Service Director Thomas - 2019 TAP application

For this year's TAP application, the Engineering Department would like to submit an application to extend the existing multi-use path that ends at the intersection of Broad Avenue and Howard Street and extend it both along the abandoned railroad right-of-way west to Wal-Mart and north along Broad Avenue to Foulke Avenue. The grant would cover ninety-five percent (95%) of the construction cost with the City's share being the remaining five percent (5%) of construction cost and design fees. If the grant is awarded, construction on the project would be during ODOT's 2022 fiscal year. Legislation authorizing the Service Director to prepare and execute an application for Transportation Enhancement funds is requested. Resolution No. 016-2019 was created.

Service Director Thomas - ODOT aviation grant beacon and windsock (35284600) and Runway 7/25 rehab - crack seal design/construction (35293200)

Funds are needed at this time for construction, inspection and contract administration for the Airport Beacon and Windsock project. This cost was not included with the funds that have already been appropriated, but the additional funds still keep the overall project below the cost that was estimated in the 2019 Capital Improvement Plan. Engineering also needs funds to be appropriated into the Runway 7/25 rehab project so that the project can be designed and the project can be bid. Bid results need to be in prior to submitting to the FAA for the grant funds that will pay for the majority of the construction costs for this project. Legislation to appropriate and transfer funds is requested. Ordinance No. 2019-038 was created.

Service Director Thomas - Olive St waterline replacement (Main St to Fairmont Dr) Project No. 3579XX00

Within a twenty-four (24) hour timeframe, there has been multiple water main breaks in the waterline on Olive Street between Main Street and Fairmont Drive. The Water Department would like to replace the waterline in this area. This project was not included in the 2019 Capital Improvement Plan, but the Street Department is going to be paving this section of Olive Street this year and would like to replace the now before the paving work is done. The Water Department plans to do the actual work so only funds for materials are needed. The estimate is conservative since because there was not much time to do research before getting this submitted for review so it is assumed the waterline will be located under the pavement and there will need to be rock excavation. If the proposed water can be placed outside of the pavement or if rock is not encountered, the project cost will be less than the estimate. Due to scheduling vacations, a project number for this proposed project until Tuesday, May 21, 2019, so a replacement ordinance reflecting a project number will be added for the Tuesday, May 21, 2019 City Council meeting. He is submitting this letter to allow City Council time to review the request prior to the meeting. Legislation to appropriate funds is requested. Ordinance No. 2019-040 was created.

We recommend approval of the zoning change to R4 Duplex/Triplex from C2 General Commercial. Ordinance No. 2019-035 was created.

The **PLANNING & ZONING COMMITTEE** to whom was referred a request from Robin Gardner to vacate the alley between Lots 88 and 89 in the Findlay Addition (aka The Original Plat of Findlay) from Main Street to the first alley east. The request was tabled during the April 11, 2019 PLANNING & ZONING COMMITTEE meeting due to the CITY PLANNING COMMISSION doing the same.

We recommend to vacate the alley as requested. Ordinance No. 2019-036 was created.

The **PLANNING & ZONING COMMITTEE** to whom was referred a request from Levi Schlumbohm to rezone 533 Davis Street from R2 Single Family Medium Density to R4 Duplex/Triplex Residential.

We recommend approval of the zoning change to R4 Duplex/Triplex from R2 Single Family Medium Density. Ordinance No. 2019-037 was created.

Within a twenty-four (24) hour timeframe, we have had multiple water main breaks in the waterline on Olive Street between Main Street and Fairmont Drive. The Water Department would like to replace the waterline in this area. This project was not included in the 2019 Capital Improvement plan but the Street Department is going to be paving this section of Olive Street this year and we would like to replace the waterline now before the paving work is done. The Water Department plans to do the actual work so only funds for materials are needed. The estimate is conservative since we did not have much time to do research before getting this submitted for review so it assumes the waterline will be located under the pavement and there will need to be rock excavation. If the proposed water can be place outside of the pavement or if rock is not encountered, the project cost will be less than the estimate.

Do to scheduled vacations, I will not be able to get a project number for the proposed project until Tuesday so there will be a replacement ordinance with the project number added for the meeting Tuesday night but I wanted to make sure that you had time to review this request prior to the meeting.

