The applicant has indicated they intend to renovate the space into an emergency shelter for women and children. This would help them accommodate more people as they have overflow at their downtown campus. They have submitted a floorplan that shows that they would renovate 9 rooms on the first floor as bedrooms. They would also like to renovate a second-floor space in a second phase, that would house an on-site staff member and provide an additional 9 more rooms.

There is an existing parking lot on the south side of the building and in the rear. This can accommodate 15 vehicles. There is an existing fence along the north side of the property, which screens the parking lot are rear from the neighbor to the north. This will help protect the surrounding neighborhood from an increase in activity. Staff would add that Conditional Use permits are revocable if there are any issues with this use in the future.

Staff Recommendation

CPC Staff recommends approval of APPLICATION FOR CONDITIONAL USE #CU-08-2024 filed by the City Mission of Findlay for an emergency shelter for women and children to be located at 1918 N. Main Street.

Rob Martin began by relaying the need for low-barrier housing in the city to support the unhoused.

Dan Clinger asked if there were any plans submitted by the applicants for renovations. Jacob Mercer clarified that submission of renovation plans are not usually required for conditional use permits, but also stated that the applicants have discussed various ideas, including new kitchens, living spaces, and bedrooms for staff members to be present full-time.

Mayor Muryn supported the idea of a conditional use permit, which would give the city more control if the shelter caused any issues.

CPC STAFF

General Information

This request is located on the east side of Hamlet Drive, just south of CR 212. This parcel is zoned l-1 Light Industrial. It is in an area of l-1 Light Industrial. This parcel is not located within the 100-year floodplain. The City of Findlay Land Use Plan designates this parcel as Light Industrial.

Parcel History

The site is vacant.

Staff Analysis

The applicant has indicated they would like to combine the three lots into one site for a new 207,904 sf warehouse. This would include 22 truck docks on the rear of the property. This facility will mostly be storage. They have provided 18 parking spots, with 2 being handicap accessible. This would accommodate 16 employees during peak shift.

There is an existing roadside ditch that is north of the proposed building. This will remain and be the overflow outlet for a new retention pond at the north of the site.

The building meets all the setbacks and height requirements for the I-1 district. The applicant has indicated they will install 12 trees along Hamlet Drive as part of their landscaping. It is in the City right-of-way, and has been discussed with the City Engineer. If at any point the trees need to be removed for the City to do maintenance in the right-of-way, the owner is required to replace the trees. At the rear of the property, they have provided some river rock to help address the slope with the neighboring property.

The site also slopes towards the north end. This means that the foundation at the south end will be underground but will become exposed as you move north on the site. Elevations were

included in the application for review.

Staff Recommendation

CPC Staff recommends approval of APPLICATION FOR SITE PLAN REVIEW #SP-09-2024 filed by Ohio Logistics to construct a new warehouse on lots 1-3 of the Invision Place Subdivision along Hamlet Drive.

ENGINEERING

Access -

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Access to the site will be from two new drive approaches off of Hamlet Drive. The site is proposing to have one drive at the north of the site and one at the south end.

Water Service -

The proposed plans show an 8" waterline to loop around the building and make two taps onto the 20-inch main line that is on the west side of Hamlet Drive. On the east side of the building the 2-inch domestic and 6-inch fire line will come off of this 8-inch loop. On the 6-inch fire line that is going into the building a 6-inch gate valve will need to be installed on the line before it goes into the building. The same will need to be done for the 2-inch domestic line.

Sanitary Service -

The proposed plans show a new sanitary sewer to be extended from the east. The new line will be running in an easement so it is assumed the sanitary sewer will be a public sewer. If this is going to be a public sewer there are a couple of things that will need revised.

- At SAN MH No.4 the line is pretty shallow so I would like to see that pushed a little lower so it does not freeze. It looks like the line can be flatten out to push the sewer deeper.
- Due to the shallow depths at MH No. 3 and No.4 the sanitary manholes will need to be Type G manholes.

Stormwater Management -

The site consultant has sent in stormwater retention calculations and they comply with the City's Standards. The site is proposing to install a new retention pond to be located on the north side of the site.

MS4 Requirements -

The site is located within the City Limits and the site will disturb more than one (1) acre so the applicant will need to comply with the City of Findlay's Erosion & Sediment Control Ordinance.

Recommendations:

Approval of the Site Plan:

Kerry Trombley was curious about outdoor lighting, as he did not see any on the submitted plans. Mr. Stone informed him of all the locations where outdoor lighting will be present.

Rob Martin was worried about truck traffic, and asked Mr. Stone if the business would be a 24hour operation. Stone responded that the warehouse would not be open 24 hours, and that any trucks arriving late would be outliers.

