Alley vacation request - 1017 Hurd Avenue

Kim Hamilton of 1017 Hurd Avenue, is requesting to vacate the alley between Lot 132 in Byals A P O L and Lots 1901-1904 in the Schwartz & Firmins Addition from Hurd Avenue east to the first north/south alley. Needs to be referred to City Planning Commission and Planning & Zoning Committee.

WRITTEN COMMUNICATIONS:

The **Downtown Findlay Improvement District** held a meeting on June 3, 2020 at the Sherman House.

- Hanging flower baskets will be hung soon. Watering is being contracted out with Stratton Greenhouses Inc. of Bluffton and
 includes the use of a gator. The City of Findlay is looking to provide water for watering from a downtown fire hydrant. Costs
 of the flowers and the water services are born by the DFID.
- Cleaning and maintenance efforts performed by Pleasant View Lawn & Landscape Inc. with costs borne by the DFID continue. Pleasant View works in conjunction with the Public Works Department to keep our downtown looking great.
- The DFID expressed support for the creation of Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area (DORA) in downtown similar to those that exist in Toledo, Delaware, Worthington and many other Ohio communities. A DORA enables the City to establish a district within which patrons of restaurants and bars may purchase alcoholic beverages and then carry the drinks throughout the district without restrictions of Ohio open-container laws. A DORA would be requested by the Mayor and require City Council approval.
- The DFID has hand ongoing discussions about how to effectively communicate its activities to its membership. An email distribution list and private Facebook group are being developed to support this effort. Contact Councilman Russel if you would like to be added to either communications channel.

City Auditor Staschiak - City's Rainy Day Reserve Account

During the budget and pre-budget meetings, it was mentioned that it is time to consider increasing the City's Rainy Day Reserve Account to an amount closer to Ohio's statutory limit. Historically, it is funded to a level of one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) and would be used in the even the operational revenues fall short of the total resources available under Ohio Law for operations. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, this would be the best time to do so. Per the financial snapshot report provided in tonight's City Council packet, the account can be increased by approximately five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000.00). There isn't a more strategic move that can be made to buffer the City's ability to pay operational costs creating time to react to a General Fund Revenue shortfall. Since the creation of the City's Rainy Day Reserve Account in 2009, the appropriated operations budget has increased twenty-one percent (21%) and the account balance has remained fixed. The funding level of this account could be tied to the growth in the operations budget as part of an adopted policy ordinance. City Auditor Staschiak is willing to discuss this with the City's Appropriations Committee. Legislation to appropriate funds to bolster the City's Rainy Day Reserve Account is requested. City Auditor Staschiak is requesting this letter be read into the record. Resolution No. 018-2020 was created.

Deputy City Auditor Sampson - Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding Program grant

Safety Director Schmelzer – FAA FY2020 Taxiway Alpha Rehabilitation project

Four hundred thirty-two thousand six hundred twenty-four dollars and no cents (\$432,624.00) was originally planned to be spent but the grant was fully funded keeping those matching dollars (approximately \$22,000.00) in City coffers. The Airport has another opportunity to obtain infrastructure funding. The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) Office of Aviation has a program that will fund a rehabilitation project on our main ramp area. ODOT has cited this as an area that needs to be planned for pavement rehabilitation. The City of Findlay would like to be proactive and take advantage of the current grant environment. The City's proposal is to apply for the FY2021 ODOT Aviation Direct grant with a five percent (5%) contribution of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00). If awarded, the City would receive five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000.00) and would move through the application process at that time. While there is no guarantee that the City will be awarded the grant, it is worth putting in the work to try. The City's contribution of five percent (5%) will also increase the chances of getting the award. Legislation to apply for said grant is requested. The deadline for submittal is July 15, 2020. Ordinance No. 2020-074 was created.

Safety Director Schmelzer - City of Findlay airport auxiliary building lease

The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) has approached the City of Findlay about a short term lease of the airport auxiliary building and has agreed to paying four thousand five hundred (\$4,500.00)/per month plus utilities. A draft lease agreement has been sent to ODOT for review. They are interested in utilizing the facility as a project office for the next twelve (12) months. This revenue is a good way to fund HVAC upgrades to the building and allows the City of Findlay to be a good public sector partner to ODOT. Upgrade cost estimates are still being determined. Prior estimates were around twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00). Ordinance No. 2020-075 was created.

FROM: Council Clerk

City law requires persons requesting the vacation of a street or alley to file a petition with City Council. Council then refers the request to the City Planning Commission and the Planning & Zoning Committee for their findings. These Committees file their report with Council, who in turn makes the final ruling on the request.

