REASON: The CR 236 Debt payments were appropriated and paid initially by Capital Improvements money for 2019. \$365,619.99 of County Permissive Fund money to pay the 2019 debt payments as an allowable use of the money. These appropriations allow the County Permissive money to be used for the debt and reimburse Capital Improvements.

REASON: The City had to appropriate the entire amount of the interest payment for the Energy Bonds for the 2019 debt payments. However, the Series B bonds are federally subsidized and the City received a portion of the subsidy payment. Due to the federal mandated sequester, the City did not receive the entire subsidy. Also, the amount that was due on the Series A bonds ended up being less than was shown on the amortization schedule and was originally budgeted. These transactions return the fronted appropriation to CIT Fund – Capital Improvements Restricted Account.

FROM: Special Assessments Sidewalks #28020000 \$ 317.61 \$ TO: General Fund 317.61 REASON: In 2004, the City made the final debt payment on the 2003 Sidewalk Construction Program, however, there were several assessment deferments granted at that time in addition to several property owners that had chosen not to pay the assessment. Also, the City made the final debt payment on the 2010 Sidewalk Repair and New Construction projects in 2014. About half (1/2) of the assessed property owners chose not to pay this assessments. The City had to cover the costs of the debt payments with General Fund money and was to be reimbursed when the property owners finally made payment. The \$317.61 represents the amount of money that was received in 2019 for some of these properties. This money should now be returned to the General Fund. There are still a few outstanding assessments to be collected from these projects.

REASON: A portion of the amount received from the assorted property taxes from the County tax settlements is deposited into Police and Fire Pension Funds by law. The cash balance is then transferred to the General Fund at the end of the year. Although the revenue budgets for 2019 were estimated very closely, the transfers out of these funds were budgeted low. The County revises their revenue estimates after adoption of our annual appropriation ordinance, and in order to avoid potentially over-budgeting the fund on the certificate filing, the transfer out is budgeted lower than expected.

REASON: Based on current projections, the actual income tax collections will be more than the original estimate. Findlay Police Department Activities Report – November 2019.

Hancock Regional Planning Director Matt Cordonnier – Hancock County All Natural Hazard Mitigation Plan Per the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000, a mitigation plan must be approved by FEMA and the State of Ohio for any community wishing to obtain funding from the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program. All communities must be assessed and be included in the plan and finally adopt the plan. All eighty-eight (88) Counties in Ohio currently have Hazard Mitigation Plans. In 2007, Hancock Regional Planning created the County's first Hazard Mitigation Plan that was approved by FEMA and the State of Ohio EMA and subsequently adopted by the County, City of Findlay, and all of Hancock County's Villages. In 2013, Hancock Regional Planning Commission (HRPC) conducted the first required five-year update of the plan. In 2019, HRPC conducted the County's second five-year Hazard Mitigation Plan update. In order to update the plan, HRPC conducted two (2) public hearings on the following dates: 11/5/2018 and 11/19/2018. In addition to the public meetings, letters and surveys were sent to the City of Findlay, Hancock County, and all the Townships and Villages. Waiving the required three (3) readings and adopting the 2019 Hazard Mitigation Plan update on an emergency is requested. <u>Resolution No. 027-2019 was created</u>.

Service Director/Acting City Engineer Thomas – ODOT guardrail project

Notification from the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) has been received that they are planning on upgrading and/or replacing the guardrail at the Trenton Avenue (US 224) intersection with Broad Street as it wraps around Broad Street to where it ends on Broad Street. ODOT will bear financial responsibility for all of the costs with the construction of the project. The City will not owe ODOT money for completion of these improvements. The project is scheduled to bid in late 2020, but ODOT will need the City's consent to proceed with the project. ODOT is requesting that Council enact a preliminary consent ordinance and return a copy to them by January 17, 2020 so that they can begin the design of the project. Legislation to provide preliminary consent for the project is requested. ODOT-provided Ordinance No. 2019-111 was created.

