

Recreation Department Annual Report 2009

General Overview

The Recreation Department found its way through yet another re-organization in 2009. In order to save tax dollars we decided first to scrutinize every aspect of each program in order to reduce costs but continue to deliver great programs and opportunities for the members of our community.

We re-identified and re-evaluated all full-time and seasonal employees and emphasized their strengths to better align all staff members with the programs we offer. It was determined to implement a combination of furlough days and reduced working schedules, along with other cost-cutting measures to reduce overall spending for all areas of Recreation.

Also, instead of hiring a pool manager for 2009, our inventory and registration controller, Kristine Greer stepped up to the plate to fill that vacancy.

Due to our local economy, we lost two full-time employees the first week of November 2009.

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Summer Day Camp:

119 students attended the 2009, 8-week session of Camp Hi-Ho O-H-I-O at Riverside Park. Camp Hi-Ho-O-H-I-O received a grant that provided bus transportation (Findlay City School bus) from camp to Glenwood Middle School for free lunches. The buses would then return campers to Riverside Park, where participants enjoyed theme weeks, games, speakers, and swimming at Riverside Pool.

Camp Hi-HO-O-H-I-O also, experienced a reduction in costs due to shortened camp week and assigning Nicole Flugga, Marketing and Special Events, to oversee day to day operations of camp.

Riverside Pool and Concessions

Even with our local economy Riverside Pool opened in 2009, with both a shortened week and reduced daily operating hours. It has been noted that 2009 was one of the coolest summers on record. 2009 was our third year to provide a concession area at the pool.

Returning in 2009 at the pool/park, we hosted the following special events:

In 2009 we were unable to offer city employee discounts or to sell season memberships, however we continued the use of the admission bracelets. They have become a useful tool for monitoring admissions.

Thanks to the generosity of the Hancock Park District, the pool/park was awarded a grant to cover the cost of police security. As in past years, this has proven to be a much needed and welcomed addition to Recreation's daily operations. Loitering and horseplay were kept to a minimum, with our zero tolerance policy in place.

The Recreation Department staff continued total operations of the pool in 2009. The Parks Department prepared the pool for opening and assisted in closing the pool in the fall.

A safety – evacuation plan was implemented for Riverside Pool and Park.

<u>PROGRAMS, SERVICES AND FACILITIES</u> Department Programs -- directly administered by the Recreation Department

Adult Slow Pitch Softball: After reviewing the Adult softball program from previous years, we audited The program and made some much needed changes, which proved to be beneficial to the program and to the Recreation Department. In 2009, we found that due to a ditch project that ran through the outfield of Riverside Park ball field it would be unusable for the season. Normally, it is a very busy field, used by Findlay City Women's' Softball, Young Miss Softball, Findlay Church Softball League and Findlay Men's' Fall Fast pitch Softball League, as well as other events.

Riverside Park Softball field also, has lights, so **games** had to be **moved to** the Marathon Diamonds – National Lime and Stone Field **to be played**. Also, City Women's Softball used both Cooper and Rawson for their league and tournament games.

<u>Continued Fall Softball Leagues in 2009</u>: Proved to be very popular and well received. Both Men's and Co-ed Leagues were formed for play during September, October, and the beginning of November.

Tri County Umpire Association – We contract for umpiring services with the Association versus independent contracts with individual umpires. We agreed upon new rates under this contract:

- Shuffle Board League Shuffleboard continued throughout the spring, summer and fall months at the shuffleboard courts at Riverside Park. During inclement weather and/or the winter months portable shuffleboard courts were purchased by the Recreation Department for play at the CUBE on Tuesday mornings. This Senior Citizen program is a service to our community and does not have a fee structure.
 - <u>"Peep Drop"</u> The annual Easter event took on a new look in 2009. Children and parents were excited to see peeps, each outfitted with their own parachute "jumping" from a helicopter hovering over The Marathon Diamond Fields. This event was co-sponsored by Lifepoint Church and other area sponsors. Doughnuts, juice, cotton candy, popcorn and sno-cones were provided.
- o The event was free to the public and is considered a service to the Community. Optimist financial contribution of \$300 helped offset the cost of the event.

