5. The influence will be in the direction of a rise in the value of property. In this advance every piece of real estate in the city will have a share.

6. This improvement will tend to invite to Findlay men who will contribute to the financial, social and moral advancement. The want of it may keep them from coming here.

7. Much has been said of late years about inviting manufactures to Findlay. Manufactures need water easily accessible, and this improvement would certainly tend to bring them.