Service Director/Acting City Engineer Thomas – Runway 7/25 Rehab – Crack Seal Design/Construction (35293200) Rehabilitate Taxiway A (A4 to A6) – Design (35284800)

In August, it was requested that the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) grant funds for these projects be appropriated into the projects. These projects were also awarded a grant from ODOT Aviation. The total amount that was requested was the FAA Grant amount and the ODOT Aviation amount, but should have been separated out. In order to remedy the situation, \$9,709.50 needs to be de-appropriated from the projects and then the same amount needs to be appropriated from the ODOT Aviation Grant to the projects. This needs to be completed by the end of the year so that the financial books are corrected. Legislation to de-appropriate and appropriate funds is requested. <u>Ordinance No. 2019-112 was created</u>.

TO: Applicants for Street or alley Vacation FROM: Council Clerk

City law requires persons requesting the vacation of a street or alley to file a petition with City Council. Council then refers the request to the City Planning Commission and the Planning & Zoning Committee for their findings. These Committees file their report with Council, who in turn makes the final ruling on the request.

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

Petition forms are available in the Council Clerk's Office. It requires the signature of a majority of the property owners that abut the requested vacation. A plat of the area shall accompany the application indicating the street or alley to be vacated. This plat can be obtained from the City Engineer's Office.

In addition to the petition for an alley vacation being signed by the abutting property owners, which is notice, if said proposed alley vacation is less than the full alley running from street to street, either north and south or east and west as the case may be, then the Clerk will also send notices to the abutting property owners on that portion of the alley extended but not in the request for vacation. For example, if an alley runs from north to south from street A to street B, intersected by a east-west alley, and the request is to vacate the alley running from street A to the intersecting east-west alley, then the abutting property owners on the remaining portion of that north-south alley between street A and street B shall also receive notice of the petition to vacate from the Council Clerk. (Rules of Procedure, as amended, of Findlay City Council).

Ideally, the petition must be signed by all abutting property owners. If not, a Public Notice of Consideration to Vacate has to be advertised in the Courier for six consecutive weeks. The cost of the advertising shall be paid by the petitioner. Anyone wishing to address Council concerning the petition may do so as a result of the publication. This can occur at any of the three readings which Council must give an Ordinance that vacates right-of-way.

FEE

At the time of submitting the request to the Council Clerk, a \$75.00 non-refundable fee shall accompany the petition. This is to off-set some of the City's expenses. Upon adoption of legislation, applicable advertising and filing fees will be invoiced to the petitioner.

ASSESSMENTS

By law, if there were assessments to the abutting properties for improvements to the street or utilities, the petitioners are to pay the assessment fee for the property being vacated. These assessments, if any, are recorded in the City Engineer's Office. They are requested to be researched for the property upon legislation request. The petitioners will be invoiced for the total expense, and it must be paid before Council will vacate the street or alley.

PLANNING COMMISSION ACTION

Planning Commission action on vacation petitions will be in the form of a recommendation to City Council. Council may then either concur with the Commission's recommendation or override it. Concurring action may be accomplished with a simple majority vote, while overriding action requires a two-thirds (2/3) vote of Council. Notice of the Planning Commission Meeting will be sent from the Engineer's Office to the filer of the petition advising him/her when the request shall be heard.

COMMITTEE ACTION

This Committee's action will be in the form of a recommendation to City Council. Council may then either concur with the Committee's recommendation or override it. Action is a simple majority vote to concur or override the Committee report. Notice of the Planning & Zoning Committee Meeting will be sent by the Council Clerk to the petitioners advising them when the request shall be heard.

CITY COUNCIL ACTION

Once the petition is placed on Council's agenda, it will be referred to the City Planning Commission and the Committee with all documentation submitted. Both the City Planning Commission and the Planning & Zoning Committee shall review the request. Upon their findings, Council will request legislation and give it three (3) separate readings if the vacation is to proceed.

In order to vacate a public right-of-way, City Council must adopt an ordinance doing so. Normally, legislation is prepared when the Planning & Zoning Committee recommends that an action be taken. However, appropriate legislation can be drawn at the request of any Council member, whether or not the vacation is supported by the Committee. Ordinances require three readings prior to adoption, and this normally occurs over the course of three consecutive meetings of Council.

A majority affirmative vote of at least five (5) members is necessary to enact a vacation ordinance. If Council disagrees with the Planning Commission's recommendation, it will take six (6) affirmative votes of members of Council to enact a vacation ordinance. The ordinance is not effective until at least 30 days after signing by the Mayor.