- Skate with Santa Claus The third annual holiday event at the Huntington Bank Arena morphed somewhat this year as Santa joined everyone during the afternoon public skate at the CUBE, Over 200 attended and were pleasantly surprised to learn that Santa could skate.
- o <u>First Night Out Celebration</u> The CUBE was the location of ringing in the New Year, including a balloon drop in the lobby and a giant size lighted CUBE in the Huntington Bank Arena at midnight. The New Years Eve celebration began at 7pm and ended at 12:15am. The fee to attend this event was \$10 per person, which included, skating, skate rental; noise makers and snacks. The event was attended by over 400 paid admissions. This is a new one-day record.
- o <u>Birthday Parties at the CUBE</u> In 2009, 52 birthday party packages were sold at the CUBE, which included private party room, pizza, soda, skate rental and ice skating.
- Meeting Room Rentals 182 rooms were rented by community groups at the CUBE in 2009, Recreation Partners pay \$75.00 for the year to use the meeting rooms for monthly meetings and special events. This fee also covers our administrative fee and processing of field permits.
- o <u>Shelter House Rentals</u> The Recreation Department continued with the duties of securing shelter house reservations and fee collections in 2009. The renovations on Shelter House #15 continue to make it one of the more popular shelters at Riverside Park. Shelter house #15 rents for \$75 each day, all other shelter houses rent for \$40 per day. Total number of rentals was 232. Additional shelter house usage by no-charge and Camp Hi-HO-O-H-I-O was 85.

The CUBE:

2009 was the second year <u>Findlay Grrrowl</u> has been a part of the Cube rolls — a Junior A Hockey Team. We are in the second year of a three year contract between The Mayor of the City of Findlay and Findlay Grrrowl. The agreement with the organization is to practice and skate their home schedule in Huntington Bank Arena at the CUBE.

<u>Findlay High School Hockey</u> In 2008 it was agreed upon that the Findlay Recreation Department would receive 4% of the gate at home games. A new agreement with Findlay High School was successfully negotiated and agreed upon for the 2009 – 2010 season to pay for a portion of their ice usage.

<u>Public Skating</u> at the CUBE has taken a leap in attendance at both evening and afternoon sessions. Average attendance during the evening sessions is 330 and the afternoon sessions 150. Admission prices were reviewed by the recreation staff and adjusted in accordance with the trends.

Evening Skate Sessions Admission rates in 2008 for evening skate is \$5, music is always playing. The demographics for evening skates are mainly junior high and high school teenagers. Skate Rental remained the same at \$2.

<u>Afternoon Skate Sessions</u> the demographics consist of younger children and families; in 2008 the fee structure was \$4 admission and \$1skate rental fee. 2009 saw a slight change whereas afternoon skates fee is \$5.00 per person with skate rental included.

Wee Skate Learn to Skate We remain consistent with the Ice Skating Institute, which we joined in 2008. The new "Wee Skate", learn to skate program now follows the ISI teaching and testing guidelines. In 2009 we decided to revamp the "Wee Skate Program", which was downsized in both price and time commitment.

Off Season Ice brought in a few new dry floor events to compliment our anchor events of:

WFIN/WKXA Leisure Living Home Show and Hancock Wood Electric Co-Op Annual Meeting: The events include a 3-year agreement with the Hancock Handlebars – Hancock 100 the event includes registration and an ice cream social for the bicyclists. "Rockin' the Rink", we also offered "Rockin' the Rink" for area music enthusiasts. This new venture included local "garage bands" that entertained show goers for several hours. Alpaca and Suri Show; This event is a "National" Alpaca and Suri Sweepstakes event. It brought animals and their owners from many areas throughout the United States. The event is open to the public and they welcomed many of our community members to observe these fascinating animals.
