President Pro-Tem Monday opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance and a moment of silent prayer.

MINUTES:

Councilwoman Spence moved to accept the July 1, 2014 Regular Session City Council meeting minutes as written. Councilman Harrington seconded the motion. All were in favor. Motion carried. Filed.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:

Duwayne Chambers – weed control

A number of years ago, Mr. Chambers received a complaint issued to him for tall weeds behind a garage on Tiffin Avenue that he promptly took care of. The individual he hired to maintain the property refused to mow because of his neighbor using his property as a deposit for dog manure. He feels the N.E.A.T. Department should have different initials because N.E.A.T. appears to stand for nice looking things. A property beside his office has weeds approximately three to three and a half feet (3-3 ½') tall. Before summer began, he called N.E.A.T. about that property, but it has not been mowed yet this year. He also had to call them to remind them last year in which they mowed the property a couple of times. When each City of Findlay Councilmember ran for office last year, they noted how great this city is and how much they love it. He has heard them talk from time to time about the beautification of this city and how nice it looks driving up and down the street. He requested Council drive by his office to look at the property next door (605 Tiffin Avenue) and tell him if they would be proud to invite anyone into this city the way the property looks. It is his hopes that Council will take a serious look at issues like this as there are many other properties like it. After hearing Council boast about Findlay while running for election, he would like to see them fulfill their obligation as they now receive a paycheck because they were elected to the office for which they said they would proudly serve to rid the city of unsightly weeds in many neighborhoods.

Discussion:

Councilman Nichols agrees with Mr. Chambers, but noted that there are still some who know how the rules (i.e. weed cutting, etc.) work and know how to get around them. The N.E.A.T. Department employee has to send a letter to the property owner, but sometimes they do not pick the letter up because they know what it is for. Or they will pick the letter up but will dodge their responsibilities knowing they do not have to maintain the property like it should be within the rules we have. There are some Councilmembers looking into ways to strengthen the N.E.A.T. Department employee's authority on these properties. Sometimes they fall between the cracks. Mr. Chambers replied that while he loves this city, he does not continue to fall in love with this city that some are not paying attention to. Council has that responsibility to pay attention to this city.

Councilman Klein knows exactly where Mr. Chambers property is because he is also appalled by the neighbor's property as well. He considers Tiffin Avenue to be a gateway to the community. When people come into Findlay, Tiffin Avenue is what they see and is probably not a good first impression. There have been two (2) meetings and a third meeting is being set up to work on putting a stronger enforcement policy in place with possible new legislation. It is being acted upon and is not being ignored. While a solution won't happen tomorrow, but a solution will happen within the next couple of months. Mr. Chambers reassured Council that legislation is what is needed. He has some ideas on what the legislation should consist of. Councilman Klein is going to contact Mr. Chambers to gather his ideas to be taken into consideration. Mr. Chambers reminded Council that they are paid to do this and cannot understand why no one has come up with a better solution a long time ago. His neighbor's property has been an problem for three (3) years. Councilman Klein reaffirmed Mr. Chambers that he is proud of this city and will get something done.

Councilwoman Spence knows Tiffin Avenue has several issues as she has drove by that area and has seen at least seven (7) pending citations for that area. According to the most recent N.E.A.T. Department monthly report, one hundred eighty-six (186) citations for weeds have been given and there are ninety (90) pending cases. While she understands Mr. Chambers frustrations, the N.E.A.T. Department cannot totally eliminate the weed problems, but that department is very knowledgeable of the problem in our community and is working through the legal actions that are available to make property owners take care of their properties.

City Auditor Jim Staschiak – revenue estimates for fiscal year 2015

Council received an Estimated Revenues for submission to the Budget Commission for the next fiscal year at their last City Council meeting. In order to meet the statutory requirements for the distribution of the local government money, this document should be formally accepted by Council during the July 15, 2014 City Council meeting so it can then be filed with the County Auditor no later than July 20, 2014. A motion for acceptance of the revenue estimates will be needed during this meeting.