NEW BUSINESS

1. Request of Judy Brenner to allow street legal golf carts to be driven on the street in the downtown area.

Judy Brenner stated that she would like to start a golf cart shuttle downtown. The shuttle would run during lunch hours and during the evening. She stated it would be a free service. The advertising on the cart would pay for the service. They will have six passenger golf carts that are street legal. They will not stop on Main Street. They will pick up and drop off passengers on side streets only. Will eventually have an app for pick up requests. Until the app is up and running, the drivers will circle around and have folks wave them down. Also, they will have business cards with phone number and word of mouth for folks to call when need picked up.

Director Schmelzer stated that there is no ordinance that needs to be passed to operate a golf cart in the downtown area. The City and State already have laws in place that allow street legal golf carts to operate on City streets. Director Rasmussen stated that as long as the golf carts are street legal, they can travel on streets with 25 mile per hour speed limit. Director Schmelzer stated that there is no action that the Traffic Commission needs to take for this request.

Director Schmelzer stated that a taxi business license is required and all drivers will need to get a taxi driver license which includes a background check.

Director Schmelzer stated that we need to check with the Zoning Department for the regulations on a changing mobile digital billboard. Ads change every 10 seconds. Signs are on the sides of the golf cart, not front or back.

The shuttle is a good idea. Suggest reach out to Downtown Findlay Improvement District to help coordinate and spread the word, Marathon Center for the Performing Arts, etc. regarding events. Also, may be helpful for downtown employees parking at the Marathon Center for the Performing Arts to utilize.

2. Request of Councilwoman Holly Frische to install 35 MPH sign heading north on Harrison Street at the corporation limit.

Councilwoman Frische stated that residents in the West Park area expressed concerns with motorists speeding on County Road 144. Councilwoman Frische stated that she met with Hancock County Engineer who stated that the traffic counts do not warrant a speed limit

lower than 55 MPH on County Road 144. Speed limit signs are not required on county roads, and the Hancock County Engineer will not approve one to be placed.

Councilwoman Frische asked if the City could put up a 35 MPH speed limit sign at the corporation limits heading north out of the corporation limits. Councilwoman Frische stated the goal is to reduce the rate of speed on County Road 144. Hancock County can't change the speed limit. She stated it has been a concern for about a year largely due to the ODOT construction.

Director Schmelzer stated that if the issue is volume not speed, we can't do anything about it. The construction is scheduled to be done at the end of 2019.

Chief Dunbar stated that he will have his department do some targeted enforcement on Harrison Street. Also have a conversation with the Hancock County Sheriff to be made aware of potential speed issue.

Director Schmelzer stated that the City cannot install a sign telling someone something that is not legally correct which is what we will be doing if a 35 MPH sign is placed at the City limits leading out of the City limits. We will have folks complaining that the City put up a sign that is not correct.

ODOT is not going to do anything during construction to change posted speed. Councilwoman Frische wants Director Schmelzer to contact ODOT to have them change the speed limit on County Road 144 temporarily because of the construction traffic for the rest of the year. Director Schmelzer stated he will contact ODOT to see if they can temporarily place a construction zone north of Harrison on County Road 144 and will copy Hancock County Engineer Doug Cade on emails.

3. Request of Jill Wagner, to remove the stop signs in the east/west alley between 109 E. Lincoln St. and 719 S. Main Street.

Motion to approve request to remove stop signs in the east/west alley between 109 E. Lincon St. and 719 S. Main St., by Director Schmelzer, second by Chief Eberle. Motion passed 5-0.

With no further business to discuss, the meeting adjourned. The next meeting of the City of Findlay Traffic Commission will be held on April 15, 2019, at 2:30 p.m. in the third floor conference room of the Municipal Building.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion to accept minutes of the August 20, 2018, meeting as amended, by Cordonnier, second by Director Thomas. Motion passed 8-0.

NEW BUSINESS

Parks and Recreation Rules and Regulations: Mansfield presented the updated Parks and Recreation Rules and Regulations to the Board. It is in a new format. The rules and regulations are rarely printed and this format is better for online posting. Change pets-have to allow service animals, but not emotional support animals. Review both sections regarding pets and determine if we can combine. Mansfield stated that would like to restrict overnight RV Camper parking to Flag City Sports Complex only. Have had camper parking in Swale for ball tournaments and Emory Adams for BalloonFest. Meyers can we just have a blanket prohibition unless prior approval of Recreation Department. Mansfield stated the per day fee would be \$25.00 rather than per event, and not available without a permit. Discussion ensued. Post signage at entrances of parks stating camping in designated area with permit only. Check with area campgrounds for pricing comparison. Will approve the camping fee at a separate time. Shelter Reservation, add that online reservation available. Not permitted to use drones in parks. Discussion regarding allowing or not allowing. Pruitt stated that the HPD issues special permits for drones with details of Dos and Don'ts allowed by law – same with remote control boats, cars, etc. Mansfield stated cannot fly over people, unit loses power and falls and hits folks; Airport restricts it quite a bit – no fly space; not permitted to fly over people. Discussion ensued regarding motorized vehicles. Not permitted in any area of the parks. State "not exclusively limited to" vehicles that are listed.