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

Petition forms are available in the Council Clerk's Office. It requires the signature of a majority of the property owners that abut the requested vacation. A plat of the area shall accompany the application indicating the street or alley to be vacated. This plat can be obtained from the City Engineer's Office.

In addition to the petition for an alley vacation being signed by the abutting property owners, which is notice, if said proposed alley vacation is less than the full alley running from street to street, either north and south or east and west as the case may be, then the Clerk will also send notices to the abutting property owners on that portion of the alley extended but not in the request for vacation. For example, if an alley runs from north to south from street A to street B, intersected by a east-west alley, and the request is to vacate the alley running from street A to the intersecting east-west alley, then the abutting property owners on the remaining portion of that north-south alley between street A and street B shall also receive notice of the petition to vacate from the Council Clerk. (Rules of Procedure, as amended, of Findlay City Council).

Ideally, the petition must be signed by all abutting property owners. If not, a Public Notice of Consideration to Vacate has to be advertised in the Courier for six consecutive weeks. The cost of the advertising shall be paid by the petitioner. Anyone wishing to address Council concerning the petition may do so as a result of the publication. This can occur at any of the three readings which Council must give an Ordinance that vacates right-of-way.

FEE

At the time of submitting the request to the Council Clerk, a \$75.00 non-refundable fee shall accompany the petition. This is to off-set some of the City's expenses. Upon adoption of legislation, applicable advertising and filing fees will be invoiced to the petitioner.

ASSESSMENTS

By law, if there were assessments to the abutting properties for improvements to the street or utilities, the petitioners are to pay the assessment fee for the property being vacated. These assessments, if any, are recorded in the City Engineer's Office. They are requested to be researched for the property upon legislation request. The petitioners will be invoiced for the total expense, and it must be paid before Council will vacate the street or alley.

PLANNING COMMISSION ACTION

Planning Commission action on vacation petitions will be in the form of a recommendation to City Council. Council may then either concur with the Commission's recommendation or override it. Concurring action may be accomplished with a simple majority vote, while overriding action requires a two-thirds (2/3) vote of Council. Notice of the Planning Commission Meeting will be sent from the Engineer's Office to the filer of the petition advising him/her when the request shall be heard.

COMMITTEE ACTION

This Committee's action will be in the form of a recommendation to City Council. Council may then either concur with the Committee's recommendation or override it. Action is a simple majority vote to concur or override the Committee report. Notice of the Planning & Zoning Committee Meeting will be sent by the Council Clerk to the petitioners advising them when the request shall be heard.

CITY COUNCIL ACTION

Once the petition is placed on Council's agenda, it will be referred to the City Planning Commission and the Committee with all documentation submitted. Both the City Planning

Commission and the Planning & Zoning Committee shall review the request. Upon their findings, Council will request legislation and give it three (3) separate readings if the vacation is to proceed.

In order to vacate a public right-of-way, City Council must adopt an ordinance doing so. Normally, legislation is prepared when the Planning & Zoning Committee recommends that an action be taken. However, appropriate legislation can be drawn at the request of any Council member, whether or not the vacation is supported by the Committee. Ordinances require three readings prior to adoption, and this normally occurs over the course of three consecutive meetings of Council.

A majority affirmative vote of at least five (5) members is necessary to enact a vacation ordinance. If Council disagrees with the Planning Commission's recommendation, it will take six (6) affirmative votes of members of Council to enact a vacation ordinance. The ordinance is not effective until at least 30 days after signing by the Mayor.

It is respectfully requested this letter be read into the record of the Council Meeting.

Dear Council Members,

During the budget and pre-budget meetings I mentioned it is time to consider increasing the City's 'Rainy Day Reserve Account' to an amount closer Ohio's statutory limit. Historically, it is funded to a level of \$1,000,000 and would be used in the event the operational revenues fall short of the total resources available under Ohio law for operations.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, I can think of no better time to do so than at this moment. Per the Financial Snapshot report provided in your current council packet the account can be increased by an amount of approximately \$500,000. There isn't a more strategic move that you can make to buffer the City's ability to pay operational costs and by creating time to react to a General Fund Revenue shortfall.

Since the creation of the City's 'Rainy Day Reserve Account' in 2009, the appropriated operations budget has increased 21% and the account balance has remained fixed. The funding level of this account could be tied to the growth in the operations budget as part of an adopted policy ordinance. I would be willing to discuss this aspect with your appropriations committee.