Councilwoman Frische made a motion to accept the revenue estimates. Councilman Shindldecker seconded the motion. All were in favor. Filed.

Service-Safety Director Paul Schmelzer – Findlay City School Bus Garage

Findlay City Schools would like to build a new bus facility on vacant land adjacent to Cooper Field. They would like to receive feedback from the City on the viability of the request before performing full environmental, geotechnical and site planning on the property. The school would like to discuss the logistics of the location and the scope of their needs at a Committee of the Whole meeting. A Committee of the Whole meeting on July 29, 2014 is scheduled.

Discussion:

Council President Pro-Tem Monday asked if July 29, 2014 would work for a Committee of the Whole meeting and what time it should start. Service-Safety Director Schmelzer replied that he did not suggest a time, but had heard that date might work for a number of Councilmembers, but the date and time are at Council's will. Councilman Harrington noted that he will be on vacation on July 29, 2014, so he will not be able to attend. Councilman Douglas replied that date works well and asked if it could start at 5:00pm. Service-Safety Director Schmelzer suggested addressing both this issue and the Municipal Court improvements at the same meeting and that he does not anticipate a lengthy discussion on the bus garage as it is at the very preliminary stage right now. The Municipal Court improvements discussion could take a little longer but is also at the preliminary stage. He anticipates discussion on both items to only last an hour to an hour and a half.

Service-Safety Director Paul Schmelzer – Municipal Building Court Improvements

The Findlay Municipal Court has been contemplating needed modifications for years. A concept for remodeling the Municipal Building has been developed that would give the Court the needed space without constructing a new facility. If time allows, he suggests addressing this at the same Committee of the Whole meeting as the school project discussion. Court Representatives will be present to discuss the need. Legislation to appropriate funds is requested.

Service-Safety Director Paul Schmelzer – Fire Department Mutual Aid

Mutual aid between Findlay and Hancock County Fire Departments has been in existence for many years. The ability to leverage additional resources in the event of a large catastrophe is valuable. Fire Chief Lonyo has worked with Allen Township to develop an automatic aid agreement. This collaboration is in the best interest of public safety. The township benefits because the City will respond to help with commercial fires in the area (i.e. Whirlpool, and confirmed residential structural fires). This is not an automatic Findlay response to each 911 call in the township. It is for confirmed structural fires in the densely populated Hillcrest area or commercial/industrial properties. The City benefits when a fire necessitates the formation of a rapid intervention team (RIT). This level of staffing requires call-in for supplemental Findlay staff. A good example of this would be the Argyle fire. In such a case, the RIT is formed and a call for township services would be initiated so that the City would be covered in the event of second calls within the City or further fireground assignments. These fires would be covered under current mutual aid agreements if the call was made. This agreement solidifies the automatic nature by allowing the interface of dispatch services after the fire is confirmed. This agreement is the latest example of public safety forces in the City and County working together to best utilize our resources. He commends all the Findlay Fire Department staff and Allen Township members that were involved in moving this forward. The township has already signed the agreement and he intends to sign it in the near future.

Discussion:

Councilman Nichols noted that a lot of work and referencing has been put into these contractual requirements and sounds like a good cooperation between the County and the City for fires that require a call in for extra help. He asked the Fire Chief in the audience if he has any comments on who will take the lead on calls. Fire Chief Lonyo replied that this has been in the works for about three (3) years and what is before Council tonight is just a small part of it. The County started the process and has already done the mutual aid on a frequent basis with Arlington and possibly Mt. Blanchard which would be for an initiation of a call where the Fire Chief in that jurisdiction would radio for assistance. They eliminated the step of requesting the help and reprogrammed the County Dispatch Center to automatically plug in that response. That is what was brought to the FFD by Chief Hickman's request with Allen Township to get an aerial up to the commercial structures on 212 and in the Hillcrest Addition. FFD would be called to those fires anyway. FFD would benefit by having the help from Allen Township. The Battalion Chief will have the policy written and all Firefighters will be actively assigned prior to doing the tasks for construction fires. That request will be sent to Allen Township to respond to Findlay and stage at the scene for an assignment or for a second call. Right now, we do have gap coverage of extra trucks for a second call. FFD will be working with the Allen Township Fire Department for training sessions as soon as Monday for a seamless communication.