Motion to approve with changes added, by Councilman Russel, seconded by Councilman Wobser. Motion passed 8-0.

Fee Schedule: Mansfield distributed an updated Fee Schedule. She contacted area ice rinks for comparison of rates. There is only one other rink with the three-tier rates. Other rinks have ice partner rate and non ice renter rates. We have Ice Partner, Ice User, and Ice Renter rates. Currently do not have anyone renting at a User rate. Would like to remove this tier rate. Increase rates over time to get to a single tier rate structure. These rates will go into effect for 2019-2020 season. All ice contracts have been signed for 2018-2019. Increase fee for Birthday Party to \$175. Ballfield rental fees increased slightly. Meyers stated that we should look into raising fees for The University of Findlay use of ballfields. Wobser inquired if it would make sense to not have WineFest listed out separately since they are paying the rental fee for the shelters and areas they are using? Mansfield stated that the fee for BalloonFest is suggested to be raised to \$1000. This amount still does not cover the cost of all City services used for this event. Russel stated that the City as a whole gets a lot of benefit from this event. Brings in a lot of people and a lot of promotion for Findlay. The City should support certain events due to benefit of event on community. Trisel stated that if the City is going in the hole with this event, then we are a sponsor of the event. If we are not going to raise the rates then he would suggest barter an opportunity for sponsorship of the event, such as sponsorship of a balloon. Pruitt concern does not know what is in the numbers. If we had a policy for philosophy of fees, we would be better able to approve an increase in fees. Need breakdown of what fees are included. Increase in fees, especially if significant, better be able to explain. Koehler stated that other cities charge resident and nonresident rates. Something to consider for future.

Motion to approve Fee Schedule, by Councilman Wobser, second by Meyers.

Discussion ensued regarding the fee set for The University of Findlay and BalloonFest. Trisel asked why we list a per event rate. Should remove Winefest and BalloonFest from the Fee Schedule and have a separate contract. Motion to amend Councilman Wobser's motion to approve Fee Schedule with the following changes: Enter into contract negotiations with The University of Findlay; BalloonFest \$750.00 and do not publish rate on any fee schedule and enter into a contract with them; eliminate WineFest fee and remove from fee schedule-WineFest to pay scheduled shelter fee for what shelters they use; by Councilman Russel, second by Councilman Wobser. Motion passed 8-0.

DEPARTMENT REPORTS

Recreation Department Report: Mansfield reported that DuraEdge is regrading the ballfields at the Diamonds and the returning the stone area to dirt. The inaugural Miracle All Star Tournament went wonderful. There were no issues. There will be no more games at the Diamonds so will be winterizing the fields. Ice is full strength.

Parks Maintenance Department Report: Stoffel stated that everything is ordered for the grant for the Pickleball Courts. The pool is painted and closed. Trees will be planted in the parks. Will be attending a meeting with Hancock Park District for the grant. Thank you to Gary Pruitt and the HPD Board for their efforts. A semi-pro football league approached the City for use area at the Cube for practice.

OTHER REPORTS

Hancock Park District Report: Pruitt reported that HPD gave out \$96,000 in park improvement grants to City of Findlay, City of Fostoria, and 10 area villages covering wide range of outdoor recreation and capital improvements. Do it every year. Starts in June sending out applications and guidelines; applications come in in September, representatives from each entity meet in October to present their projects, agree how to disburse the funds, HPD board votes on the awards in November, and disburse checks in December. Every two years Pruitt and the HPD board tour the parks, meet with the representatives of the entity see first hand, what the money paid for. Installation of new outdoor fitness equipment at Centennial Park started last week. Should have done this week or next.

OTHER BUSINESS

Next Meeting: The next meeting of the Parks and Recreation Board is scheduled for November 19, 2018, at 4:00pm in the third floor conference room of the Municipal Building.

NEW BUSINESS

<u>Eagle Creek Skate Park</u>: Stoffel showed photos of the equipment of the Eagle Creek Skate Park. He showed photos of when the skate ramps were refurbished by an Eagle Scout, and then current photos of the current deteriorated condition of the skate ramps.