Matt Cordonnier voiced the support of the applicant, who was not present for the meeting, for the widening of County Road 99, citing its importance "for the community."

This request is located at the northeast corner of the YMCA campus, at the intersection of Hardin Street and Grand Avenue. It is zoned C-3 Downtown Commercial. It is in an area that is a mix

of C-3 Downtown Commercial, R-3 Small Lot Residential, and M-2 Multi-Family, High Density. It is not located within the 100-year floodplain.

Parcel History

The site is currently vacant after the YMCA acquired the site and removed the existing structures.

Staff Analysis

The applicant this is the first phase of a multi-phase development to redevelop the YMCA campus. This phase would see the completion of a new Early Learning Center. This would include a new parking area with a temporary curb cut on E. Hardin Street. There is currently a curb cut that is abutting the church parking lot. This would be widened to provide easier turn access into the parking lot.

The C-3 district does not have any setback requirements, so no front or side yard is required. There is a requirement that the building be at least a minimum of 60% of the lot width, which the project will meet after completion of the second phase.

The applicant has provided adequate landscaping to meet the C-3 Parking Lot Screening standards. The parking lot is screened by a combination of street trees and a line of shrubs at the north end of the parking lot.

The applicant submitted elevations for the new structure. It uses a variety of materials and provides both vertical and horizontal articulation. Since the site is located in the Downtown Design Review District, they will need to receive a Certificate of Appropriateness from the Board regarding the aesthetic and materials for the project.

Staff Recommendation

CPC Staff recommends approval of **APPLICATION FOR SITE PLAN REVIEW #SP-10-**2024 filed by Young Men's Christian Association, for a redevelopment of the Findlay YMCA at 300 E. Lincoln Street with the following condition:

• Receive approval from the Downtown Design Review Board.

ENGINEERING

Access -

The development will be accessed from a new roadway that will be extended to the east from the existing stub on Silver Creek Drive. Silver Creek Drive will be extended to the east side of the power lines and will then split into Loop Drive. For safety personnel, Engineering would like to see a second drive access to the site.

Water Service -

Did not see any water service proposed on the plans. Assuming water service and fire suppression will be needed, so Engineering will review the revised plans when received.

Sanitary Service -

Did not see any sanitary sewer proposed on the plans. Assuming sewer will be needed, so

Engineering will review the revised plans when received.

Stormwater Management -

Engineering is working with the consultant to finalize the stormwater detention design and outlets. The City is currently evaluating some storm lines that are expected to be used as storm outlets to ensure they have enough capacity.

MS4 Requirements –

The site is located within the City Limits and the site will disturb more than one (1) acre so the applicant will need to comply with the City of Findlay's Erosion & Sediment Control Ordinance.

Recommendations:

Conditional Approval of the Site Plan:

- Construction plans are approved by the Engineering Office.
- Second Roadway access for the development

The following permits may be required prior to construction:

- Storm Sewer Tap x 2
- Curb Cut Permit x 2
- Sidewalk Permit x1
- Water Taps?
- Sanitary Sewer Taps

FIRE PREVENTION

Obtain all required permits before construction and inspection during construction

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval of APPLICATION FOR SITE PLAN REVIEW #SP-10-2024 filed by Young Men's Christian Association, for a redevelopment of the Findlay YMCA at 300 E. Lincoln Street.

DISCUSSION

Kerry Trombley asked Brent Gies who was representing the architecture firm for the project, when construction was slated to begin, to which Mr. Gies responded that construction for the structure in question was hoped to begin in late July or early August, and should last for about 18 months.

Mayor Muryn hoped that street lights would be installed around the new development, preferably the same models that are used elsewhere downtown. Brent Gies claimed that he had already reached out to Marathon, who neighbors the property to the west, about replicating the street lights they use on their campus to keep continuity in the area.

Jackie Schroeder wondered if the proposed bus drop-off lane would be permanent, to which Mr. Gies responded that it would be, though, it would be placed in a spot that was not as bothersome to homeowners nearby.

Trombley wondered about the capacity of the new structure. Carrie Redman, a YMCA rep., responded that the maximum capacity would be 320 children, with an aim to keep that number around 286.

Michael Tharp, a nearby resident and representative of the neighborhood's interests, had a number of worries. First, he asked what measures were being taken to ensure a strong enough sewer system to support such a large building, the locals, and any floods events. Mayor Muryn ensured Mr. Tharp that recent projects involving sewer systems have had positive outcomes relating to flood capacity. Brent Gies also displayed a plan for a large underground detention area for stormwater, which should help prevent flooding of properties.