These lots were vacated and turned into public Right of Way during the construction of Blanchard Street. Based on the irregular Right of Way shape, the owners of the land directly west of this area are requesting to vacate the Right of Way and turn this area back into lots so the area can be developed.

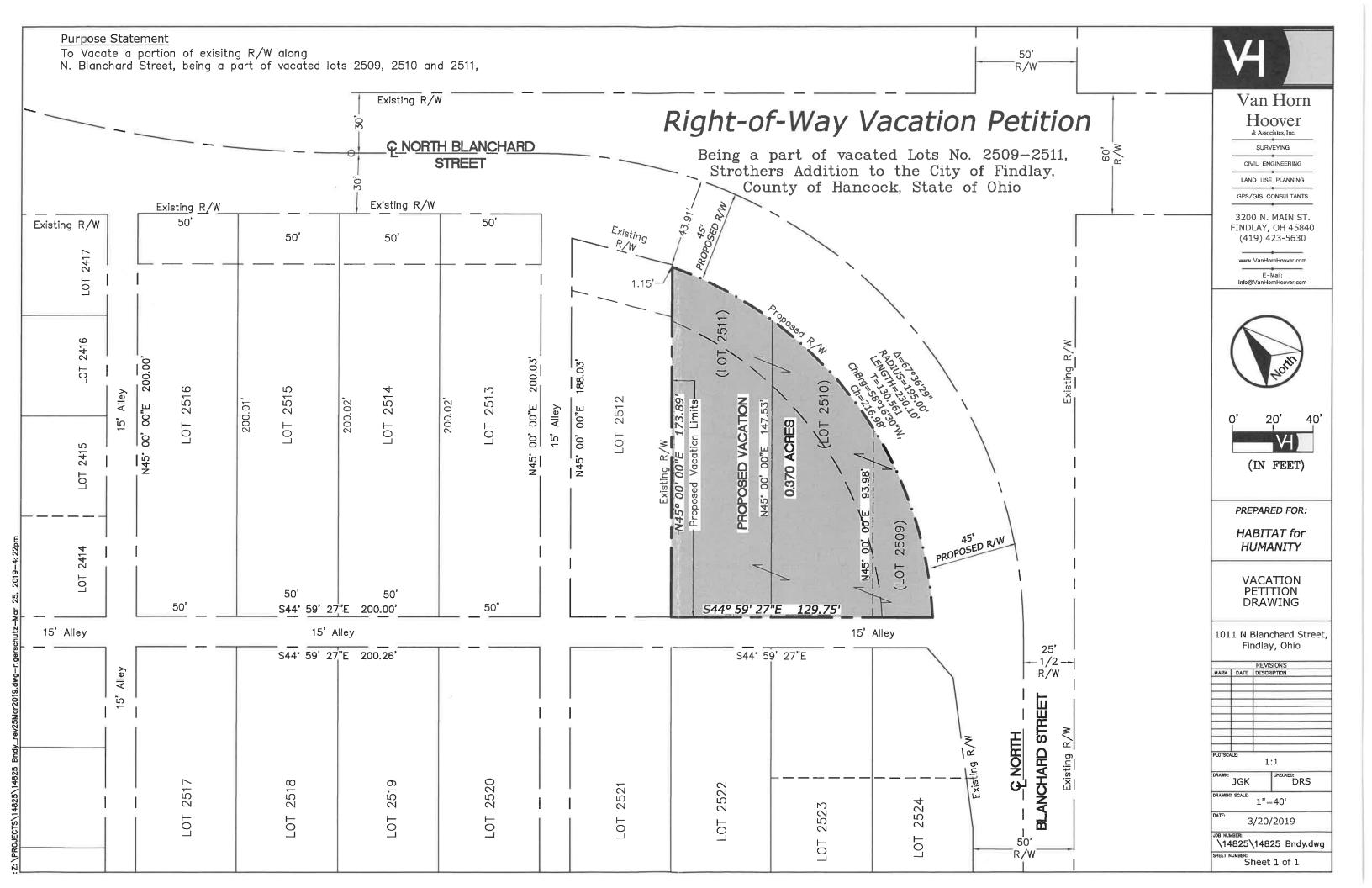

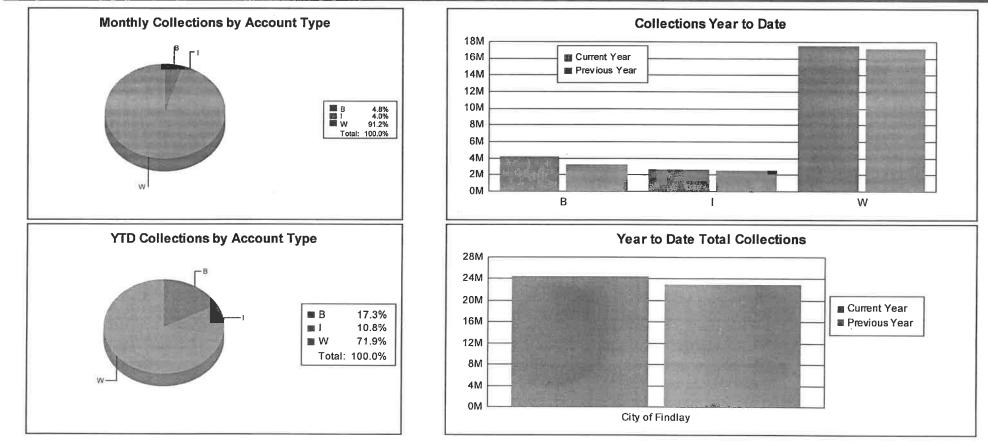

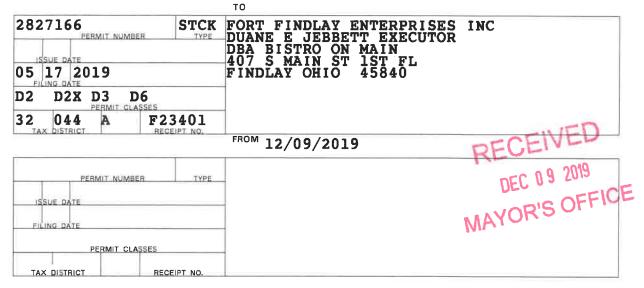

OLD BUSINESS

1. Request to review pedestrian safety downtown Findlay.

6/17/2019

Councilman Grant Russel stated that a resident that was struck in a crosswalk recently downtown approached him with ideas to make downtown streets safer for pedestrians. A suggestion is to make all intersections in Downtown Findlay "No Turn on Red." Also, installing left turn lights on all traffic lights Downtown. DeMuth stated that plans are already in place for traffic light upgrades which will include left turn lights on all intersections that have left turn lanes in Downtown. Director Schmelzer stated that we can look at the Capital Plan, and in the interest of pedestrian safety downtown, we can move the request for signal upgrades up on the list to have them completed sooner.

Discussion regarding "No Turn on Red" during certain hours. Have not done research on other downtowns or how this affect the Uniform Traffic code. Used to be No Turn on Red prior to 2003. Director Schmelzer stated that it makes sense for special hours. May back up traffic. What do we want to do in the interest of pedestrian safety. See what introduction to no turn on red would make on stacking. Maybe not on Main Cross and Sandusky intersections, but all other intersections in downtown have the "No Turn On Red" designation. Have DGL take a look at. Demuth stated that if you can't see to turn right on red without entering into the crosswalk to see to turn, then it should be "No Turn On Red." Director Schmelzer stated this should be part of the criteria along with stacking. Director Schmelzer requested the Engineering Department to do a study on the intersections with the criteria and come back with a list of intersections and a map to determine where we want to introduce the No Turn On Red. If we don't have anything conclusive, then look at engaging DGL. Director Thomas will contact DGL for a cost to do the study, if needed.

Motion to review the Capital Plan as it relates to the traffic signal upgrades in Downtown to determine if those projects can be moved up in the schedule; have Engineering Department study each Main Street intersection in the Downtown using the two criteria for right turn on red: 1. Do you have to encroach into the crosswalk to make a decision as to whether or not it safe to move forward in your vehicle, and 2. Stacking, then bring it back for further discussion, by Director Schmelzer, second by Chief Dunbar. Motion passed 4-0.