Alan Klateca from Service Supply Ltd presented information on skate park ramp systems. They propose a two phase system. They deliver and install the ramps. All sections are modular and movable. Bicycles and scooters can also be used on these ramps. The ramp system proposed is designed to fit the existing location. The proposed ramps are made for the northern climate.

Phase I which includes enclosure panels is \$58,994. Combo price if you do Phase II (which would include Phase I and Phase II) is \$119,808. The City has \$68,000 budgeted this year in the Capital Improvement budget for the skate park.

Russel stated that we need to evaluate the current need/want for a skate park. Pruitt agrees and recommends a fresh start. The current location is not a good location. Meyers asked what do we do with the park if we close it and asked if we know what the demand for a skate park is. Alan stated that the demand has leveled off. Russel stated that we need to have a 5-10 year facility plan for the parks. Russel challenged the board to gauge interest in a skate park through Survey Monkey, website, Facebook, The Courier, bike shops, etc.

Russel asked the safety of the current equipment at the park. If it is unsafe, we need to close the park. A sign should be placed to contact the Mayor's Office with concerns. A news release added to the website as well as media to notify of the closure and interest.

<u>Grants</u>: The City will be applying for another AARP grant. One idea is for a dog park. It is suggested to be located in Anchor Park in conjunction with the skate park, if it is located there. Thomas asked for other ideas. Russel suggested looking at connectivity from the Pickleball Courts to the surrounding neighborhood, Findlay Country Club, etc. or other items to further enhance that area.

Thomas submitted ODNR trails grant for bike trails on south side of Blanchard River from Broad Avenue to River Street. ODOT grant for a bike path from the intersection of Howard and Broad to Walmart; and up Broad to Foulke thinking in the future to take it over to Blanchard.

DEPARTMENT REPORTS

Recreation Department Report: Stoffel reported on behalf of Lisa Mansfield that the Cube addition for the zamboni is moving along. Tournaments are booked for the weekends for Marathon Diamonds. Gliding Stars will have their show on March 17 and Silver Blades will have their show on March 22-25. Dry floor events include

The Courier's Bridal Showcase, Black Swamp Bucks Unlimited event, and a mixed martial arts event, and an inquiry about a circus. The adult softball manager's meeting will be held on March 18. Men's league is going down to one umpire due to lack of interest and shortage of umpires.

<u>Parks Maintenance Department Report</u>: Stoffel stated busy removing snow and ice, Park Maintenance employees are assisting Street Department. The Hancock Park District grant will be used to restore the restroom near the Pickleball Courts, adding LED lighting. The funds will also be used for tree replacement in the parks.

OTHER REPORTS

Hancock Park District Report: Pruitt reported that he attended the Ohio Parks and Recreations Association Conference. One of the sessions was about eSports being a booming industry. Cleveland's Recreation Department is in the process of incorporating an eSports room in existing recreation center. Power Point presentation from Dublin renovating part of an existing facility, and part of it is for eSports. Thought about the Cube and what opportunity there would be to have a space for eSports there. Got their attention if out in the parks. Is there a way to incorporate some fitness. Could the dry floor space be used for eSports tournaments. Ohio is a hot spot for eSports.

THE FOLLOWING IS RESOLUTION 016-2019 ENACTED BY THE CITY OF FINDLAY, HANCOCK COUNTY, OHIO, HEREINAFTER REFERRED TO AS THE LOCAL PUBLIC AGENCY (LPA), IN THE MATTER OF THE STATED DESCRIBED PROJECT.

WHEREAS, the United States Congress has set aside monies for Transportation Enhancement projects through the State of Ohio, Department of Transportation; and,

WHEREAS, LPAs can apply for these monies and be selected for funding by the State of Ohio, Department of Transportation; and,

WHEREAS, the (Interstate Trail and FHS Trail shared use paths) are a transportation activity eligible to receive federal funding; and,

WHEREAS, if requested funds are granted, the City shall be responsible for at least five (5%) percent of the construction costs, and for 100% of all other costs associated with the architecture/engineering plans, environmental studies and documentation, right-of-way plans, and right-of-way acquisition, if necessary.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Findlay, State of Ohio, State of Ohio, that:

SECTION ONE: The Service-Safety Director of said LPA is hereby empowered on behalf of the LPA to prepare and execute an application for Transportation Enhancement funds for the stated described project and to submit same to the State of Ohio, Department of Transportation.