Members,

You may recall the success the City of Findlay had with acquiring grant dollars for the FAA FY2020 Taxiway Alpha Rehabilitation project. We had originally planned to spend \$432,624.00, but the grant was fully funded, keeping those match dollars (approximately \$22,000) in City coffers.

The airport has another opportunity to obtain infrastructure funding. ODOT- Office of Aviation has a program that will fund a rehabilitation project on our main ramp area.

ODOT has cited this as an area that needs to be planned for Pavement Rehabilitation. We would like to be proactive and take advantage of the current grant environment. Our proposal would be to apply for the FY2021 ODOT Aviation Direct grant with a 5% contribution of \$25,000. If awarded, the City would receive \$500,000.00. We would move through an appropriation process at that time.

While there is no guarantee that we will be awarded the grant, it is worth putting in the work to try. Our contribution of 5% will also increase our chances of getting the award.

Legislation has been requested for permission to apply for the grant. The deadline for submittal is July 15th.

WHEREAS, the City Auditor has set forth a proposed a Minimum Reserve Balance Policy, and a Five Year Capital Improvement Plan Policy which Council deems appropriate and wishes to endorse same to serve as guidelines for the future operations of City of Findlay; and,

WHEREAS, Ohio Revised Code 5705.13 permits a municipality to establish a Rainy Day Reserve Account which requires a city to set forth a purpose for said account; where said reserve will be established; and the total amount to be reserved in said account; and.

WHEREAS, it is the desire of this Council to also establish a Rainy Day Reserve Account within the General Fund for with the purpose of stabilizing the City budget's against cyclical changes in revenues and expenditures.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Findlay, State of Ohio:

SECTION 1: That the following Financial Plan Policies be and the same is hereby approved and adopted as follows:

Five Year Capital Improvement Plan Policy

Annually, the Administration will present to Council a five-year capital improvement plan when submitting next year's capital improvement budget. The plan will prioritize all anticipated expenditures greater than one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00) and estimate the impact of debt service on the City budget for any proposed debt.

For business-like projects and enterprise reserves, a five-year pro-forma revenue and expense statement will be created in addition to the five-year capital improvement plan, to determine the impact of future capital improvements. The Administration will also report to Council the expected impact on rates or user fees, if applicable.

Minimum Reserve Balance Policy

The City will budget Minimum Reserve Balance for unforeseen emergencies or revenue shortfalls and to eliminate the need for short-term borrowing for cash-flow needs. The minimum reserve balances for next year will be estimated during the operational budgeting process. If events trigger a breach of the reserve balance reserves during a fiscal year, this will be brought to Council and corrective action planned to eventually restore the Minimum Reserve Balance. This Minimum Reserve Balance should be adjusted periodically upward to keep pace with the City's expenses, so that the Minimum Reserve Balance target is approximately sixteen and seven tenths percent (16.7%) of the City's General Fund expenses or approximately two months operating expenses in said fund.

SECTION 2: That a Rainy Day Reserve Account be and the same is hereby established as follows:

Purpose: to stabilize City budgets against cyclical changes in revenues and expenditures.

Rainy Day Reserve Account – established pursuant to Ohio Revised Code 5705.13 a Reserve Balance Account, also called the "Rainy Day Reserve Account", will be created within the General Fund, to be used in emergencies for operational expenses thus stabilizing City budgets against cyclical changes in revenues and expenditures. The reserve balance account will not exceed five percent (5%) of the previous year's revenues, as dictated by state law. The target amount for this reserve account should be adjusted upward in future years as the City's expenses grow, to stay at approximately five percent (5%) of the City's General Fund expenses. The total amount to be reserved in said Rainy Day Reserve Account will be one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000.00).

SECTION 3: That the Auditor be and he is hereby authorized to establish a Rainy Day Reserve Account within the General Fund, and to transfer one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) from the General Fund to the Rainy Day Reserve Account.

SECTION 4: This Resolution is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety of the inhabitants of the City of Findlay, Ohio, and for the further reason it is immediately necessary to enact said legislation so that these policies and statutorily-created reserve may be established forthwith thus enhancing the City's overall fiscal policy.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR OF THE CITY OF FINDLAY, OHIO TO ENTER INTO A LEASE AGREEMENT WITH THE OHIO DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION FOR LEASING OUT THE CITY OF FINDLAY'S AIRPORT AUXILIARY BUILDING LOCATED AT 1205 LIMA AVENUE, FINDLAY, OHIO, WAIVING FORMAL ADVERTISING AND BIDDING, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.