7/15/2019 Remains tabled.

8/19/2019

Motion to lift from table by Director Thomas, second by Director Schmelzer. Motion passed 5-0.

Director Thomas stated that they looked at the intersections downtown, looked at which intersections if you stop at the stop bar you can see and which ones you can't when you turn right. Director Thomas will be checking on pricing with DGL to do a model regarding stacking with data relative to traffic counts that we collected for the Downtown project, provide level of service projections for those intersections if those movements are restricted.

Motion to table request, by Director Schmelzer, second by Chief Dunbar. Motion passed 5-0.

11/18/2019 Remains tabled.

2. Request of John DePuy, 3430 Crosshill Drive, to make the west side of Crosshill Drive from Hillshafer Drive north to dead end of Crosshill Drive.

Concerns about vehicles parking in front of his mailbox as well as concerns about emergency vehicles being able to access his home.

Motion to table request until signatures of property owners approving the change can be obtained, by Director Thomas, second by Chief Dunbar, Motion passed 3-0.

11/18/2019 Remains tabled. 3. Request of Cathy Weygandt, 204 Greenlawn Avenue, for a traffic signal at Sixth Street and Washington Avenue due to concerns of pedestrian and cyclist trying to cross over Sixth Street.

8/19/2019

Lee Weygandt stated that it is difficult and dangerous to cross Sixth Street at Washington Avenue. Suggests installing a signal similar to the one at South Main Street and Baldwin Street, a traffic tripped light and a button to push for pedestrians. Some children cross there to get to Jefferson School. Would like a study done. Director Thomas stated that there are crosswalks there but no signal. Schmelzer wants to differentiate between how long you have to wait to cross a busy road and something we would put in place to actuate to stop traffic. Would take a look at adding a midblock crossing with signalization if a significant number of students cross there to get to Jefferson School. 4. Request of Sonja Huffman, Center Street Block Watch, to make the intersection of Center Street and Carnahan Street a four-way stop.

9/16/2019

Ms. Huffman stated that Findlay is growing and more people are going to Riverside Park. There are also more activities going on at Riverside Park than there used to be. Ms. Huffman stated that members of the block watch approve the intersection Center Street and Carnahan Street becoming a four-way stop. Director Thomas stated that the City does not install stop signs for speed control. Traffic warrants need to meet requirements for an intersection to become a four-way stop. Motion to obtain traffic counts for Center Street and bring back to Traffic Commission for consideration of a four-way stop at Center Street and Carnahan Street, by Chief Eberle, second by Chief Dunbar. Motion passed 3-0.

10/21/2019

Director Thomas stated that there is some merit to activity of summer vs. non summer traffic. Traffic counts will be taken as soon as able to do so.

11/18/2019 Remains tabled.

5. Request of Chad Richards, to add a turn lane at Flowers Avenue at 18th Street.

9/16/2019

Adding a left turn lane on Flowers Avenue at 18th Street would not make it safer. Adding a stop sign at that intersection would make it safer than adding a turn lane. Chief Dunbar stated that he can place an unmarked vehicle in the area to monitor traffic patterns during drop off and pick up of students.

Motion to table request to look at the traffic patterns in the area to determine a solution, by Director Thomas, second by Chief Eberle. Motion passed 3-0.

10/21/2019

Chief Dunbar stated that he has a report from three days of surveillance. The recommendation is for a stop sign on Flowers at 18th Street. A "yield" sign or "cross traffic does not stop" sign are other suggestions. Since the construction of Glenwood School this area has been cause for concern.

11/18/2019

Motion to lift item from table by Chief Dunbar, second by Director Thomas. Motion passed 3-0. Chief Dunbar reiterated his report from October's meeting. Motion to add a stop sign on Flowers Avenue at 18th Street by Chief Eberle, second by Director Thomas. Motion passed 3-0.

NEW BUSINESS

1. Request of Lakeview Park Property Owners Association for stop signs at the intersection of Reimund Ct. and Lakebrook Drive.

Motion to approve request for a stop sign on Reimund Court at Lakebrook Drive, by Chief Eberle, second by Director Thomas. Motion passed 3-0.

2. Request of Lakeview Park Property Owners Association for stop signs at the intersection of East Woodland Trail and South Woodland Trail.