Second, Mr. Tharp hoped for professional landscaping and comfortable lighting. Mayor Muryn promised greenery, trees, and that any lighting installed would not overwhelm residents. She claimed a photometric plan would be submitted and they would conduct tests to ensure it satisfies residents.

Third, Mr. Tharp took issue with the use of East Hardin Street as a temporary access road to the new structure, worried about collisions and disturbances to nearby residents.

Mayor Muryn encouraged the developers to keep an ample amount of green space between the structure and the right-of-way. Mr. Gies stated that the current plans have a 16-ft setback, similar to that of the former houses on the site.

OLD BUSINESS

 Request of Dustin Rice, 1310 Amelia Avenue, for solutions to persistent speeding on Amelia Street.

4/15/2024

Rice stated that motorists going high rates of speed on Amelia Avenue south of Blanchard Avenue has been ongoing since 2017 when he moved there. When the speed trailers are brought out, motorists slow down and when they are removed. motorists speed back up. Rice understands that the City does not allow speed bumps in the roadway. In reference to the suggestion of a three-way stop at Amelia Avenue and Fourth Street, Director Martin explained that the science behind placing stop signs is that you put stop signs in for maneuverability, not to slow traffic. Human nature is to have a tendency to speed up between stop signs or miss them completely, and it gives the pedestrian a sense of false security. Kalb stated other options are narrowing concepts to slow traffic, but concerned about how wide the street currently is and do not want to narrow too much and cause head on collisions. Director Martin stated that the City has been working through all the scenarios to try to come up with a solution. Kalb stated that traffic coming off of Blanchard Avenue have an easy turn onto Amelia and do not have to slow down as much and can get back up to speed much quicker. He suggested that a slight reconfiguration of the Blanchard Avenue/Amelia Avenue intersection to tighten up the radius to make traffic turn at a sharper degree than what is currently there may help to slow traffic coming off of Blanchard Avenue. Chief Mathias suggested to periodically post the speed trailers. Rice stated that the Police Department is welcome to park in his driveway to monitor traffic. Copus stated they can attach the small radar collection sign to a signpost to collect data rather than use the large trailers. The radar will run one week without displaying speed, but will collect data, and then run one week displaying the speed while continuing to collect data. Kalb stated that this data will help support a decision to place stop signs.

Motion to post radar collection unit to collect speed data for two weeks, evaluate curb bump out options on Amelia and Blanchard, and table request until data is evaluated, by Director Martin, second by Councilman Bauman. Motion passed 5-0.

06/17/2024

Director Martin reviewed the speed data results from the radar collection unit. He stated there a couple outliers, but the majority of motorists are complying with the speed limit. These results do not warrant a stop sign. Kalb stated that he attended a seminar regarding traffic calming measures on residential roads. Suggestions from the seminar include putting a curve in the road creating choke points or installing a mini roundabout. Kalb stated that due to the results of the radar collection, he recommends to not place stop signs, but get feedback from the residents on the street for traffic calming solutions. He stated that the City will send out letters to all residents on the street to get feedback. He further stated that there is a decent amount of right-of-way to work with and no truck traffic to contend with. Engineering Department will work with the neighborhood for solutions.

NEW BUSINESS

1. Request of Natalie Weigers for a No Truck signs on W. Melrose Avenue at North Main Street and at Broad Avenue.

Chief Mathias stated that truck traffic is a real concern on W. Melrose Ave. during the week during the daytime. There is a No Truck sign at Trenton Ave. and Broad Ave. but not Bigelow Ave. and Broad Ave. Director Martin stated that W. Melrose is clearly residential and not built for heavy truck traffic. Kalb agreed that this should not be a truck route.

Motion to install No Truck signs on W. Melrose Ave. at N. Main St. and at Broad Ave., by Chief Eberle, second by Kalb. Motion passed 4-0.

 Request of Emily Haag and Gary Schultz for a traffic signal at the intersection of East Sandusky Street and Fishlock Avenue.

Emily Haag stated that the intersection of East Sandusky Street and Fishlock Avenue is a real bad intersection especially in the morning and evening trying to turn off Fishlock Ave. onto E. Sandusky St. During events at the fairgrounds, they place a large sign at this intersection and it is hard to see around. Gary Schultz stated that the issue is more prevalent during rush hour. Motorists have to drive out into the crosswalk in order to see to turn left onto E. Sandusky St. Schultz also stated that it is also difficult to turn left onto Fishlock Ave. off E. Sandusky St. There is also an issue with bicyclists trying to cross E. Sandusky St. to get to the north side that has sidewalks out to Bright Road to get to the Greenway Trail. There is no place to safely cross E. Sandusky St. except at Osborn.