SECTION TWO: The total construction cost of the project is estimated to be \$676,766.58 of which the LPA, if awarded the funds, commits to pay at least five (5%) percent (hereinafter known as the local portion) of the actual construction cost, estimated to be \$33,838.33 The LPA further agrees to pay One Hundred Percent (100%) of the construction cost over and above the maximum amount provided by the State of Ohio, Department of Transportation and for all costs associated with design, environmental and right-of-way activities.

SECTION THREE: Upon completion of the described Project, and unless otherwise agreed, the LPA shall: (1) provide adequate maintenance for the described Project in accordance with all applicable state and federal laws, including, but not limited to, 23 USC 116; (2) provide ample financial provisions, as necessary, for the maintenance of the described Project; (3) if necessary, maintain the right-of-way, keeping it free of obstructions; and (4) if necessary, hold said right-of-way inviolate for public highway purposes.

SECTION FOUR: If the application is approved for funding the Service-Safety Director of said LPA is hereby authorized and directed to petition council to seek final approval of the acceptance of said funds as well as authorization to enter into a contract with the Director of the Ohio Department of Transportation necessary to complete the above described project.

SECTION FIVE: This Resolution is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety of the inhabitants of the City of Findlay, Ohio, and for the further reason it is immediately necessary to enact said legislation so that this project may proceed expediously.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN THE HANCOCK COUNTY COMMISSIONERS AND THE CITY OF FINDLAY, OHIO

I. BACKGROUND:

The Hancock County Commissioners (the County) and the Maumee Watershed Conservancy District (MWCD) contracted with Stantec Consulting Services Inc. to recommend flood mitigation strategies for the Blanchard River. The strategies will reduce flood elevations throughout the community, however, several major roadways will still be subject to closure during major flood events.

Roadways identified for improvements that would minimize their closure during major flood events include: 1) Martin Luther King Parkway; 2) East Sandusky Street (State Route 568) at County Road 180; 3) East Sandusky Street (State Route 568) at Lye Creek; and 4) Western Avenue at Findlay Street.

II. HANCOCK COUNTY DUTIES AND REQUIREMENTS:

- A. <u>Funding</u>. The County shall provide funding within the remaining balance of the ½% Sales Tax collected specifically for Flood Mitigation for preliminary engineering, detail design, construction, and land acquisition (if necessary) of the improvements described above. Specific funding for each project shall be authorized by Resolutions as amendments to this Agreement.
- B. <u>Property Access</u>. The County agrees to permit the City of Findlay (the City) and its agents or assigns access across any properties owned by the County that may be impacted by the recommended Transportation Corridor improvements and further agrees to assign any property that may needed to construct the Transportation Corridor improvements to the City.

III. CITY OF FINDLAY DUTIES AND REQUIREMENTS

- A. <u>Use of Funds</u>. The City agrees to contract for the preliminary engineering, detail design, construction, and land acquisition (if necessary) and to use the funds provided by the County solely for these purposes.
- B. <u>Property Use.</u> The City agrees to provide any City owned property that me may be needed to construct these improvements at no cost to the County.
- C. <u>Maintenance of Constructed Facilities</u>. The City agrees to permanently maintain all improvements constructed as part of this Agreement.
- D. <u>Property Acquisition</u>. The City agrees to provide legal and administrative services (at no cost to the County) necessary to acquire any privately owned real property

that may be needed to construct the improvements. The County will provide funds for the final settlement costs at closing.

E. <u>Construction Administration & Inspection</u>. The City agrees to provide, at its own expense, construction bidding, administration and inspection services for the improvements.

V. GENERAL TERMS

- A. <u>Liability</u>. Each party to this Agreement shall be responsible for its own acts and omissions and those of its officers, employees and agents. In no event shall either party be liable to the other party for indirect, consequential, incidental, special, or punitive damages, or lost profits.
- B <u>Effective Date.</u> This Agreement shall become effective by the date of last signature.
- C. <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement shall be interpreted and construed in accordance with the laws of the State. In the event any disputes related to this Agreement are to be resolved in a Court of Law, said Court shall be located in the courts of Hancock County, State of Ohio.
- D. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement and its Appendices and Attachments contain the entire understanding between the parties and supersede any prior understandings, agreements, proposals, and all other communications between the parties relating to the subject matter of this Agreement, whether such shall be oral or written.
- E. <u>Assignment</u>. Neither this Agreement nor any rights, duties or obligations described herein shall be assigned by any party hereto without the prior written consent of the other parties.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties hereto have executed this Agreement as of the date shown below.