Motion to approve request for a stop sign on East Woodland Trail at South Woodland Trail by Director Thomas, second by Chief Dunbar. Motion passed 3-0.

3. Request of Lakeview Park Property Owners Association to move the current no outlet sign from Brookview Trail, east of Clearbrook Circle, and place the no outlet sign on Brookview Trail just east of the intersection of Brookfield Drive.

Motion to approve request to move "No Outlet" sign from Brookview Trail, east of Clearbrook Circle, and place the no outlet sign on Brookview Trail just east of the intersection of Brookfield Drive by Chief Eberle, second by Chief Dunbar. Motion passed 3-0.

4. Request of City Engineering Department to make Concord Court and Vincent Street a four way stop due to Bishop Lane extending into Concord Court.

Motion to approve request to make Concord Court and Vincent Street a four way stop by Chief Eberle, second by Chief Dunbar. Motion passed 3-0.

5. General discussion on the condition of the traffic signals on Lima Avenue at Cooper Tire & Rubber Company for plans to repair or alternate replacement.

DeMuth stated that Cooper Tire is looking for answers about the crosswalks as far as safety is concerned. Jim Cline stated that there have been multiple near misses in the headquarters' crosswalk due to motorists running the red light. He also stated that there are speed issues along this area as well. Issue may be that the signals have the appearance of being too high. DeMuth stated that we could put signals on the upright section of the pole and see if that helps. This would be in addition to the signals in the current location. DeMuth has spare signals if would like to try temporarily placing a signal on the upright section of the pole. Originally Cooper Tire requested and paid to have signals put in. If we need to upgrade Cooper Tire will be responsible to pay for them. Director Thomas stated that we should try installing spare signal on the pole. Also get an estimate for replacement of both of the signals at Cooper Tire (at headquarters entrance and factory entrance).

Motion for Tom DeMuth to install a temporary traffic signal on the upright section of the pole of the traffic signal at the Cooper Tire headquarters entrance for both directions and obtain estimates for replacement of both of the signals at Cooper Tire (at headquarters entrance and factory entrance) by Director Thomas, second by Eberle. Motion passed 3-0.

With no further business to discuss, the meeting adjourned. The next meeting of the City of Findlay Traffic Commission will be held on December 16, 2019, at 2:30 p.m. in the third floor conference room of the Municipal Building.

REASON: The CR 236 Debt payments were appropriated and paid initially by Capital Improvements money for 2019. We were able to draw \$365,619.99 of County Permissive Fund money to pay the 2019 debt payments as an allowable use of the money. These appropriations allow the County Permissive money to be used for the debt and reimburse Capital Improvements.

REASON: The City had to appropriate the entire amount of the interest payment for the Energy Bonds for the 2019 debt payments. However, the Series B bonds are federally subsidized and we did receive a portion of our subsidy payment. Due to the federal mandated sequester, we did not receive the entire subsidy. Also, the amount that was due on the Series A bonds ended up being less than was shown on the amortization schedule and was originally budgeted. These transactions return the

fronted appropriation to CIT Fund - Capital Improvements restricted account.

REASON: In 2004 the City made the final debt payment on the 2003 Sidewalk Construction Program. However, there was several assessment deferments granted at that time in addition to several property owners that had chosen not to pay the assessment. Also the City made the final debt payment on the 2010 Sidewalk Repair and New Construction projects in 2014. About ½ of the assessed property owners chose not to pay this assessment. The City had to cover the costs of the debt payments with General Fund money and was to be reimbursed when the property owners finally made payment. The \$317.61 represents the amount of money that was received in 2019 for some of these properties. This money should now be returned to the General Fund. There are still a few outstanding assessments to be collected from these projects.

REASON: A portion of the amount received from the assorted property taxes from the county tax settlements is deposited into Police and Fire Pension Funds by law. The cash balance is then transferred to the General Fund at the end of the year. Although the revenue budgets for 2019 were estimated very closely, the transfers out of these funds were budgeted low. The County revises their revenue estimates after adoption of our annual appropriation ordinance, and in order to avoid potentially over-budgeting the fund on the certificate filing, the transfer out is budgeted lower than expected.