Director Martin stated that he had Police Chief Mathias pull a report of accidents from 2019 to present. From this time period there have been five accidents, one accident per year at this intersection. Chief Mathias stated that one accident was property damage only, two were possible nonvisible injuries, and two were minor visible injuries. Chief Mathias further stated that three of them were rear ended from folks stopping to turn and the others were thone accidents. Chief Eberle stated that he personally dislikes this intersection and tries to avoid it. In theory he is not opposed to the traffic signal idea. However, having two traffic signals in close proximity is problematic as well. Kalb stated that the results of the traffic counts, the State Route 568 numbers went up and the Fishlock Avenue numbers went down. Based on the traffic study, this intersection does not meet the warrant for a traffic signal.

The intersection was rated at a level of service of D in the peak hours. It is expected in 2046, it will worsen to an E. From the study that was completed in 2021, it was suggested not to put a traffic signal at this intersection because of the coordination in that corridor that it will impede the traffic of State Route 568 coming through there. Kalb stated that with an intersection study, you have to track counts for every hour, turning movement for every hour, etc. Kalb stated that the 2021 study is still within standards. Kalb stated that we can get straight traffic counts to make sure the Ohio Department of Transportation's (ODOT) numbers are accurate. ODOT does traffic counts each year on State Route 568/E. Sandusky St. and Fishlock Ave.

Kalb stated that we cannot install a traffic signal where it is not warranted. This would be a liability for the City. There isn't enough turning movements coming into a major highway to warrant a signal. Director Martin inquired if reducing the speed limit to 25 MPH through that area would help. Kalb stated that the best thing is to install a turn lane, but there isn't enough right-of-way. Kalb stated that he has to follow the Ohio Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) and follow the data. Kalb stated that he is not sure why the traffic signal at Osborn was installed. It is not warranted. It would cause an adverse effect if it was removed though.

Chief Eberle and Director Martin both stated concerns about pedestrian crossing E. Sandusky St. Kalb stated that with the funds the City has through ARPA for a sidewalk program, one of the areas that the City is looking at is to extend sidewalks on the south side of E. Sandusky Street to Hunters Creek Drive and adding a rapid flashing beacon (RFB) signaled crosswalk across E. Sandusky Street.

Kalb stated that a traffic signal at E. Sandusky St. and Fishlock is not the solution, not sure what is. Chief Eberle stated that it is not an easy solution.

Motion to deny request for a traffic signal at the intersection of East Sandusky Street and Fishlock Avenue at this time, by Kalb, second by Director Martin. Motion passed 4-0.

Director Martin stated that the City will continue to evaluate this intersection. Haag also requested that the City direct the Hancock County Fairgrounds to change the placement of their directional parking sign during the Fair and other events held at the fairgrounds that is placed on the southwest corner of E. Sandusky St. and Fishlock Ave. Kalb stated that if it is in the intersection sight distance, the City can require them to move it. Schultz also stated that after events at the fairgrounds, the Hancock County Sheriff's deputies are directing traffic out of the Sandusky St. exit and holding up traffic on Sandusky St. for the fairgrounds traffic to exit. He is requesting that they close that exit and have fairgrounds traffic exit at a different location.

3. Request of Marge Warner for a Dead End sign on the south side of Garfield Street at the alley just west of the railroad.

There is a No Outlet sign at Myrtle and Garfield St. Copus stated that there is not a lot of room for signage on the south side of Garfield Street at the alley just west of the railroad due to the sidewalk and driveway. Directing motorists down the alley is not ideal. It was suggested to replace the No Outlet sign with a Dead End sign. Kalb stated that per the MUTCD a Dead End sign needs to be placed within 100 feet of the end of the roadway, so cannot replace the No Outlet sign at Garfield and Myrtle with a Dead End sign. Suggestion to place on the guardrail at the end of the roadway or on the electric pole at the alley.

Motion to install Dead End sign at the end of Garfield Street at the alley just west of the railroad or on the guardrail at the end of the roadway as long as it adheres to all Ohio Manual Uniform Traffic Control Devices regulations, by Chief Eberle, second by Director Martin. Motion passed 4-0.

4. Request to review pedestrian crossing at Lima Avenue and Goodyear Tire to determine if current counts warrant a signal.

Kalb stated that the current pedestrian counts do not warrant a traffic signal at the crosswalk, however, vehicle counts do warrant a crosswalk. Kalb stated that if we remove the traffic signal, we will still need to have a crosswalk, one similar to what is at County Road 236 with the flashing lights around a Yield to Pedestrian in Crosswalk sign, due to vehicle count. Pedestrian and vehicle count will determine the level of pedestrian crossing treatment.