Councilman Shindledecker asked if single agreements are intersecting with other townships that abut the City. Fire Chief Lonyo replied that early on, only Liberty Township expressed an interest for all fires, not just for confined construction fires.

Councilman Russel asked if this will result in quicker response time for FFD (i.e. Hillcrest fire). Fire Chief Lonyo replied not necessarily. Allen Township would be the first on the scene a majority of the time since Engine 3 or Ladder 1 would travel to the fire scene. Councilman Russel then asked what all is included in the Hillcrest area. Fire Chief Lonyo replied it would be just a small part of the Allen Township line just south of County Road 99 and north of Silver Pine. Service-Safety Director Schmelzer replied that a map is attached shows what is covered in that subdivision and the industrial and commercial areas. Fire Chief Lonyo added that this will allow FFD to do inspections instead of only being able to respond to a structure fire. It will allow FFD to work with Allen Township for response & inspections. Councilman Russel asked what will be included in the preplan. Fire Chief Lonyo replied that they are already involved with Allen Township with the Active Shooter plan that is ready to go out. Allen Township is a response team for the Findlay City Schools. This will allow FFD and Allen Township to work together in continuity.

Councilman Harrington made a motion to authorize the Service-Safety Director to sign this agreement. Councilman Nichols seconded.

Councilwoman Frische asked if a resolution is needed. Law Director Rasmussen replied it is not needed because the Service-Safety Director can go into contract without a resolution.

All were in favor. Filed.

Service-Safety Director Paul Schmelzer – Howard Run Ditch Cleaning Project No. 32549500

The Dalzell Ditch and Oil Ditch cleaning are included in the 2014 Capital Improvements Plan. Petitions have been submitted to the Hancock County Commissioners for both projects. While it made sense to start with Dalzell Ditch and Oil Ditch because of the design work that had been done prior, Howard Run should also be petitioned for maintenance. He is requesting to start a project to enable the petition fee to be paid and start the process. Unlike Dalzell and Oil Ditch projects, this is a new project and there are not matching funds called for in the Capital Plan. This project would be paid for entirely through assessments. An estimate for the cleaning will be developed as part of the process.

Discussion:

Councilman Russel asked if the cleaning will take place in 2015. Service-Safety Director Schmelzer that more than likely it will be spring 2016.

Councilman Nichols asked if the County Commissioners have had their public meeting on Dalzell Ditch. Service-Safety Director Schmelzer replied that the viewing for Dalzell Ditch has already taken place where some Councilmembers attended that meeting. He has also talked with a couple of residents who voiced their opinion about Howard Run. The discussion about ditches and their role in our drainage system has become more important to everyone who drains into the ditch. The rain events we've had add to that discussion. Dalzell Ditch was a logical place to start because it tested the timeframe required down significantly. Oil Ditch was cleaned in the County but was supposed to be cleaned in the City at one point in time, but was never done. There was a rough alignment and plan for it. Given the comments from residents, he believes they would support a project for Howard Run, so that is why he feels it is worth petitioning the Commissioners at this point.

Councilman Russel has heard a lot about the problems with Howard Run where it would back up.

Councilwoman Spence asked if the County would be responsible for the assessment portion. Service-Safety Director Schmelzer replied that it is a County ditch petition. He is not sure when the rules were established for ditch maintenance, but it is a county function. The City would be a petitioner, the plans would be developed, there would be a viewing and estimate, and then the residents that are involved in the watershed would be informed of what their assessment would be. There would be public hearings on the issue, and then the Commissioners would vote on whether or not to proceed with the plan. The Commissioners would be the contract agent. Filed.

Referred to the Appropriations Committee for discussion and consideration.

Service-Safety Director Schmelzer replied it was based on an estimate and commitment to pursue the replacement of those waterlines and the installation of the loop, but the ultimate decision was based on bid numbers, so the \$254,000 was based on a bid number.