FROM:	City Income Tax Fund	\$250,000.00
TO:	City Income Tax (27047000-other)	\$250,000.00

REASON: Based on current projections the actual income tax collections will be more than the original estimate. The tax is allocated to CIT Fund - Capital Improvements Restricted Account and General Fund based on actual collections. I will be able to transfer more money than originally budgeted and need the appropriation increased by this amount in order to complete the transfer to General Fund.

FROM:	Cemetery Trust Fund	\$4,490.62
TO:	Cemetery Trust (27086000-other)	\$4,490.62

REASON: The amount of interest earned on the Cemetery Trust investment has come in higher than the original budgeted estimate. This appropriation allows for the total amount of interest earned to

be transferred to the General Fund.

Council will need to adopt emergency legislation for the above listed items at your meeting on December 17, 2019. By copy of this letter I have asked the Law Director to prepare the necessary legislation.

SECTION II - Consent Statement

Being in the public interest, the LPA gives consent to the Director of Transportation to complete the above described project.

The LPA shall cooperate with the Director of Transportation in the above described project as follows:

ODOT and FHWA shall assume and bear 100% of the necessary costs of the State's highway improvement project. In the event that the City requests certain features or appurtenances to be included within the State's highway improvement project's design and construction, and which features and appurtenances are determined by the State to be not necessary for the State's project, the City shall contribute 100% of the cost of those items.

SECTION IV - Utilities and Right-of-Way Statement

The LPA agrees that all right-of-way required (if applicable) for the described project will be acquired and/or made available in accordance with current State and Federal regulations. The LPA also understands that right-of-way costs include eligible utility costs.

The LPA agrees that all utility accommodations, relocations and reimbursements will comply with the current provisions of 23 CFR 65 and the ODOT Utilities Manual.

SECTION V - Maintenance

Maintain the right-of-way and keep it free of obstructions, and hold said right-of-way inviolate for public highway purposes.

SECTION VI - Authority to Sign

The <u>City Administrator</u> of said <u>City of Findlay</u> is hereby empowered on behalf of the <u>City of Findlay</u> to enter into agreements with the Director of Transportation necessary to complete the above described project.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion to accept minutes of the August 19, 2019, meeting, by Meyers, second by Cordonnier. Motion passed 8-0.

OLD BUSINESS

<u>Skate Park Update</u>: Director Thomas stated that the staff at Hancock Regional Planning Commission put together an overlay of potential skate parks on existing facilities. They took four existing facilities of different sizes in the region and compared them with available locations in current City of Findlay parks for possible location.

Director Thomas stated that he spoke with the a representative of Hunger Skateparks and she stated that the rule of thumb for a community our size a 10,000 square foot skate park is what we should be looking at. They put together a proposal for consultation, layout and conceptual renderings for a total of \$6000, and an additional \$4000 for Construction documents. McPheron and Meyers stated that they are not sure that the demand is there to invest in a new skate park. Russel stated that if you build it, they will use it based on his conversations. Pruitt stated that we need to do an overall comprehensive plan and needs assessment for parks and recreation facilities and programs for Findlay rather than just a study on skate parks. Russel asked if we need to do a plan or stay in maintenance mode and not building anything new. Taylor stated that we should decide on size and give that option only. Thomas stated that he is in favor of pursuing Phase 1 of design proposal. Meyers stated that we have not received much response from the skate park. Pruitt stated that an estimate of the cost of a comprehensive plan is \$25,000. This will give the City direction on all parks, not just a skate park. McPheron is more in favor of doing a comprehensive plan than moving forward with just a skate park plan. Cordonnier stated that recreation is a big part of quality of life. Meyers stated that he is in favor of the comprehensive plan. Russel stated that we will need to determine a definition of scope. Earl stated that it will be good data to back up what should be done. Russel stated that if we are going to move forward with a comprehensive plan project, we need to first talk with the Mayor and Council as it relates to their strategic planning process. Director Thomas stated that it appears the consensus of the board to move forward with a comprehensive plan for parks and recreation rather than just focusing on a study for a skate park.

Motion to pursue comprehensive master plan for parks and recreation to be funded in the 2020 City budget, by Russel, second by McPheron. Motion passed 7-1. Ben Taylor cast the dissenting vote.