Motion to table request until able to obtain vehicular counts, by Director Martin, second by Kalb. Motion passed 4-0.

OTHER BUSINESS

Dan Delong stated that he sent an email regarding installation of signs regarding illegal panhandling where illegal activity is occurring. Most of the locations that this is occurring is on private property. He provided a photo of a sign in Indianapolis that states "Do not contribute to illegal panhandling Call IMPD 317-327-3811 to report". He stated at times it is disconcerting, it causes people to slow down. At times the individuals get a little aggressive asking for money. Walmart on Trenton Avenue is one of the locations it is occurring. Director Martin asked the Commission members if this is a sign that we want to consider posting or reach out to property owners to post. Will add to agenda for next meeting for further discussion and consideration.

With no further business to discuss, the meeting adjourned. The next meeting of the City of Findlay Traffic Commission will be held on July 15, 2024 at 2:30 p.m. in the third floor conference room of the Municipal Building.

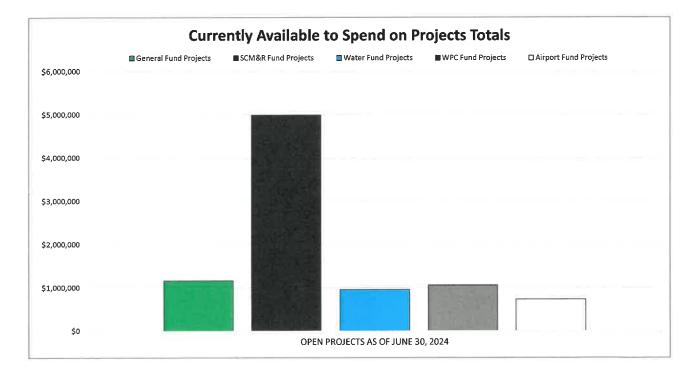

Due to Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations all construction projects withhold a 10% payment until all close out documents are submitted and accepted by the FAA. Depending on the workload of the FAA, and the amount of close out documents in the queue, this process could take up to a year for the City to receive the final 10% of the grant.

The North Apron Rehab project was completed and accepted by the City in 2023 and we are currently waiting on the FAA to approve the close out documents. To ensure that our contractor is not being withheld money due to the long lead time from the FAA, it is desired to appropriate funds to the project to cover the final 10% of the contract amount. Once the FAA accepts the closeout documents the City will receive the grant funds and will be fully reimbursed for the amount that is being paid to the contractor at this time.

During the sewer lining project, a sanitary sewer in a grass alley off of 5th was found to be severely damaged and unable to be lined. After several attempts to clean and repair the pipe it was determined that the whole line will need to be replaced. Due to the condition of the pipe, it was determined to reach out to three local contractors to provide proposals so that the work could be completed in a timely manner. The City received two proposals back, ranging from \$102,882.37 to \$165,220. The lowest and best price was received from Hohenbrink Excavating, LLC of Findlay, Ohio.

Due to the condition of the pipe, it is desired to treat this sanitary sewer as an emergency project and replace the sewer as soon as possible. Since the cost proposal is over the \$75,000 threshold, it is requested to waive the formal advertising and bidding requirements for the project. Hohenbrink Excavating is currently working in the City on the Small Waterline Project, and will be able to start the sewer replacement project as soon as material is obtained.

The document has been available for public inspection in my office since July 3rd of this year.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A TWELVE (12) MONTH MORATORIUM ON THE ESTABLISHMENT OF ANY CULTIVATION, PROCESSING, OR DISPENSING OF RECREATIONAL MARIJUANA FACILITIES IN THE CITY OF FINDLAY IN ORDER FOR THE CITY OF FINDLAY, OHIO TO CONSIDER THE RAMIFICATIONS OF RECREATIONAL MARIJUANA AND POTENTIAL ZONING CHANGES THAT MAY BE CONSIDERED, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City Administration is desirous of implementing a twelve (12) month moratorium on the establishment of any cultivation, processing, or dispensing of a recreational marijuana facility before potentially amending the Zoning Code Ordinance and enacting it as part of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Findlay, Ohio, and;

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Findlay, Ohio deems it prudent and necessary to authorize a said twelve (12) month moratorium as earlier defined, and;

WHEREAS, the State of Ohio Legislature is still determining the rules and regulations of recreational marijuana dispensing.

SECTION 2: That the aforementioned definitions of a moratorium be and the same are hereby established for twelve (12) months while the City of Findlay determines the best course of action.