NEW BUSINESS

<u>Riverside Pool Update</u>: Thomas stated that the YMCA reimbursement for 2019 was \$21,337.40. The YMCA would like to change the reimbursement to a flat fee of \$25,000 rather than having it based on loss. The YMCA is looking to add programming next year. The YMCA offers swim lessons for a \$5.00 fee the first day and the remaining lessons are no charge. Thomas stated that we need board consensus to move to a flat fee. Motion to recommend that the operating contract for Riverside Pool with Findlay YMCA include a flat reimbursement fee of \$25,000 starting in 2020 by Cordonnier, second by Meyers. Motion passed 7-0. Colin Earl left the meeting.

<u>Review of Recreation Fee Schedule</u>: Mansfield stated that there are no changes to the fee schedule for 2020. Motion to approve Fee Schedule by Russel, second by Cordonnier. Motion passed 7-0.

DEPARTMENT REPORTS

<u>Recreation Department Report</u>: Mansfield reported that the ball season is finished and only had two lost day during the tournament schedule all year; repairing leaks in the irrigation system then winterizing; ice is in full swing; Keep Active program has expanded into winter months working with the YMCA and waiting on response for gym space at Findlay City Schools; coordinated Move with the Mayor program which included Wags and Walks with resulted in two dog adoptions.

<u>Parks Maintenance Department Report</u>: Stoffel stated that they are moving into Fall/Winter mode; restrooms at the parks will be shut down in November; still doing a lot of mowing; closed pool and baby pool has been painted; bandshell work is needed, possibly doing a full restoration in 2021 with a possible grant to assist with cost, two corners will be repaired this year.

OTHER REPORTS

<u>Hancock Park District Report</u>: Pruitt reported the Blanchard River Water Trail map and guide is complete with 25,000 copies made and it has been placed on the Hancock Park District and Ohio Department of Natural Resources website

<u>Pacesetter Report</u>: Todd Eilerman wanted to thank the City for assisting with weed and feed, aeration, and overseed for the entire park, west side only. Pacesetter provided the material and City provided the labor. Wortman stated that there are two extra goals that the City could use at West Park if it turns into soccer and not baseball.

<u>Next Meeting</u>: The next meeting of the Parks and Recreation Board is scheduled for November 18, 2019, at 4:00pm in the third floor conference room of the Municipal Building.

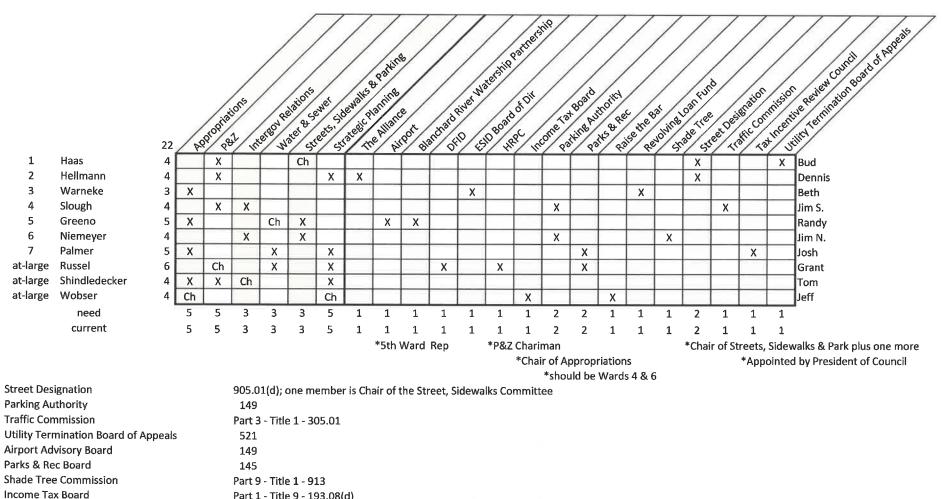

The LPA agrees that all utility accommodations, relocations and reimbursements will comply with the current provisions of 23 CFR 65 and the ODOT Utilities Manual.

SECTION V - Maintenance

Maintain the right-of-way and keep it free of obstructions, and hold said right-of-way inviolate for public highway purposes.
